YOUNGSTOWN, O., June 21 (AP)—Youngstown Sheet and Tube Co. and Republic Steel Corp. announced today that they would attempt to reopen their Youngstown plants at 7 a. m. tomorrow in defiance of re-doubled picket lines.

Representatives of both companies announced advertisements were appearing today in local newspapers advising workers that the plants would be reopened as a result of assurances by peace officials that protection can be provided.

Open at 7 a. m.
"All employees who want to work should enter the plants at 7 a. m.," said Frank Purcell of Sheet and Tube, said in the announcement.

Purcell's statement as given out by company representatives said: "Law enforcement officials at Youngstown, Campbell Struthers and Hubbard and the sheriff of Mahoning county have stated to me that they are willing and now prepared and able to protect the company's employees in their lawful rights to resume work."

Letters Lost in Airmail Accident Arrive in Boise

BOISE, Idaho June 21 (AP)—Two airmail letters, stamped with a terse "delay due to air mail interruption near Salt Lake City, Utah, Dec. 15, 1936," were received today by Paul McElrath, branch manager for an insurance company.

The letters, sent from the scene of a Western Air Express plane crash on Lone Peak December 15, carried approximately \$5,000 in checks. They were stamped "Los Angeles, Dec. 14, 7 p. m." Railway Ponders Changes to Help Twin Falls Area

Two steps that would bring distinct improvement in railroad accommodations for Twin Falls and all communities on the branch line were being pondered today by Union Pacific officials in the Omaha regional offices.

1) Replacing the present "galloping goose" ditched and eroded trains with two steam trains.

2) Inaugurating Union Pacific bus connections between here and Shoshone.

Under the first proposition, if approved by the railroad's executives, the steam trains would make connection with the main line at Pocatello, and not at Mindooka. The

trains would carry either tourist or Pullman cars. If tourist, the passenger rate would be two cents per mile under the current moderate prices now in effect on western lines. If Pullman, the rates would be three cents. Tourist rate to Salt Lake City would be \$1.00; Pullman, \$2.00.

The steam trains would displace the "galloping goose" after seven years.

Proposal for the direct bus connection between Twin Falls and Shoshone, it was pointed out, would allow passengers on the branch line to transfer to a Union Pacific stage in Twin Falls and make connections with the main line flyers at Shoshone.

VICTORS SET UP MARTIAL LAW IN CONQUERED CITY

Military Government Rules Basque Capital; Insurgent Army Pours in

By WEBB MILLER (Copyright 1937, United Press) BILBAO, June 21 (AP)—Nationalist authorities declared martial law in Bilbao area today and, setting up an emergency government, poured thousands of men into the city today for a new advance against the retreating Basque loyalist army. For the moment, contact between the victorious nationalists and their opponents seemed unbroken. The main Basque army was far to the west, along with the hundreds of thousands of refugees—including, apparently, three-fourths of the people of Bilbao—who were crowding into the Santander region.

Names Governor Gen. Jose Fidel Davila, commander in chief, named Col. Garcia Valino acting military governor, and Valino in his first decree proclaimed martial law. Miguel Canales del Riego was named civil governor of the region. Civil guards, the crack police force of the country, arrived from Victoria to take charge of policing Bilbao. With them were assault guards and municipal and provincial policemen who remained at their posts. The new temporary government set up its headquarters in the Carlton hotel, which the Basque defense Junta fled Friday.

Army Pours In The main nationalist force paraded into the city in full was paraded at 2 p. m. yesterday and this was the official time of occupation. Gen. Francisco Franco, nationalist dictator, Gen. Davila and a group of colleagues attended mass in the suburb of Begona. Franco did not enter the city, however. Nationalist soldiers arrived all through the day, parading to cheer past people dressed in their best clothes. The seven main bridges across the Nervion river that runs through the city had been dynamited, and the nationalists made emergency bridges with beams. Trucks arrived with white bread and other food with which the nationalists intend to win favor among the ill-nourished people who witnessed the siege of 11 weeks. Some refugees straggled back into the city, including Basque soldiers in uniform who sought to join the nationalists. Aviators reported that the bulk of the retreating loyalist army was moving steadily westward, miles from Bilbao. It looked as if there was going to be a new situation soon in the Santander area, with 1,500,000 inhabitants, soldiers and refugees jammed in along the narrow coast area, which is an unproductive one.

CHERRY PACKING SEASON NEARING

Utah Firm Ready for Eighth Year of Activity in This And Surrounding Area

For the eighth consecutive season, packing of the Twin Falls county's cherry crop will get underway this week, the packing being done at the Twin Falls plant of the H. W. Jacobs company of Provo, Utah, officials of the concern announced. Expenditure in this district of approximately \$65,000 for fruit, labor, sugar and storage is seen as the company prepares to purchase the fruit from growers in this locality as well as Payette, Emmet and Weiser in southwestern Idaho. During the packing period approximately 15 persons will find jobs at the local plant.

The cherry crop is reported to be the only fruit crop satisfactorily to survive last winter's severe weather. The peach crop is seen as the company's main concern. The peach crop in the famed Brigham City district is reported as almost a total loss and very few peaches are expected to come from Idaho. The cherries which will go into processing at the plant here this season include those from trees which were originally planted in 1929 after the Jacobs firm came into the south central Idaho field. A larger pack and better prices loom here this season.
