SENATOR BLACK TAKES OATH AS SUPREME COURT JUSTICE

GOVERNOR NAMES WIFE TO OCCUPY SEAT IN SENATE

Dixie Bibb Graves to Fill Unexpired Term of Now Judge

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Hugo L. Black, newly appointed associate justice of the supreme court, took the oath of office last night from Charles Pace, finance clerk of the senate, Black's office revealed today.

Black was sworn in shortly after he submitted his resignation from the senate to Gov. Bibb Graves of Alabama, who appointed his wife, Dixie Bibb Graves, to Black's senate seat until his successor is elected.

Black will take another oath of office before the supreme court in October.

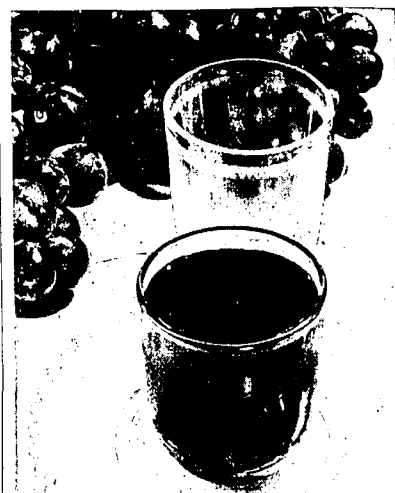
Self-Spoken Southerner
Appointing of Mrs. Graves, a slender and soft-spoken southerner, brought to the senate a rich background of political and social activity.

Mrs. Graves, known throughout Alabama as "Miss Dixie," will be escorted to the rostrum this afternoon to take the oath, by Sen. John H. Bankhead, D., Ala. Then she will take her seat several desks away from the senate's other women members, Mrs. Hattie W. Caraway, D., Ark.

The induction ceremony will give Mrs. Graves a quick start on what may be a more active political career than that attempted by the three women who have served in the senate.

May Be Candidate
Friends from the south, pointing to her active interest in political and social work, predicted that Mrs. Graves might be a candidate in the coming primary election to become a new senator, although a statement by her husband tended to discount such a plan. Her family has been prominent in political affairs for generations. Her great-grandfather was Alabama's first governor and her father, John H. Bankhead, was elected to the senate in 1936, when a special election will be held to fill Black's senate seat.

Right Amount of Pectin Keeps Canner Out of Jam



Grape Jelly will always be one of the more tender thoughts of expert jelly fanciers. The season is not far off when the vines will be purple with Concord grapes and the thoughts of all practical home makers will turn to glasses of regal purple sweetness for the breakfast feast.

Some cooks insist that the addition of prepared pectin decreases the flavor and stiffens the consistency of their jams and jellies. But an equal number of good cooks insist that the guarantee of success that results from using pectin offsets any minor change in consistency of flavor.

Damson Plum and Concord Grape Jam
(10 glasses—6 fluid ounces each)
Four cups (2 pounds) prepared fruit, 7½ cups (3½ pounds) sugar, 1½ bottle fruit pectin.

To prepare fruit, slip skins from about 1½ pounds fully ripe grapes. Bring pulp to a boil and simmer, covered, 5 minutes. Remove seeds by straining through a fine sieve and add to pulp. Pit (do not peel) about 1½ pounds fully ripe damson plums. Cut in small pieces and crush thoroughly. Add ½ cup water, bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 15 minutes. Combine fruit.

Measure sugar and prepared fruit into large kettle, filling up last cup with water if necessary. Mix well and bring to a full rolling boil over hottest fire. Stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard 1 minute. Remove from fire and stir in bottled fruit pectin. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard ½ minute. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly. Paraffin at once.

Plum Jam
(8 glasses—6 fluid ounces each)
Four cups (2 pounds) prepared fruit, 5 cups (2½ pounds) sugar, 1 box powdered fruit pectin.

To prepare fruit, pit (do not peel) about 2½ pounds fully ripe plums. Cut in small pieces and crush. Add ½ cup water, bring to a boil, and simmer, covered, 5 minutes.

Measure sugar into dry dish and set aside until needed. Measure prepared fruit into a 2- to 4-quart kettle, filling up last cup or fraction of cup with water if necessary; place over hottest fire. Add powdered fruit pectin, mix well, and continue stirring until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once pour in sugar, stirring constantly. It reduces foaming. ½ teaspoon butter may be added. Continue stirring.

TRAFFIC SIGNAL OPERATES TODAY

First of Three Units Placed Into Service; Rules For Drivers Listed

First of three new traffic signals to be installed in Twin Falls was put into operation today at the corner of Main avenue and Shoshone street under a temporary setup. The light will be operated individually until later when special cable is received for installation of two more lights, one at the intersection of Main avenue and second street north and the other at the intersection of Main avenue and second street east. After installation of all three the lights will be timed to permit Main avenue traffic, at a certain speed, to travel the three blocks without a stop.

Chief of Police Howard Gillette today called attention to the fact the lights pertained to bicycles and motor bikes as well as automobiles and all would be required to obey the stop and go signals. Pedestrians will also be expected to observe intersection only at a time when the light is holding motor traffic on the street they wish to cross.

Seven "rules" which must be observed in connection with the light were formulated by Chief Gillette today. They will be strictly enforced although they might be changed slightly when the two additional lights are in place.

The rules are:
1—Stop on red light, proceed immediately on green signal.
2—Cars stopping for the lights must stop behind the painted pedestrian lanes.
3—Stop and slow buttons are not effective when the light is operating. If the light is green on Shoshone proceed through that intersection without regard to the stop button.
4—No turns of any kind, either left, right or "U" allowed on a red light.
5—No left turns and no "U" turns allowed at any time in the intersection.

6—Pedestrians must obey the lights, and may not cross traffic while the green light permits that traffic to move.
7—Bicycles and motor bikes should obey the light.

Robbery Suspects Held in Hailey Jail

HAILEY, Aug. 20 (Special)—Two men are being held in custody in the Hailey jail as suspects in an attempted robbery Monday night. The Sawtooth Motor was broken into and the knob on the safe broken. Being apparently unable to open the safe the culprits took nothing from the garage. Shortly afterward two houses of ill repute on River street were entered and several slot machines taken.

Public Forum

DO WE NEED UNIONS?

Editor Idaho Evening Times:

We read every few days that another of the many crafts or trades has been organized to form a local union. To what end and where is this leading us? It is high time that the right-thinking people of Twin Falls give this matter some serious thought and prepare themselves to grapple with this promiscuous organization if it is allowed to continue with no opposition.

With the remembrance of the grief and strife experienced by General Motors, Chrysler, and the Public Coast shipbuilders still fresh in our minds, why do we allow these tentacles of legalised banditry to gradually but surely creep upon us? There may be, in some large industrial centers, some few instances where it is necessary for workers to organize themselves to demand a living wage. This condition, however, does not exist in Twin Falls. The workers here are not organized because of the demands of the workers themselves. It is the result of the influence of outside agitators who have been able to persuade the workers to join unions already formed here were not formed because of the demands of the workers themselves.

It is a part of the Central Nebraska Public Power and Irrigation project to which the Public Works Administration has allotted \$10,000,000. The reservoir alone is expected to cost \$2,000,000. The project runs as high as \$35,000,000. It is expected to produce 800 million kilowatts of farm power annually and to irrigate upward of 400,000 acres of rich Platte Valley land.

The district commonly known as the Tri-county project, is the key development in what Ben. C. Wagner, U. S. Senator from Nebraska, hopes will grow into a "Little TVA" in the Platte Valley. Two other projects, the Platte Valley Public Power and Irrigation district, and the Loup River Public Power district, are nearing completion at a combined cost of about \$25,000,000.

More Than Destroyers at Stake

Action of the United States in proposing to lease six destroyers to Brazil seems in a fair way of undoing much of the confidence built up between South American nations and this country during the past few years, particularly at the Inter-American Conference for the Maintenance of Peace, attended by President Roosevelt.

Argentina is frankly disturbed over the matter and doesn't hesitate to say so, pointing out quite lucidly the reasons for her displeasure. Argentine government officials, informed by the United States that Brazil needs the destroyers to defend herself against nations after her raw materials, notes that only Japan or Germany might be threatening Brazil, and inquires just how much protection six destroyers would be against either nation.

Along with other nations of South America, Argentina resents the secrecy which covered the negotiations. Surprise is expressed that Roosevelt, whose frankness was admired at the conference, would have made a move of this kind without communicating the fact to other South American powers.

Not missing a point, Argentina recalls that the United States for some time has argued against heavy spending on armaments as the worst possible threat of peace.

Says Argentina: wouldn't peace be even further threatened if nations could rent warships cheaply, thus removing the economic brake which has somewhat checked the armament race?

What, asks Argentina, would happen if European countries offer to lend war cruisers to South American countries.

It might be wise for the president and Secretary Hull to consider all the angles. Naval men are wondering if there is any coincidence in the fact that the projected lease involves six vessels—the exact number being built for the Argentine Republic in British shipyards.

Confidence between the Americas is one of the greatest factors in the future of world peace, regardless of what happens across the Atlantic or across the Pacific. It would seem unwise to disrupt the friendly relations so carefully built up, with what appears to be a touch of ill-advised intrigue.

Job Fight in Reverse

Fighting groups of men. Swinging fists. Swollen jaws and black eyes. And charging police. Sounds like another scramble on a strikers' picket line, doesn't it? But it isn't. It's just 600 men trying to get 300 jobs in a Hollywood film factory where a pirate picture is in the making.

Now many localities in the nation haven't enough jobs to go around. Others, it seems, have too many jobs. Adjustment of such situations is the task of social scientists, engineers and economists. Furthermore, it may be only another phase of "going Hollywood" when 600 men risk broken bones and scuffed shins to get into a single picture.

But whatever the social, industrial or economic significance of the incident, it is at least a refreshing change when workers fight to see who goes to work rather than to see who does not go to work.

Traffic's Death Vision

Through scientific tests being made among automobile drivers, many new hazards and means of correcting them are being revealed. One of the most startling items in this line comes from the last Milwaukee automobile show.

Of 5,000 visitors tested their for sight, 48 per cent were found to have defective vision, and 240 of those examined used only one eye. The supposition is that those 5,000 individuals, having taken the trouble to attend the show, were drivers or potential drivers. But nearly half of them were found physically unfitted to meet the requirements of absolutely safe driving.

It is staggering, then, to think how many of the millions of others now driving in America are similarly handicapped. Until these defects are located and remedied, everyone who ventures on the street, afoot or in a car, faces a stiff trading session with death—night unseen.

Reports from abroad reveal that John Roosevelt, son of the American president, quitted champagne in the face of Mayor Pierre Nouveau of Cannes, France and then crushed a bouquet of flowers over the mayor's head. We hope the French mayor won't regard this as an example of American manners, even among those much lower in caste than members of the country's first family.

If congress hasn't anything else to do, it might flog itself with some of the laws already passed this session.

In the coming campaigns, any number of political speakers will continue to read their speeches, figuring that someone has to do it.

BEHIND THE SCENES in Washington

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20—The trouble in congress, according to one member, is that a bloc of blocs is blocking each other.

Certainly a half dozen and more blocs have taken definite form in the past few weeks and it is necessary to have some knowledge of what they are and what they mean in order to understand even partially Capitol Hill at this season.

Here are some of the blocs as they are regarded in congress with special reference to the hour bill applying in general to the senate:

1. The southern bloc. As far as the administration is concerned, this is a bloc of the very New Deal element. The group met recently at a "common bloc" and decided that the hour bill must be no wage and hour law unless the government first provided cotton loans. Congressmen Wright, Patman of Texas, and to ask whether the bill would accept the wage-hour bill even if it did get cotton bills at this season.

This bloc is willing to blackmail or play with any other group which would accomplish, including the liberal bloc or wage-hour bloc. (Certain of these blocs overlap each other.)

5. The liberal bloc, led by Maury Maverick of Texas. It represents actually about 35 members who will stand together in any measure among congressmen from New York, Chicago, and other large cities. SOVIET FLIERS REACH ALASKA TO BEGIN HUNT

Eskimos Report Ice-Breaker Also Sighted Off Point Barrow

POINT BARROW, Alaska, Aug. 20 (AP)—A Soviet plane, manned by four Russian fliers, landed here today from Weller, Siberia, and prepared to join in the search for the six Russians lost in a four-motored plane on a projected nonstop flight from Moscow to San Francisco.

Eskimos reported also that a Russian ice breaker, probably the Krasin, was sighted far to the westward of Point Barrow and it was rumored it was equipped with a catapult to launch airplanes and carried three planes on its decks.

There was no open water in the immediate vicinity and a heavy ice pack was moving northward along this coast.

Sign Language Used

The Russian fliers who arrived here were flying a Boar OCC-112 plane. They were not able to speak English and it was difficult to obtain any detailed information from them. They used sign languages in communicating with local officials.

Weather conditions in this area continued unfavorable for the searchers. There was fog at Point Barrow and a sprinkling of rain all along the Alaska coast. Temperatures along the Arctic circle ranged from 35 to 55 degrees above zero on the ground but no recordings were made at the altitudes the fliers will have to use in crossing the Endicott and other ranges in their search.

Japan Abandons Negotiation Hope In China Crisis

TOKYO, Aug. 20 (AP)—Premier Fumimaro Konoye intimated today that Japan had abandoned all hope of negotiation with China and was determined to beat China to her knees.

Addressing Japanese newspaper correspondents, Prince Konoye said that Japan was compelled to abandon its policy of "non-aggravation" toward China. He said that Japan still desired to settle outstanding issues but felt she must settle alone without intervention of a third party. For that reason, he said, the government considered a settlement for war.

Prince Konoye said that the government still believed that cooperation between China and Japan and Manchukuo was possible. He emphasized that China must expel Communists and said that there was little hope for unification of China if China continued its present activities.
