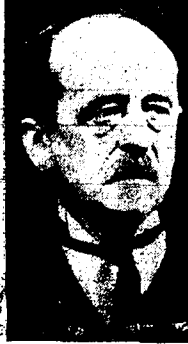

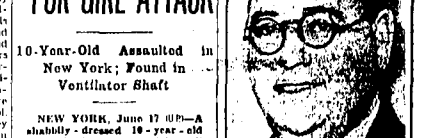

Huge Campaign Spreads for Extermination of "Traitors" in Russia

HUNDREDS LISTED IN PLOTS, STATE U. S. S. R. PAPERS

President of White Republic Kills Self For "Family, Personal Reasons"

MOSCOW, June 17 (UP)—A merciless campaign for extermination of "traitors" spread through vast Soviet Russia from the Baltic and Black seas to the Pacific today.

Hundreds of men were involved already. Newspapers which denounce long lists of men as wreckers, spies, traitors, Trotskyists, scoundrels, bandits, rightists, nationalists and enemies of the people, their blasts with the significant "and others."

It was announced that A. G. Chervinsky, president of the White Russian republic, had committed suicide "for personal and family reasons."

But coincidentally it was revealed that the Communist party executive for White Russia had sent him a note asking him why he permitted "traitors" to sidetrack plans for two important military inventions.

MRS. STRADLEY GOES TO SESSION

TAX COLLECTIONS SOAR IN JEROME

JEROME, June 17 (Special)—Current and delinquent tax collections for May in Jerome county were more than double those for the same month last year.

Mr. Kennedy, county treasurer and tax collector, said today.

Mr. Kennedy revealed that delinquent tax collections for the month of May total \$18,827.14 with interest on the same in the amount of \$2,048.50 making a total of \$20,875.64. Collections of a year ago were approximately one-fourth this amount.

The 1936 current taxes collected for the month of May, he said, amounted to \$10,141.93, over double the amount of the collections for the same period a year ago.

These collections will supply sufficient funds to the many school districts of the county and they will be able to pay up all accounts of the old year and start the new school year on a cash basis. Also, there will be sufficient money on hand to place the city, village, and highway districts in a healthier financial condition than they have been for many years, the treasurer reported.

COUNTY EXPENSE AT \$18,297 MARK

Current expenses of Twin Falls county formed the major item in the \$18,297.83 cost of running and maintaining the county's divisions and services from May 10 to June 14, figures showed today at the offices of the county commissioners.

The current expense total was \$10,902.81 for supplies, repairs and work done.

Purchase of weed-eradication supplies cost \$5,714.93 or slightly more than half of the current expense aggregate.

The county's cost in running Twin Falls general hospital was \$4,878.59 for the period. This total, however, included purchase of new X-ray equipment and expenditure of about \$900 for food.

Poor fund total was \$2,710.73.

The inlet gate opened, the whip cracked, and madly dashing into the ring were six little pigs. They all stopped at once, as the crowd laughed, looked up at the humans who were in turn looking at them, and then turned on the spot and tried to get through the door by which they entered.

But driven back to the ring's center they were sold and were rushed out the "exit" door to be weighed.

Their appearance in the ring gave anything but the impression that they felt at home. They twitched and squirmed, and ran from this spot to that. They missed something and from their side it wouldn't have surprised anyone if they had asked for mother.

Winchell missed a scoop by not attending the auction. One cow was unable to appear in a herd which was being offered for sale. She was permitted to stand in the corral and affectionately nuzzle her calf to which she had given birth a few minutes before. The man who bought the herd also was given the calf.

ENGLAND IS GOAL OF L. D. S. HEAD

Passes Through Canada to Take Boat for Celebration in Great Britain

MONTREAL, June 17 (UP)—Heber J. Grant, 81, general president of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, passed through Montreal en route to Foston, England, where he will preside over the centennial celebrations of the founding of the first Mormon church in England.

The party headed by President Grant consisted of 67 other members of the Mormon faith. They sailed from Quebec yesterday on the Canadian Pacific Empress of Australia.

President Grant will spend three months in the British Isles and will make a survey of all Mormon missions. The remainder of the party, held to celebrate the centennial celebrations at Preston, July 24, will tour England, France, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland and Italy.

The Preston centennial is being held to celebrate the arrival of the first Mormon missionaries from the United States.

The Latter Day Saints have 6,000 members in the British Isles.

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FACTORY FARM BALANCE ASKED

Economists Believe Stability Lies in Linking Two Production Forms

WASHINGTON, June 17 (AP)—Permanent American farm prosperity must have as its sound base industrial stability at home and revival of world markets, according to A. G. Black, chief economist of the department of agriculture.

"Farmers have learned that one of the biggest factors in farm stability is industrial stability," Black said in a departmental review of "the agricultural situation," "during the depression," he continued, "they were witness to a very sharp decrease in industrial production and relatively stable industrial prices, while, at the same time, their production was maintained at high levels and their prices crashed to all-time lows."

Look to Future

Farmers, Black said, have gone through a period of extremely uncertain and variable prices and income. After four years of steadily rising prices and income they are looking into the future determined to do what they can to prevent such disastrous fluctuations in the future, he said.

"Farmers today realize that they are a part of a great, complex economic system—and that their affairs extend beyond their own fence rows, their county and state lines, even beyond the borders of the country."

"They realize that the problem of economic stability is not just a farm problem—nor yet just an industrial problem. It is not a problem of Texas alone, nor of New Jersey alone."

Economic Stability

"Economic stability can be achieved only through the joint efforts of farmers and city people."

"One of the big farm problems of the future will be the problems of economic stability and security for farmers—to maintain a steady flow of industrial products from the factories and mines of the nation," Black said.

"When the production of industrial products is decreased and the production of farm products is maintained at the same level, it means that farmers get fewer industrial products in exchange for each unit of farm production, he said."

"The nation is not to suffer from recurring booms and depression economic stability must be maintained by keeping farm and factory production and farm and city purchasing power balanced, Black said."

CANADA ENJOYS FARM UPSWING

Growers Emerge From 7-Year Depression That Was Almost Disastrous

OTTAWA, Ont. (AP)—Canadian farmers are emerging from a seven-year depression that almost ruined many of them.

The return of better times to the agriculturists, the country's greatest wealth producers, is seen in the increase in sales of horses, tractors and other farm implements. The rise is taken as a sign that farmers, after curbing crops and expenditures for seven years because of drought conditions and lack of work, are preparing to stage a "come-back."

The increasing prominence the horse is once again playing as a provider of power of farms is the most surprising development. The department of agriculture reports that more horses are being put to work on farms every year, despite the increased use of tractors. At the same time the export demand for horses, particularly from Great Britain and the United States, is increasing, and prices are mounting rapidly.

During the 10 years 1925-35, because of the increasing popularity of tractors, Canada's horse population dropped by nearly 500,000 to 3,200,000 head. It appeared that the horse was doomed to gradual extinction. During the depression, however, many farmers discovered that it was cheaper to buy and feed horses than to operate tractors, and the demand gradually began increasing again.

The department of agriculture does not consider the tractor a menace to horses any longer.

"The situation of the horse breeder in Canada for the next eight or ten years is definitely bright," one official declared. "Breeding has been increased heavily last year and this year and every stallion is in demand."

Western Canada farm implement dealers report that prevailing high prices for wheat and optimistic crop conditions have led to a buying wave in farm machinery. The implement business in the west has been slump since 1929 because of poor grain prices, drought and general economic instability.

Implement company officials declare that sales, particularly of tractors, during the first four months of this year have been from 20 to 50 per cent greater than last year, and more farmers are paying cash.

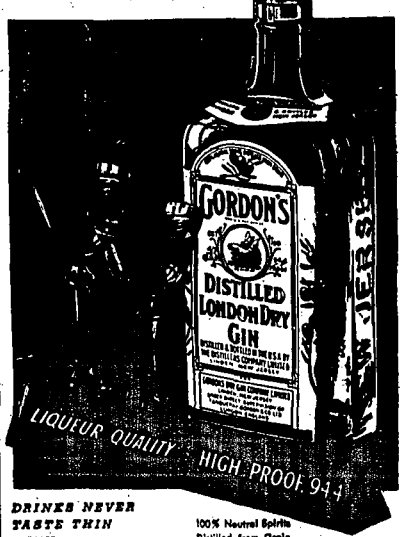

CORRESPONDENT SEES LONG FIGHT TO TAKE BILBAO

Says 22,000 Basque Militia Have Fallen in Front

(Editor's note: Emilio Herrera, veteran member of the United Press Madrid staff, has arrived at Bordeaux, France, and will be in Twin Falls, Idaho, at the first of July. His story of the first of the civil war in 11 months ago today was on the front page of the Evening Times in that area. He has been in the front lines in the event of the nationalistic occupation of Bilbao. His life would be in serious danger, he was ordered to go to France. Herrera follows.)

BORDEAUX, France, June 17 (UPI)—Bilbao continued fighting valiantly if hopelessly today to keep valid its boast that it never gives in.

The line of fortifications which the Basque loyalists thought impregnable has crumbled. Spanish and Italian infantry are moving in on the suburbs while German airplanes bomb the city.

For days the streets have quaked under the bombardment. There has been no let up day or night. The loyalist artillery batteries are drawn up in the streets.

No Food Arriving No food has reached the city since last Saturday. Water is running low. Twenty-two thousand of the Basque militia have fallen.

The situation is desperate. But I believe, after having been through the 77 days of siege, that the battle is not definitely settled.

Everything that I saw up to the moment that I left Bilbao Tuesday indicated that it is not going to be easy for the nationalists to consolidate their victory.

Every building may prove a fortress and every window may conceal its rifleman or machine gunner.

Government Remains The Basque government has not left the city. President Jose Antonio de Aguirre and his colleagues have established their headquarters in a sub-basement of one of the city's most modern buildings.

Some ministerial departments have been sent to a small town near Bilbao, whose name I have promised not to disclose.

Some 2,000 nationalist political prisoners have been moved westward to Santander province. All bank deposits have been sent to Santander.

Many of the nationalist hostages might have been free today had the siege of the city been delayed. Ne-

Typoid Death Rate Shows Huge Decline

CHICAGO, June 17 (UPI)—The death rate from typhoid in 78 cities for which complete data are available dropped from 22.54 per 100,000 population in 1910 to .94 in 1936, according to a survey in the American Medical Association Journal today.

Eighteen cities reported no deaths from typhoid in 1936, against 25 in 1935. El Paso, Texas, reported a death rate of 68—highest among the 78 cities. Second highest was reported by New Orleans, 6.5.

Before I left the city was a dead place. Only soldiers and officials, in addition to newspaper correspondents, circulated the streets freely. Airplanes were sweeping down within 700 feet, machine gunning.

At the time I left the official casualty list covering men at the front was 8,000 dead and 17,000 wounded. These figures were suppressed by censors.
