Substitute Court Measure Presented to U. S. Senate

New Suggestion Allows Only 4 More Justices

Robinson Presents Alternative For FDR Reorganization Bill

WASHINGTON, July 2 (U.P.)—Senate Majority Leader Joseph T. Robinson today presented to the senate a substitute court reorganization bill providing a four-justice compromise for President Roosevelt's original supreme court enlargement proposal.

The compromise was formally introduced by Sen. M. M. Logan, D., Ky., and bore the notation that it had been drafted by Logan, Sen. Carl Hatch, D., N. M., and Chairman Henry Ashurst of the senate judiciary committee.

Administration forces hoped to drive the Robinson compromise through to passage today.

REPUBLIC OPENS 1 STEEL PLANT

Ohio National Guardsmen Aid As 375 Men Return to Jobs in Factory

MASILLION, O., July 2 (U.P.)—A strike-bound Republic Steel corporation plant was reopened today by 375 men who returned to the protection of powerful lines of Ohio National guardsmen.

There was no resistance offered by committee for industrial organization unionists, who had succeeded in "hitting the militia" if necessary to back the reopening. No attempt was made immediately to open a second Republic plant in other parts of the city.

Guardsmen had checked off a three-quarter-mile area and stood by with fixed bayonets.

Taylor Will Draw Plans For Snake River Bridge

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, July 2 (U.P.)—Idaho state public works department head, will draw plans for a bridge to be erected over the Snake river at Hedo, 11, P. Richards, Idaho Falls banker, said on his return from the capital today. The bridge will replace two ferries in use since early days of this region's settlement.

INCOME PAYMENT CHANGE IS ASKED BY TAX EXPERTS

Undersecretary Magill Seeks Elimination of Single Levy Return

WASHINGTON, July 2 (U.P.)—Undersecretary of Treasury Roswell Magill suggested today that congress enact legislation eliminating the present privilege of filing separate income returns for husband and wife. He said such a law would increase federal revenue \$100,000,000 annually.

Magill told the joint congressional tax inquiry committee that the treasury now loses millions of dollars in revenue because husbands and wives are permitted to file separate returns on the income each earns.

Treasury officials also suggested that federal revenues could be increased by upward adjustment of present taxes on income obtained in this country by non-resident aliens and foreign corporations.

Opposed in Past
This suggestion has been opposed in the past by state department officials who fear reprisals by foreign governments.

Magill conceded that there might be constitutional difficulties in passing such a law, because it would upset the community property statutes of such states as Texas, California, New Mexico and Arizona.

"But England does it," he said, "and collects taxes from husbands (Continued on Page 2, Column 1)"

REAL PROPERTY VALUATION RISES

1937 Tax Assessment Total For County Advances By \$318,310

Assessed valuation of all real property in Twin Falls county except utilities increased nearly a third of a million dollars for 1937, the county auditor's consolidation sheet of assessment values revealed this afternoon.

Total increase was \$318,810, the auditor's records show.

Valuation of the real property except utilities and not including personal property is set at \$10,946,102 for this year. The figure for 1936 was \$10,727,285.

3 PUT TO DEATH FOR ONE MURDER

Fourth of Quartet in New York Gets Commuted Sentence

OSHINGO, July 2 (U.P.)—Anthony Caruso, Brooklyn hoodlum whose proud boast was that the sobriquet "Boss Tony" fitted him, died in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison last night for the murder of Isaac Rubin, 55-year-old delinquent merchant.

Two of his accomplices also were executed for the slaying of Rubin, but they were spared because they did not raise their hands fast enough during a holdup on Nov. 6, 1936, in a Brooklyn bar room. They were Harry Kibben, 42, and Raymond Edwards, 25.

U. S. Files Tax Suits On Johnston Mayor

PITTSBURGH, July 2 (U.P.)—The federal government today filed a \$70,000 tax suit against Mayor Daniel J. Shields of Johnston, N. D., and 12 other Johnston residents who were indicted 12 years ago for operating a brewery.

Shields has been a leader in the "back-to-work" movement in the strike-stricken Johnston plant of Bethlehem Steel corporation.

Bill of Exceptions Is Filed for Van Vlack

Babcock Indicates Opposition To Some of Ailshie's Claims

Proposed bill of exceptions to the proceedings by which Douglas Van Vlack was re-sentenced to hang July 27 had been received by Judge T. Bailey Lee today, with indications that Edward Babcock, county attorney, will contest at least two of the statements made in the bill by James F. Ailshie, jr., attorney for Van Vlack.

Judge Lee has not yet signed the bill, as far as Mr. Babcock is concerned. The judge's office in Burley said he was probably en route home on a trip to Boise. Copies of the exceptions were sent to Mr. Babcock and Atty. Gen. J. W. Taylor at Boise.

HOUSE ADJOURNS IN BITTER FIGHT

Bankhead Closes Body Until Tuesday When OIO Battle Waxos Hot

WASHINGTON, July 2 (U.P.)—Speaker William B. Bankhead suddenly forced adjournment of the house until Tuesday today when a bitter floor dispute over the committee for industrial organization threatened to develop into a free-for-all.

The outbreak, one of the most violent in the house this year, was touched off by an address by Rep. Maury Maverick, D., Tex., in which the Texas congressman vigorously defended the OIO and attacked its critics.

Before the adjournment was refused through, Maverick demanded that remarks of Rep. Vernon E. Cox, D., Ok., be taken down to determine whether Cox had violated house rules by casting personal aspersions upon him.

Family of Cooper, Slain Officer, Sends Letter to Governor Protesting Clemency

From the family of one of the two officers slain by Douglas Van Vlack came today a direct appeal to Gov. Burrell W. Clark informing that the family of the slain officer, killing Cooper instantly and fatally wounding Owens, Twin Falls county deputy sheriff, Owens died 10 days later in agony caused by the nature of his throat wound.

Van Vlack admitted slaying the pair, but was tried only for killing Miller, his divorced wife. The other two charges could be pressed if Prosecutor Edward Babcock so desires.

Follows Hook Letter
The letter from the Cooper family follows by several days a similar message sent to the governor by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hook, parents of the slain girl.

"Had Without Warning
Cooper and Henry O. Givens stopped Van Vlack on the highway after receiving a flash that the man had kidnapped his wife and was en route through southern Idaho. Van Vlack opened fire from his car, killing Cooper instantly and fatally wounding Owens, Twin Falls county deputy sheriff. Owens died 10 days later in agony caused by the nature of his throat wound.

Fireworks Blast Kills 5; Two Not Expected to Live

FOURTEEN CRITICALLY BURNED IN EXPLOSION AT DRUG STORE

NAMPA, Idaho, July 2 (U.P.)—Hospitals today reported that two more persons critically injured in last night's terrific fireworks explosion were not expected to live.

Five already are dead as a result of the blast and resulting fire which destroyed the Drake drug company and a beauty parlor located in the same building.

Fourteen critically burned and injured were in Nampa hospitals, and at least 20 others were recovering in private homes.

CARE URGED IN FIREWORKS USE

Aftermath of Nampa's tragic firecracker disaster came in Twin Falls today as three city officials called cooperation of merchants and parents in seeing that no Twin Falls children are injured through use of fireworks during the coming holidays.

"We do not want such a tragedy as happened at Nampa to happen in Twin Falls," Mayor Lem A. Chapin said. "We ask the cooperation of all concerned to see that no accidents happen here.

Loss of an eye, or fingers or other limbs are not worth the few minutes of possible enjoyment derived from the firing of firecrackers," the mayor said.

Police Commissioner Carl Ritchie urged that citizens prohibit children from playing with fireworks in dangerous places where property or personal damage is liable to be the result.

Being distracted for the rest of a lifetime is the result of carelessness in the use of fireworks. They are dangerous to see the least," Ritchie said.

Chief of Police Howard Gillette urged parents or guardians of small children to be present at all times. Firecrackers are being exploded. "If small children must be permitted to be present at all times, guardians should see to it that they are under supervision of all times. The chief of police said.

Wallace Warns Farmers of Danger of Price Depression in Wheat

SECRETARY SEES BUMPER CROP IN U. S. THIS YEAR

Fredota Wish For His "Ever-Normal" Granary Plan; Surplus Expected

WASHINGTON, July 2 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace today told wheat farmers here from 31 states to plan a 1938 AAA program—that there is "great danger" of a price-depressing surplus of wheat this year.

Wallace advised the group that farmers should "think very seriously" about the danger of two or more bumper crops this year.

He said that if weather and price conditions continue favorable this fall, "with wheat next year we had the ever-normal granary." He did not, however, encourage hopes that congress would pass the ever-normal granary bill this session.

2,000,000 Carryover

Agriculture department economists estimated that the United States would have 2,000,000 bushels of wheat over of this year's wheat. The 1937 crop was estimated at between 250,000,000 and 250,000,000 bushels. The nation's carryover at the end of 1936 was 250,000,000 bushels per bushel.

The government called the conference of farmers before the present harvest was well underway because of the "necessity for a decision regarding the 1938 program as soon as possible." AAA Administrator H. R. Tolley presided.

Three possible procedures for the 1938 crop were discussed. These were: (1) continuation of the present program which does not limit acreage; (2) acreage limitation similar to the present program, and; (3) establishment of a program similar to that in effect at present, but provides payments for diversion up to 80 per cent of the base acreage.

Prospects Are Good

Farmers said prospects for a bumper crop this year are good. The harvest appears certain to be the largest since 1931.

Agriculture department officials said they feared that continued high wheat prices would lead to 1938 seedings which would place a huge surplus over the market and result in a severe drop in prices.

What experts said the present price trend indicates that farmers will harvest the most valuable wheat crop since 1920, when the value was \$1,330,000,000. In 1924, 1926 and 1927 the farm value of wheat was slightly more than \$1,000,000,000.

SAVINGS & LOAN ASSETS ADVANCE

Assets of the First Federal Savings and Loan association of Twin Falls climbed \$105,527.56 during the last half-year, according to the statement of conditions which had been announced today as of June 30.

The organization's assets Wednesday night of this week totaled \$656,210.61. On Dec. 31, 1936 this total was \$500,682.05.

Shareholders received their 7th consecutive dividend when the concern paid 2 1/2 per cent for the first half of 1937.

Largest major item in the association assets is first mortgage real estate loans, which climbed nearly \$100,000 in the past six months, reaching \$259,210.61 as of June 30 as compared with \$151,485.03 on Dec. 31.

Blackfoot's Clerk Resigns on Request

BLACKFOOT, Idaho, July 2 (AP)—R. L. Osborn, city clerk for the past 20 years, resigned last night at the request of the Blackfoot city council after an alleged shortage had been discovered in the waterworks department accounts.

The shortage was discovered by William Bowen, Pocatello accountant who has been conducting an audit of the city's books. Bowen said the shortage had been made good.

The council approved the appointment of Edgar Cappa, fourth ward councilman, to succeed Osborn.

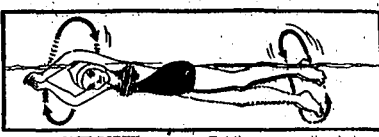

GET IN THE SWIM

One of the best water stunts is the rolling log. It's good exercise for the spinal column and exhilarating to the swimmer and spectators alike.

You first assume the floating log position, lying face downward in the water, arms and legs extended, with your fingers locked overhead and your toes pointed in.

Twisting your entire body, roll over on your side, then onto your back, then roll on your other side, and back on your face, and around and around again as a log would do.

The twist of the body should come from the shoulders and spine with your arms and legs acting as propellers. (Note illustration.)

LIFEGUARDS AT PLUNGE HERE PULL OUT COUPLE EVERY DAY

Their Job Isn't Simply to Stand Around and Delight the Ladies

Anyone who thinks that all a lifeguard has to do is to get a nice coat of tan, a new pair of swimming trunks, stand with his arms crossed and look "pretty" for the ladies, ought to have a little talk with Howard "Bronnie" Ward, a lifeguard at the Harmon park swimming pool.

Instead of just this, there are also a few other little matters which must be accomplished during the time he spends "while" away his time.

Most prominent among them is the fact that persons, both adults and children, in danger must be saved from a severe choking or even a worse fate—drowning.

Full Out "Two Daily"

"Some people might not believe it," Ward said this afternoon, "but at the Harmon pool we have to 'pull out' on the average of two persons each day during the summer swimming season.

"Most of these are children. All are in danger of drowning but many get beyond their depth and aren't good enough swimmers to get back. They get frightened and give up. That's where our job starts. We must get them before they 'take out' too much water.

"And the surprising thing among the children that we have to aid in the pool is that a high percentage of them are girls. They know how to swim a little but not good enough.

"It is pitiful when you think that many of these are girls. They just because some parent or guardian hasn't taken the time to be sure his child can swim. Learning to swim is easy and it doesn't take long before a child knows what it's all about. Even in the most difficult situations a swimmer has a chance—a non-swimmer hasn't any chance." Ward pointed out.

Other Work, Too

Aside from saving lives, the lifeguards must assist in cleaning and scrubbing the pool once a week. They must make minor repairs around the pool. They must keep in good physical condition and also keep in practice. And they must keep their eyes open every minute they are on duty.

"Yes," Ward said, "some people think all we do is stand around and get a sun tan. Well, I think one little statement will answer that.

"How would the average person like to stand in the hot sun, minus shade from 10 a. m. until 3:15 p. m. every day? I'll venture to say that they wouldn't enjoy it very much.

"In Ward's opinion as a life guard at the pool is Frank Carpenter.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

By Rodney Dutcher

Evening Times Washington Correspondent

WASHINGTON, July 2 (Special)—As the numerous rumors concerning the sudden departure of Vice President Jack Garner from his job as president of the Senate: The reason for his departure is that Garner and President Roosevelt had parted widely apart on the issues of the League and relief, and that Roosevelt had had enough of Garner at least two occasions to give the vice president, much private spankings for what he considered efforts to sabotage his policies.

Garner is 67 years old and does not like to be spanked. He does not like to be around Washington in the summer time, either. He dropped the word around that he was thinking of going off for his home in Uvalde, Tex., about the first of June, but failed to get a rise out of President. Then he advised Roosevelt in person that he would like to take a vacation. Whether he expected to reply a plea that he stay on the job is a matter of guesswork, as Jack told no one. But what Roosevelt said was that he thought it would be a good idea.

Word was given out that the vice president would be gone only two or three days. But the fact is that his friends he would be back by Aug. 1. If congress hadn't quit by then, actually, he wouldn't be expected back this session. Undoubtedly he would be willing to return and break a vote on a compromise on the program of relief. But the administration won't force a court vote if it looks as close as that.

GROWING INSURGENCE

Specifically, Garner gave secret backing to Ben. Jimmy Byrnes in his fight to make Roosevelt publicly condemn sit-down strikes and to cut the federal relief appropriation from \$1,500,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000. He also favored Byrnes' elevation to the senate majority leadership in case Roosevelt should be persuaded to appoint Lester J. Robinson to the supreme court, knowing that the White House would want Senator Barkley of Kentucky to succeed Robinson.

Garner, however, has been willing to go along with Roosevelt on the supreme court issue.

The incident of his retreat to Uvalde is chiefly significant in its relationship to the growing divergence between Roosevelt and conservative senators, chiefly from the south, who hope to block further presidential reform efforts and to dictate the Democratic nomination in 1940.

INGLEWOOD PAUSES IN MANHUNT TO BURY DEAD SISTERS

DOUBLE FUNERAL HELD FOR TWO OF TRAGEDY VICTIMS

100 Men Questioned, But Few Still Held in Southern California

INGLEWOOD, Calif., July 2 (AP)—With a pause in its man-hunt this Los Angeles suburb today prepared to bury the last of three little girls who were assaulted and strangled by a fiend.

A double funeral was arranged for the Everett sisters, Melba, 9, and Madeline, 7. Jeannette Stephens, 8, was buried yesterday. Dr. Warren Orfion, of the First Christian church, who preached the funeral, included a word of advice to the frenzied community.

All Gully "May this rally us not as a mob of vengeance, but into an army of crusaders," he pleaded.

"Perhaps not one of us is guilty of the unspeakable crime that has ravaged two homes," he said. "Perhaps we have failed to create the moral atmosphere that makes such things as this impossible."

Send Contributions The community was absorbed with the atrocity. Daylong, the townspeople have poured contributions into boxes that stood on store counters and passed from house to house, to buy flowers for the slain girls and help their parents defray the funeral expenses. And every night, angry mobs have surrounded the jail threatening violence against scores of men who have been held for questioning.

More than 100 men have been questioned, a few were still confined in southern California jails today, but police admitted they had no likely suspect. One man, Ray Harmon, 37, who had been held and released, hanged himself last night.

Man Dies for Beer Murder

65-Year-Old Texan Put to Death in Electric Chair For Killing Woman

HUNTSVILLE, Tex., July 2 (AP)—Clements Mattar, a doddier man of 65, was put to death in the electric chair early today for murdering a 73-year-old woman to earn a bottle of beer.

He confessed the crime as he walked down the Texas penitentiary corridor from his cell to the death chamber. He was so nervous his voice was a mere whisper.

He said he was drunk when he beat Miss Rebecca Courney to death with a harness-hame at her home in Haskell county on May 6, 1936. He had been drinking beer, he said, and he went to the home of "Purdy" Abston for another bottle. Abston told him he would have to kill the aged spinster before he could have the beer, he said, so he went to her home and killed her, while Abston watched. Abston was sentenced to 50 years in prison as an accessory but he has appealed.

Jerome Office Has New Insect Poison

JEROME, July 2 (Special)—Derris dust, a new insecticide used in the control of ants, cabbage worms and cauliflower worms, is available at the Jerome county agent's office. The advantage of this material over others used is that it is harmless to humans and animals as well as plants the agent stated. This fact will make the material especially valuable for use on cauliflower and for late dustings on cabbage, he said, according to entomologists who have tried the material.

For these insects it should be mixed three parts fine water part of Derris dust. The dust is effective on ants where they are in definite small hills or colonies.

WESTERN SOLONS ACHIEVE VICTORY

Washington Writer Says That Pettengill Bill Will Not Be Passed

TOMATOES GO ON QUARANTINE LIST

Idaho Officials Act to Keep Pin Worm Out of State; Law Enforced

Fumigation of tomato plants and fruit being shipped into Idaho from one foreign country, one territory of the United States and 11 states will be required under a quarantine order issued by the state department of agriculture and signed by the governor and secretary of state, it was announced here this afternoon by G. C. Magers, supervising inspector with headquarters in Twin Falls.

The quarantine was instigated because "it has been determined that a dangerous and destructive pest known as the tomato pin worm, not known to be present in Idaho, exists in the places named."

Each shipment of tomatoes or plants from the infected areas must be accompanied by a quarantine certificate signed by a duly authorized inspector of the department of agriculture at the point of origin. All arriving locally without the certificate will either be returned or destroyed.

The official quarantine order was issued through the office of Guy Graham, commissioner of agriculture for Idaho.

Listed on the quarantine group are the states of Florida, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Delaware, Mississippi, New Mexico, California, Missouri, Texas, Arizona and Utah. Also listed are Mexico and Hawaii.

The gross value of the shipment was \$2,111.63, and was purchased by Armour and company of South San Francisco. The hogs were received by Tom Parks of Piner, who represents Armour and company in this district. The next hog pool was to be held today.

Pools from this date on will be held at regular two week intervals with July 16 being the next regular date. According to hog pool officials many hog men are listing their hogs late in the week or are bringing in hogs without having them listed. This procedure is detrimental to the pool inasmuch as the buyers wish to know how many hogs they are bidding for, and the pool manager must make arrangements for properly handling shipments. Those wishing to list hogs are requested to notify the county agent's office on or before the Saturday preceding the shipping date.
