Mr. Szabo was employed in the local CCC spike camp. The couple will live in Ohio.

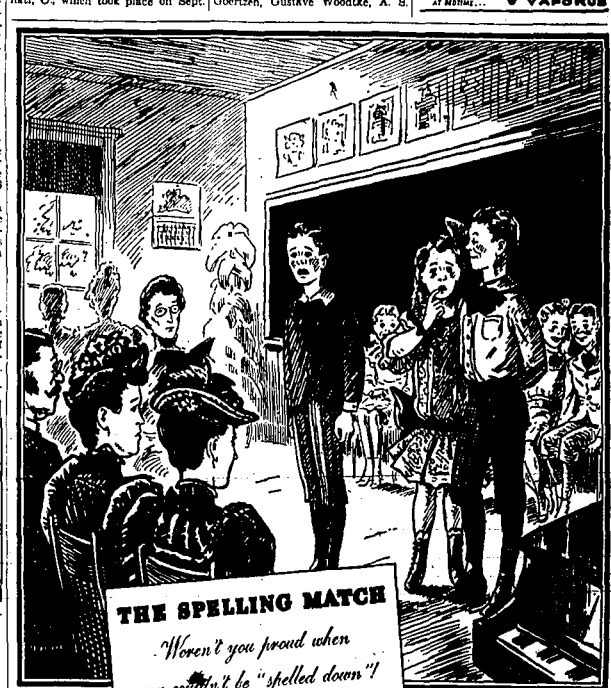

PHOSPHATE MEET OPENS SESSIONS

Two-Day Conference Will Consider Huge Idaho Resources

POCATELLO, Ida., Oct. 8 (UP)—Delegates opened a two-day conference here today to consider location and site of a plant designed to develop Idaho's five billion tons of phosphate deposits into a second Muscle Shoals.

Experts from T. V. A., governors of Utah, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, and Sen. James P. Pope, D., Idaho, led the conference.

Idaho has one third of the world's phosphate deposits. Pope said he wanted to see an experimental plant established near Montpelier where large deposits are available, and test development of the mineral by application of extreme heat.

Development of the state's water power to produce cheap electricity for the plant will be sought by Sen. Pope, it was indicated.

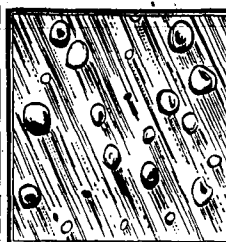
