BRITISH ADMIRAL WARNS JAPANESE LEADER

3 Held for Kentucky Vengeance Slaying of Brig. Gen. Denhardt

Garr Brothers In Jail for Killing Done at Shelbyville

SHELBYVILLE, Ky., Sept. 21 (U.P.)—The three Garr brothers of Oldham county, members of Kentucky's blue grass aristocracy, today were charged with killing Brigadier General Henry H. Denhardt, 61, 11 hours before he was to have gone on trial for the second time, accused of murdering Mrs. Verna Garr Taylor, their sister.

A joint murder warrant was filed against Dr. E. S. Garr, Roy Garr and Jack Garr by Coleman Wright, Shelby county attorney, at almost the hour that Gen. Denhardt, iron man of Kentucky military circles, was to have gone on trial on charges of shooting to death the beautiful 40-year-old widow to whom he was engaged, last Nov. 7.

County Attorney Wright said the Garr brothers probably would be arraigned on the charges contained in the murder warrant and affidavit this Friday.

The warrant was filed after Wright had conferred with county prosecutor H. B. Kinloving and Rodes E. Myers, defense attorney, who was with Denhardt last night when he fell in the street before a fusillade of pistol bullets.

The Garr brothers remained in jail, calmly awaiting whatever fate the courts may decree for them. They surrendered themselves and their weapons to authorities shortly after the shooting.

Attorney Ballard Clarke said earlier that self-defense would be pleaded by the Garr brothers. Clarke said he understood the shots were fired from a pocket, as he was walking toward his hotel last night.

Near Movie Theater The vengeance contemplated in the slaying of the Garr brothers since Denhardt's first trial ended with a "dead-end" move by him to Shelbyville's business intersection—Sixth and Main streets.

Denhardt, who several times had expressed a wish that his brothers intended to "get me," fell dead on the sidewalk.

Myers said Dr. E. S. Garr threatened to kill Myers, and was persuaded by one of his brothers to leave Myers alone.

FOLSOM PRISON DAGGERS FOUND Ryan and Larkin Still Alive Following Sunday's Outbreak

FOLSOM STATE PRISON, Coll., Sept. 21 (U.P.)—Four daggers were found in convicts' cells today in an investigation of Sunday's outbreak in which three men were killed and eight wounded.

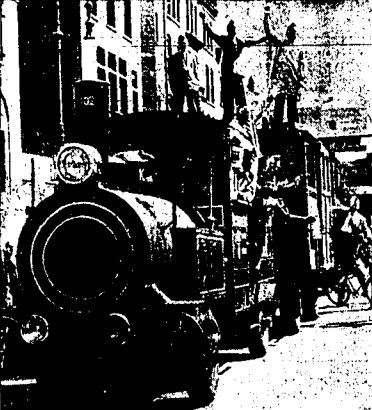

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# STUDENT FOREST TOUR UNDERWAY

### Forty Seniors From U. of I. Now Making 15-Day Trip By Motor Bus

MOSCOW, Sept. 21 (Special)—Forty senior tourists left the Idaho campus for the first day of registration in two chartered motor buses for a 15-day field trip through western Washington and Oregon.

Each man took along a bed roll or sleeping bag, as part of the time they will sleep out in the woods. The trip, an annual one for seniors, is a combination affair to view logging and cutting methods, forest sanitation and possibilities for future growth and management.

First stop for the seniors was in the vicinity of the operations of the Ohio Match company north of Coeur d'Alene, thence by way of Grand Coulee dam, Ellensburg, Wash., to view a petrified forest and Ponderosa pine operation. Half a day will be spent in Rainier national park, among enough time in Tacoma to inspect several wood-using industries.

From Tacoma the seniors will go to Shelton and a Douglas fir logging operation, then to the Olympic national monument, down the coast to Seaside and across to Portland, stopping a half day at the Wind River experiment station at Stevenson, Wash.

FDR TO MAKE FAR WEST TESTING-GROUND FOR COURT PLAN

PRESIDENT WILL BE IN BOISE ON MONDAY, SEPT. 27

No Stops Scheduled Before Reaching Wyoming on Trip to Seattle

BY RICHARD L. HARKNESS... President Roosevelt's decision to make far western states the political testing ground of his between-congress drive for New Deal social-economic-judicial objectives, was revealed today by the starting of his Pacific trip route here tomorrow.

Although Mr. Roosevelt will travel 6,000 miles to Seattle and back all his personal activities except one were scheduled in Wyoming, Idaho, Oregon, Washington, Montana and North Dakota. The exception was Chicago.

The President's itinerary raised questions as to whether he will appear in both Wyoming and Montana, home states of Senator Joseph C. McMahoney and Burton K. Wheeler respectively, and also the administration's supreme court enlargement program.

But Mr. Roosevelt will travel during the night through Nebraska, represented by Senator Edward F. Burke, as well as Montana and Wyoming as his two colleagues.

Starting from here at 4 p. m. (GMT) tomorrow, Mr. Roosevelt's rear platform appearance will be at Cheyenne at 9:30 a. m. (MST) Friday.

Mr. Roosevelt will spend the weekend inspecting Yellowstone national park. Monday he will leave his private car at Boise, Idaho, and motor 75 miles to the Cwyhee reclamation project. Trip plans called for the motor inspection of the journey at the Bonneville, Ore. flood irrigation, and hydro electric project Tuesday. He will arrive at Seattle Friday.

Mr. Roosevelt will spend Wednesday and Wednesday night with his family at Boise, Idaho. Thursday, Mrs. Roosevelt will be in Seattle. Mrs. John Boettger, in Seattle, Ho. will leave American soil Thursday. Sept. 20 to lunch with Lt. Gov. Eric W. Hamber in Victoria, British Columbia.

Friday, Sept. 24: Cheyenne 9:30 a. m. Wendover, 1:45 p. m. Casper, 4:30 p. m. (MST) in Wyoming one hour later at Casper.

Saturday, Sept. 24: Arrive Gardner, early in morning, and detain rear motor trip to Yellowstone national park.

Sunday, Sept. 26: Inspect Yellowstone.

Monday, Sept. 27: Boise, Ida. 9:30 a. m. Leave train and motor to Cwyhee dam 75 miles away. Board train at Ontario station, afternoon after lunching at dam or en route.

THRESHING MACHINE'S REGIME IS TOTTERING

"Up on the hill there's a big red bull. He calls and he eats, but he never gets full."

And that rumbling sound you hear probably is the big red bull belching his swan song.

The threshing machine, which has been recognized king of the harvest on the Twin Falls and Mindoka irrigation projects ever since the beginning of the two tracts, may be on the skids ready for its last ride—blowing its last breath, so to speak. And another machine is waiting to slip into the throne of honor.

A low-cost, economical, and smaller harvesting outfit, the all-harvester, is coming into vogue. Another method is to combine the two machines, a survey showed today. And the stationary separator, pulled from farm to farm by its "one-langer" all-pull tractor, is disappearing from the harvest scene in south-central Idaho.

Slightly larger than an ordinary grain binder, the all-harvester is a combine that farmers are finding both easy to handle and economical to operate. Drawn behind a modern farm tractor, it moves up and down the fields, cutting and threshing grain.

At the present time, it was pointed out, bean growers are finding the all-harvester more profitable than the stationary separator all the way in and showed the old reap hook takes the stand.

See Monopoly... Many farmers see this new combine as the only threshing unit in use in this section of the state in less than a decade.

One Twin Falls threshing machine operator is reported to have said that it is only a matter of a few years until the all-harvester will have moved all the way in and showed the stationary separator all the way out.
