PROTECTION FOR CRAFTS SOUGHT BY ITALY'S HEAD

Orisis Caused by "Leipzig Incident" Not Over

ROME, June 25 (Special) — Benito Mussolini has ordered Italian warships to station themselves just outside the three-mile territorial limit of Spanish loyalist waters and to be ready to defend any Italian merchant ship against attack, according to diplomatic sources reported today.

How many units have been ordered to participate in the patrol is not known, nor was it known whether the ships would try to halt or hinder vessels suspected of carrying war supplies to the loyalists.

Henceforth all Italian merchant ships from the time they approach the Spanish coast, will be protected by Italian navy units, it was learned.

Italians do not believe that the crisis over the Leipzig incident is ended. They believe that before long the loyalists will "repeat" attacks on Italian shipping and it is said that if there are any such attacks Germany and Italy will act together to exact immediate reprisals.

Postmaster Does Second Shine-Up With More Skill

Of Course, He Gets Some on The Magel Socks—But Tush For That!

Wearing the same socks he sported at the first "shine" held yesterday morning, H. F. Magel, local automobile dealer, sat in the shoe shine chair at N. E. "Bugs" White's Antiseptic barber shop still wearing a local around his head, the result of an unfinished shampoo, while M. A. "Mike" Stronk, local postmaster, "shined 'em up."

It all happened this morning at exactly 9 a. m. In fact "Mike" arrived at 8:57 a. m. to start the "order" of passing off the second half of his bet to Magel that Braddock would beat Louis. The first half was paid yesterday morning under the same conditions, the same place and the same time.

Usual Chair or None

Magel wanted his shoes shined while he was in the barber's chair but Stronk refused.

"Either in the regular chair or no shine," Stronk said.

Immediately upon the start of the shine, Magel opened a discourse on Jim Farley and Democrats in general. It was cut short, however, as the postmaster informed the businessman:

"I agreed to shine your shoes but I'll hang if I'll listen to your talk."

Magel informed the some 30 persons watching the "event" that Mr. Stronk was doing a better job this morning than he did the day before, except that he was getting a little more polish on the socks.

One of the spectators, Harry Bennett, local attorney and an ardent Republican, informed Stronk that "all of 'em will be doing this soon."

"The Republicans are doing it now," Stronk said.

"Go," Bennett said, "I didn't know you had changed your politics."

Cost \$2.30

The two shiners cost Stronk exactly \$2.30.

Adding insult to injury both days, Magel this morning wore a matching content with the postmaster to the tune of one dollar. It develops that each day they meet they match for a dollar, Stronk "dropped" a dollar on each of the two shoe shining days and then also had to pay the porter 10 cents daily for use of the shine material.

"I still think I bet on the best man," Stronk said, "but he just let me down."

And, as he completed his way toward the door after pushing his "work," Stronk said:

"And if any of you fellows ever want to bet you know where to find me."

The crowd, including Magel, admitted that the postmaster could "take it."

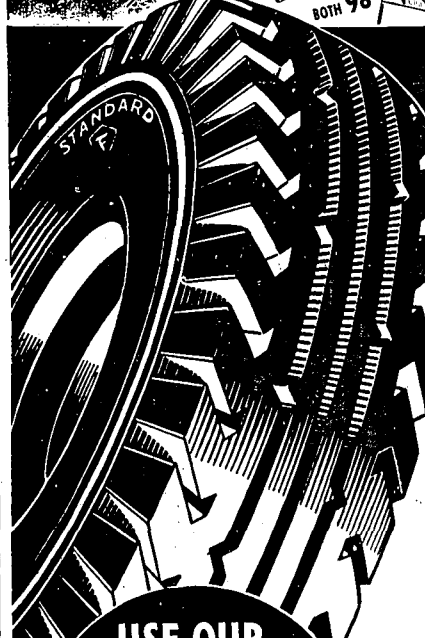

ZINC TO CONTROL PARALYSIS URGED

Use of Chemical to Aid in Human Resistance Asked in Medical Journal

CHICAGO, June 25 (AP)—Success in controlling infantile paralysis in animals with zinc sulphate applications indicates the experiments should be extended to human beings, Drs. E. W. Schultz and L. P. Chabrand of Stanford University, reported today in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

"The immediate task before the profession is to find the best possible control of this disease," they said.

They treated 240 monkeys intranasally with zinc concentrations of zinc sulphate, and compared their resistance to infantile paralysis with that of 300 untreated monkeys.

In one group, each of 120 monkeys was given three zinc sulphate applications and 35 installations of the paralysis virus within seven weeks. When this report was drawn only two of these had died, but 11 untreated animals had developed the disease.

In another group of eight, the monkeys were given the intranasal spray and beginning 25 days later were given seven daily virus installations. All developed the disease but only one died.

Cult Follower Claimed to be Mentally Deranged at Trial

LOS ANGELES, June 25 (AP)—Co-defendants in the Mann act trial of John Wuest, Burk Fowler of Father Divine's Harlem cult, contended today that he was "not right mentally."

Fowler called himself "Jesus the Christ" in the cult setup, and expected help from an "immucable conception" and a "virgin-old girl in begetting a new 'world redeemer,'" his associates said.

The girl, Deight Jewett, was the complaining witness. She was lured into the cult from a Denver high school and Hunt crowned her "Virgin Mary," she said, then he seduced her in several states.

"These things happened, she said, on an automobile trip from Denver to 'Bethlehem,' which is Hunt's mansion in Beverly Hills, Calif., and from 'Bethlehem' to 'No. 1 heaven,' where Father Divine is fourth. Divine is the Harlem, New York Negro who presides as 'God.'"

Co-defendants are Mrs. Agnes (Mary Magdalene) Gardner, H. B. (John the Baptist) Smith, and E. B. (Elizabeth) Peters. They are, like Hunt, middle-aged white cult members and were all present on the trips in Hunt's \$12,000 automobile.

Mrs. Gardner and Mrs. Peters were used yesterday as defense witnesses. Hunt is expected to testify, probably next Tuesday. The government has completed its case. Hugh MacBeth, Hunt's Negro lawyer, said he may ask Father Divine to come to the stand.

"Father Divine has sent his blessings," he said. "He stands, ready to fly to our aid."

Mentally Deranged

Mrs. Gardner said she knew of no intimate relations that Hunt had having with Miss Jewett but she noticed his strange behavior.

"I remarked of his laughing and laughing, Mrs. Peters agreed with me that he was not right mentally. I still think he is deranged."

She never called the girl "Virgin Mary," she said, but she paid little attention to Hunt's comment on the "coming redeemer" because "the coming redeemer" was "the son of Father Divine" who she said he is the true Jesus Christ, the same as 2,000 years ago.

Fowler in the courtroom rose emphatically, shouting: "Peace, isn't it wonderful?"

"Let's get back to earth," Judge Leon R. Yankwich ordered.

Mrs. Peters said she was not so well impressed by events on the trip as at Palm Springs, fashionable California resort where they stopped, she and Mrs. Gardner wrote to Father Divine and informed him that Hunt was violating the precepts of the cult by his associations with the girl.

Hunt asked her, she said, if "an immaculate conception requires the same length of time as a physical conception." She did not understand what he meant.

Splenic Extract Found To Aid Bone Knitting

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - Broken bones heal faster when the patient is fed with splenic extract, Dr. Thomas Foster Wheeler, of Richmond, Va., reported in a recent issue of Modern Medicine, a medical magazine published here. Administration of splenic extract speeds the firm union of the bones and also improves bone condition, the physician said. Since bones are composed largely of calcium, it is probable the splenic extract stimulates the deposit of calcium in the bone.

SEALS OVERRUN COLUMBIA RIVER SALMON HAUNTS

ASTORIA, Ore. (AP) - Seals are making such heavy inroads on the salmon runs near the mouth of the Columbia river that fishermen have banded together to ask that an extra fee be added to fishing licenses to finance a war of extermination. The seals have their breeding grounds on both the Oregon and Washington banks of the river and on islands near the river mouth. The most successful way of taking them has been the installation of traps near the water's edge. The state of Oregon now pays a bounty on seals. Fishermen have picked up a few odd dollars by bagging the animals, but most of the bounty cannot be recovered because of the deep, fast water. The Columbia River Fishermen's Protective union reports that the seals are increasing heavily and have been spotted swimming in great herds after salmon.

BRIDGES SEEKS POSTAL LEADER FOR QUESTIONS

Howes Asks to Be Called Instead of Postmaster General

WASHINGTON, June 25 (UPI)—The senate post office committee split today over whether to summon Postmaster General James A. Farley for questioning in connection with the seven-state steel strike.

Sen. H. Styles Bridges, R., N. H., insisted that earlier in the committee's preliminary hearing on Bridges' resolution to create a special committee to investigate alleged interference with the mails by strikers.

"I have some very pertinent questions that I want to ask Mr. Farley," Bridges said, "and I don't want to ask them of anyone else."

Committee Chairman Kenneth McMillan, D., Tenn., opposed Bridges' demand.

Committee Adjourns
The committee adjourned for the week and after hearing the Mercer Gilchrist, board chairman of Republic Steel Corp., William V. Daly, assistant corporation counsel of Chicago, and James L. Mooney, supervisor of Chicago police, Capt. Thomas Murray of the Chicago police, and Harry E. Orin, representing Republic's employees central committee.

First Assistant Postmaster General W. W. Howes asked that he be called instead of Farley.

"The trouble arose while Mr. Farley was out of town," Howes explained, "and I was acting postmaster general. Mr. Farley has not been connected with it, and I believe I am much more familiar with it than he is."

Meets Monday
The committee will meet Monday to settle the matter.

Gilchrist accused the committee for industrial organization of calling the steel strike "a war more direct and more deadly than any contract with what he described as a wholly irresponsible union."

Daly presented an affidavit signed by a Chicago policeman asserting that in the Memorial day riot at the Republic's south Chicago plant that resulted in 10 deaths, strikers were armed with clubs, iron pipes, broken bottles, bags of pepper and other weapons.

Mooney's care if there were 10 people killed, Mooney said, "If we hadn't done what we did, there would have been more killed."

"I didn't give any orders to shoot," he said, "but the police on the ground had to defend themselves and they had to use their guns."

Help Their Mother
The stand would have opened in the morning, the reporter learned, only for the fact that it is the time in which the three help their mother, Mrs. M. F. Thonietz.

"Anyway," Bob broke in again, "it isn't worth enough to sell many drinks in the morning. We've only been open a little over two hours and we've already made 27 cents."

"And it's all profit," Marianne countered.

Investigation disclosed that the candy given free is worth three pieces for a penny. Giving two to each customer represents an expense of two-thirds of a cent. Thus the 27 cents "profit" which Marianne spoke about is made at selling drinks for one-third of a cent each.

The Evening Times reporter didn't say much but he had a sneaking suspicion that perhaps Mrs. Thonietz donated some of the funds for the "Kool Aid."

Unsuspected Answer
The reporter was startled at the answer given to his query as to whether or not the stand would be open today.

"No, it won't," Bob said, "you see Jack, who lives across the street, is opening up tomorrow. He will serve rolls, sandwiches, pickles, drinks and everything. He's going into business in a big way."

And then Marianne produced a gem of common sense which the capitalists might well copy.

"We've made enough money," she said, "and so now we're going to give him a chance. He bought plenty from us today, you see."

Jack, the boy across the street, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Salsbury who reside at 111 Eighth avenue east. While the reporter was getting this story, he was very making ready to open today.

Marianne is 10 years old. Bob is "almost 12" and Frank, better known to his intimate friends as "Boo," confessed that he was "exactly eight and one-half because my birthday comes on Jan. 1."
