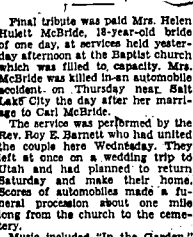

Girls Get Campus Offerings Easier than Men at Iowa U.

IOWA CITY, Ia. (U.P.)—The University of Iowa co-ed sends a better chance of getting a campus job than her male classmate, according to Lee H. Kann, director of the university's employment bureau.

Having just completed a statistical study of the campus employment situation, Kann said he was convinced the co-ed's radically different attitude toward employment, contrasted with that of the average male student, was responsible for her relatively greater success in getting a job.

Results Surprised
"I was frankly surprised at the result of the survey," Kann said. "The male student, I think, is that girls want to be definitely certain of a job before they come to school. Otherwise they won't do it."

"On the other hand, boys are more likely to come on a shoestring. They'll take a chance and begin the school year even though the possibility of getting a job is remote," Kann said.

Girls Choose Work
The employment director bowled the fact that most co-ed applicants seek definite types of employment, such as secretary or office work. Chances of placing that type are limited, but there are plenty of openings for "housework" and few applicants, he pointed out.

Kann's survey showed that nearly 70 per cent of the university's population of 14,000 who applied for work last year, 3,240 applied for employment and 2,308 got it.

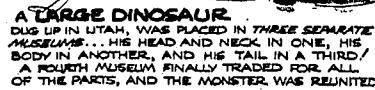

Stalin Faces Crisis But It's Not Fatal

By WEBB MILLER (Copyright, 1937, United Press) MOSCOW, VIA LONDON (UNCENSORED) Sept. 6 (UP)—"Our party is suffering from an attack of measles," Joseph Stalin said grimly 10 years ago.

It might be said today that the communist party is suffering from an attack of scarlet fever—a more serious disease, but one which shows no signs of being fatal.

Stalin is deeply involved in his most momentous internal political crisis since the great struggle with Trotsky, which resulted in the banishment of Stalin's long-haired rival and 1,500 expulsions from the party.

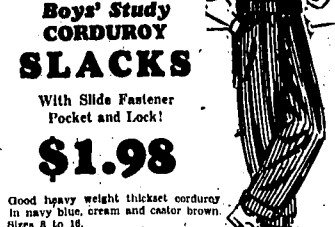
