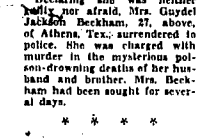

HIGH VOTE SEEN IN SCHOOL RACE

Early Turnout Polls Heavy Balloting in Election of Trustees Here
Indications that balloting will be heavy before the polls close at 7 p. m. today in the Twin Falls school district trustee election, came this afternoon as early voters began flocking to the two polling spots.

Although only a relatively small number of those eligible to vote had cast their ballots in the first 45 minutes, the count averaged one ballot cast every minute. Judges at both Lillooee and Bickel schools had at no time been without voters either receiving, casting or returning ballots since the polls opened at 11 a. m. they stated.

Decision on two three-year trustee posts and one two-year term were to be decided by the district electors. Six nominees were in the field for the three posts, with four men trying for the pair of longer terms and the widow of incumbent and a male rival vying for the two-year position.

BRITAIN, FRANCE READY TO FIGHT ON PIRATE 'SUBS'

Soviet Hits Rome in Blast Bringing Possibility of Severed Relations
DUCE DEFIES ACCUSATION

LONDON, Sept. 7 (U.P.)—Britain and France were determined today to use their combined fleet if necessary to end the submarine menace to shipping, and to force the issue at an international conference in Switzerland next Friday regardless of any objections of Russia, Italy or Germany.

The issue of peace or war in Europe was brought to a head by a Russian note to Rome, accusing Italy of submarine piracy. Italy curtly rejected Russia's demands. In consequence, there were intimations that relations between the two powers might be severed, and that Russia might convey all her merchantmen through the Mediterranean with warships.
