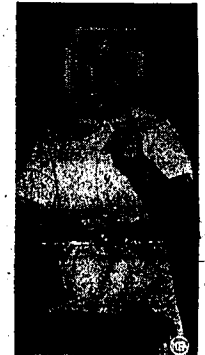

LONG BEACH, Calif., July 31 (UP)—Vera Bruce, 31, wife of Alfredo Codona, died today from the bullet wounds inflicted yesterday by Codona.

Father Swears Out Kidnaping Warrant for Truckdriver Who Lured Daughter Away

TORONTO, N. Y., July 31 (UP)—Search for Olive Carr, missing 13-year-old high school student, and Earl Wilson, 26-year-old truckdriver who police said lured her away from home Wednesday night, turned into Arizona today.

Sheriff W. H. Thomas and Justice of the Peace Walter Bowler of Tonopah telephoned the Tonopah Times-Bonanza from Los Angeles that they had traced the man and the girl through Death Valley and as far as Barstow, where they arrived at 4:00 a. m. Thursday.

PANIC BREAKS AS INVADERS CONTINUE DEADLY ASSAULT

TIENTSIN, July 31 (UP)—Tientsin was turned suddenly into an inferno of hate, fear and jangled nerves today at a moment when it had seemed that the brief, tragic "war" between China and Japan had ended.

This morning started quietly. Japanese artillerymen calmly and unemotionally kept pounding their field guns shells into the smoking, black ruin of the Rockefeller library of beautiful Nankai university, just firing away.

Next the Japanese artillery opened up, without warning, in the quiet, tense city, a terrible bombardment of the native city, the Hopei quarter.

For the days of the fighting, when their men were assailing their hope of peace against the Japanese army, the people of the city had remained fabulously unmoved.

But the bombardment caught them unawares. In a few moments, panic broke.

Women, dragging children at their heels, began running toward the harbor, seeking safety in the boats of the foreign settlements. Crises could be heard for blocks before them. Shouts of men, screams of women, the weak cries of children hardly able to walk interspersed the crash of the shells exploding and the boom of the big guns.

As they ran, there burst on the city one of the severest thunder storms in memory. Thunder sounded above the shells exploding and the boom of the big guns. Lightning struck down at the still smoldering fires of homes in the native quarter.

The troops in foreign concessions turned out as a general alarm and took post at their respective points.

At the harbor, boats were crowded with people seeking safety.

**Two in Charge**

Checking of local lists will be under the direction of the Buchanan and Ray Butler, of the employment service. The assistance division will be in charge of the lists for aliens while the employment service rolls will list all veterans.

Both agencies have been notified that the "WPA will have every reasonable opportunity to consent with promptness to the employment of any alien."

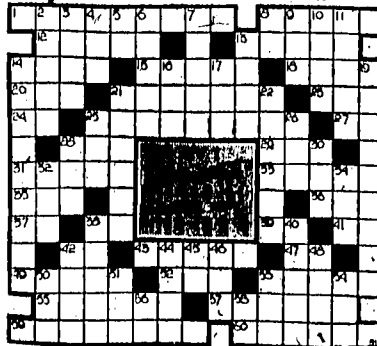

# JAPAN HAS WON AGAIN, WAR CORRESPONDENT FINDS

## CHIANG KAI-SHEK WILL NOT WAGE FURTHER BATTLE

Experts Believe Country Is Not Prepared to Take on Nippon Military Might

(By H. E. KINGS) (Copyright 1937, United Press)

SHANGHAI, July 31 (U.P.)—Japan has won again, it seemed today. Shattered bodies floated down the river toward the Yellow sea from the ruins of a beautiful university, homeless women and children, battered towns and the rout of a brave, ill-armed Chinese army testified to China's newest defeat in the north.

Japanese artillery was still hammering away today at the empty, blackened bulk of the Rockefeller library of Wankai university. Japanese army headquarters at Tientsin announced in a contemptuous communique that "the enemy has gone with the wind."

National Catastrophe  
It was indicated strongly that China leaders, biting down their impotent rage and outraged pride, would take all this and wait.

They realize clearly that to make war on Japan would mean a national catastrophe.

The danger of a flare-up that might draw in the rest of the world will remain. Throughout the country the people believe that there is going to be a real war, and it is expected to stock and bond prices, is that the country's leaders will resort to statesmanship rather than to the sword.

The government warily pondered the situation and people's war cry. "We must not lose our head," Chiang Kai-shek, commander in chief of the army and strong man of the nation, decided.

Everyone awaited his decision, for it is he in the end who must decide whether to fight or to negotiate with the alien occupiers of northern China, or on a policy of realism, permit the history of the Chinese to be written by the victors.

He decided to accept the probable loss of Yichang and Chongqing because of his inability to cope with Japan's army.

People at large do not realize that Chiang Kai-shek has decided against war because he knows that at once he would be subject to invasion, and Chinese ports to a Japanese blockade.

"You can't go to war just because you feel like it," without preparation," one observer said to me today.

The government permitted the people to blow off steam. Previously banned anti-Japanese songs and slogans were sung and shouted and blared from radio stations.

Chiang Kai-shek  
Since I arrived, at the end of a long flight, at Hong Kong, I have seen the coast, I have seen the Chinese, I have seen the Japanese, and I have seen the war.

I found Chinese generally indignant over Japanese actions in North China, but calm.

Skillful Chinese propaganda and organizers of public opinion who are expected by most observers to utilize the prevailing hurt pride and sense of futility in face of defeat, for solidifying rapidly growing national unity.

In this connection it should be emphasized that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's four points consisted in his pronouncement of July 17, 1937, that he was willing to negotiate with the Japanese people that while he would try to maintain and protect Chinese pride, heritage and traditions he must be given time to prepare before undertaking to regain full sovereignty and territorial integrity.

Four Points  
Chiang's four points remain on the record. Delivered to a group of Chinese leaders, they were: 1) Any settlement with Japan must not infringe the territorial integrity or sovereignty of our nation; 2) the status of the Chinese people must be maintained; 3) the Chinese government must be maintained; 4) we will not allow any restriction to be placed on the positions now held by the 26th army.

These four points in order, one finds: 1) Japan holds by force a large area of North China; 2) Japanese-approved officials are nominally in power at Tientsin; 3) Chinese army units are being retrained by Japanese; 4) the 26th army, which has been retrained by Japanese, is being sent to the front.

HAWAII BALKS  
HAWAII, July 31 (U.P.)—Following the U.S. decision to refuse to grant the Hawaiian Islands the status of a territory, the Hawaiian people have passed an act to establish a Hawaiian republic.

## Maps in Idaho Stone Reveal Carvings Over 400 Years Old

NAMP, Idaho 400—Maps in Idaho, etched in stone long before Columbus discovered America, have been found on opposite sides of the state.

Some 70 years ago the first map was discovered. It was known as the "Indian Guide Book." Possibility that this may date back hundreds of years is suggested by a drawing of Jackson Lake in western Wyoming. Outlining the physical conditions of the best trail for travelers, the mapmaker pictured a buffalo and big-horned sheep in the trail. The trail follows the Snake river from its source at Jackson Lake through rough mountainous country and joins the Columbia river, then down that body of water. Birds and animals that could be found in each section are shown. Even fishing holes were located on the map.

At a final to the trip, the explorer out in the rock an outline of a boat designed that the trail ended for foot travelers. To the left is Lake Pend d'Oreille and to the right is Lake Kootenai, while farther to the west is Lake Shoshone, Washington. Climb in the north, converging upon a common center is said by expert geologists to have been a meeting ground of Indians.

In the eastern section of the state, archaeologists are engaged in interpreting a map found in Birch Creek, Clark county. Smithsonian Institution experts say they are unable to decipher the markings.

A Twin Falls man is now said to have deciphered these pictographs found at Birch Creek.

Albert L. Huber of Pleasant Grove, Utah, says the hieroglyphics represent a map of the country with different sections of the land and water.

Having never seen the territory, Huber said that from photographs of the map he believed it charted a trail about 17 miles long and a smaller creek 9 miles in length joined it. Residents of the territory verified Huber's description of the canyon which he says he took from before undertaking to regain full sovereignty and territorial integrity.

Twenty parallel bars at the left of the reproduction indicated 17 miles.

## RADIUM DEPOSIT PLANS DEVELOP

Woman Owner of Coast Mine Goes Forward With Work On Rich Project

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., July 31 (U.P.)—Plans for the development of what is said to be the largest and richest radium deposit outside the Arctic circle area of Canada were being formulated today by Mrs. Josie Bishop, owner of the central California site on which the ore is found.

Information of the radium deposit was revealed yesterday following state supreme court action that gave a clear title to Mrs. Bishop and the rights of assay tests from the mine. Curtis Institute of Paris, France, which showed the ore contained 130 milligrams of radium per ton and 750 ounces of silver.

The owner and her attorney, Ray Bailey of Bakersfield, claim that samples of the ore have shown a radium content of \$7,000 per ton and silver values up to \$375 per ton.

If these figures prove correct, Mrs. Bishop has an extremely rich property. Bailey told the United Press the ore would be worth more working for the silver alone.

Mrs. Bishop, widowed mother of four grown children, said she has known the property contains radium for many years but was afraid to let the fact become known because of the holdings were in litigation.

"I did not want to risk losing a possible mineral fortune until everything was ready to launch the mine," she said.

The mine is located on the Beryl claims near colorful Red Rock canyon, 27 miles north of Mojave in one of the most isolated sections of interior California.

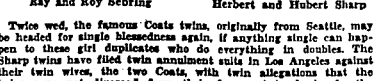

## BIG BEAR SOUGHT FOR STOCK KILL

Biological Survey Hunts For Huge Grizzly That Has Delicate Appetite

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, July 31 (U.P.)—The United States biological survey today was hunting a huge grizzly bear with a delicate appetite who is suspected of killing about 50 sheep and cattle last summer and so far this season.

Owen Morris, district supervisor of the game management division of the biological survey, said the animal eats only the heart, lungs, liver and under of a victim. It kills its prey by tearing in with its claws a slip of its paw.

The bear is apparently enormous because one of its victims was a cow weighing nearly 1,400 pounds. Morris said. Hunters are awaiting the arrival of three biological survey fox-hounds. With their aid they expect to finally run down the grizzly.

## FEWER LAMBS

BOISE, July 31 (Special)—The estimated number of lambs docked in 1937 in the 13 Western States is 19,427,000, or about 650,000 less than the 1936 crop of 20,078,000. The 1936 crop was 17,000,000 and the average crop for the five-year period (1931-1935) was 19,028,000. The current crop is about three per cent smaller than that of 1936, according to Richard C. Roos, agricultural statistician.
