British Cabinet Holds Grave Meeting to Ponder Status in Mediterranean

EVERY POWER INVOLVED

By WEBB MILLER (Copyright, 1937, United Press) LONDON, Sept. 8 (U.P.)—"Pirate" submarines, renewing their bold attacks on merchant ships, add fresh danger today to a Mediterranean crisis that now involves every great power in Europe.

The cabinet, its members more anxious than they had been since the Ethiopian crisis of 1935, met for 2 1/2 hours to deliberate the empire's course. The length of the meeting indicated the gravity of the situation. A second meeting was set for later in the day.

# ROOSEVELT TRIP TO DECIDE SPECIAL SESSION NEED

## PUBLIC FEELING WILL BE TESTED BY F. D. R. TOUR

### Personal Talks With Leaders Throughout Industrial, Farm Area Planned

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Sept. 8 (AP)—Public feeling toward the New Deal's labor and farm programs will be tested by President Roosevelt on his expected trip to the Pacific northwest this month, may decide the special session of congress quiescent.

That was the interpretation given today by Mr. Roosevelt's announced plans for visiting his destination, Astoria, at Seattle, if Chinese-Japanese developments permit.

An "Itake" Trip  
The President himself described the contemplated journey as an "Itake" trip, to give him an opportunity to talk with persons familiar with local sentiment and to study conditions.

The President planned no formal speeches during the 8000-mile west coast trip. He would make rear platform appearances during operating stops of his special train. He customarily invites local party and civic leaders to ride through their territories aboard his private car while he questions them on the thought and sentiment of their sections.

Will Travel Two Routes  
In order to study current public opinion through the country as widely as possible, it was believed Roosevelt would go to Seattle by one route—probably the northern—and come back the other.

That way, the trip would take him through eastern and midwestern industrial centers, the country's farming area, the center of last year's drought, the west coast agricultural land and back to Washington through the south.

## State Organizes Sparrow Search

SYDNEY, N. S. W. (AP)—A lone sparrow is causing so much alarm among western Australian farmers that a statewide hunt has been organized, and a reward offered for the capture, dead or alive, of the bird.

The sparrow in Australia is an imported pest. From the original two, millions of birds now exist. For it has thrived and multiplied in the eastern and even in the central areas of Australia.

But western Australia has kept itself free of it. The great Australian desert, stretching across the heart of the continent, has been the chief barrier against the sparrow, which is classed as prohibited vermin in western Australia.

All the trans-continental trains are closely watched, but one sparrow "stowed away" on a freighter traveling along the coast and escaped when the vessel reached Fremantle.

Wide publicity was given to the unwelcome visitor and committees were formed to hunt for it.

So far no announcement of its capture has been made.

"You are a hell of a good school teacher," commented Sandy.

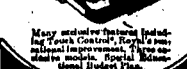
Would Change Setup

## HOLDEN RAPS AT UTILITIES MEET

### National Association Session Accomplished "Nothing," Declares State Head

BOISE, Sept. 8 (AP)—Harry Holden, president of the Idaho public utilities commission, today said a recent session of the National Association of Railroad and Public Utilities Commissioners at Salt Lake City accomplished "nothing."

"The sessions did not accomplish a single forward step in plans for bettering utility rates," he said. "The only controversial matter

which came up, the Fettinghill bill, was tabled, and then the motion urging congress not to pass it was withdrawn."

Holden said a number of states were seriously considering withdrawing from the organization.

Holden charged the association was run by a "small clique."

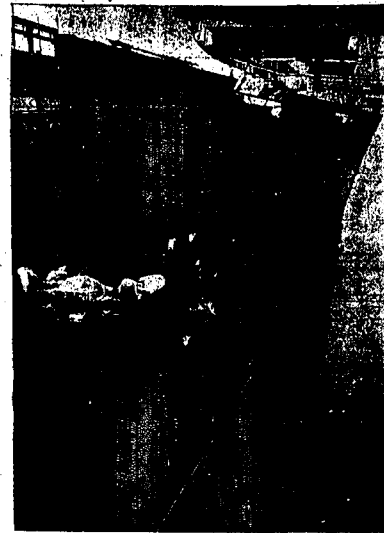
