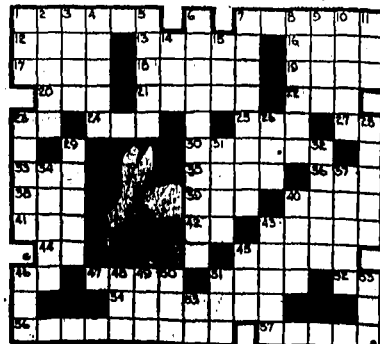

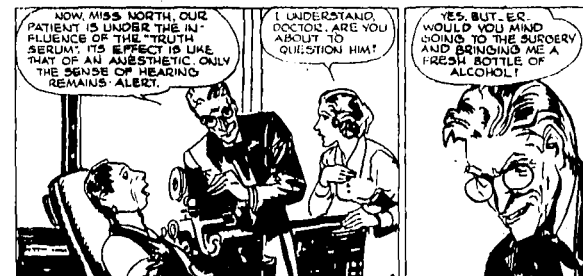

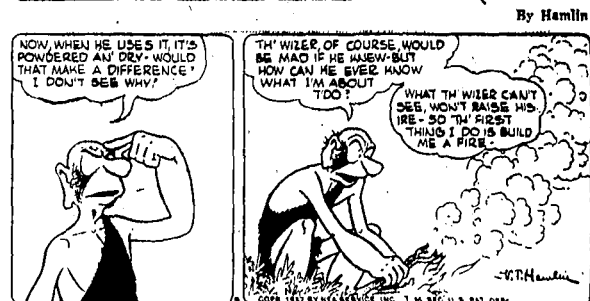

# TVA Man Warns Against Over-Enthusiasm on Phosphate Development

## LAST GATHERING AT GATE CITY IS SET FOR TODAY

Gov. Clark Says Idaho Ready For Hydro-Electric Power And Phosphate Plant

POCATTELLO, Idaho, Oct. 9 (AP)—Delegates from four states and one territory gathered today for the second and final day of a conference called to consider ways and means of developing phosphate deposits, of which 90 per cent of the nation's supply lies in Idaho, Utah, Wyoming and Montana.

Gov. Barzilla Clark of Idaho said he felt Idaho was ready to go ahead with development of hydro-electric power and a phosphate plant.

## Rupert Looks to New City Edifice

Plans Go Forward to Build With Federal Aid

RUPERT, Oct. 9 (Special)—Plans are going forward looking toward early start on erection of a new city building here.

Rupert city council last week voted to accept the government's grant of \$20,000 to apply on the new building.

Bonds for the structure were approved two months ago as citizens bailed on the \$30,000 issue and the site was acquired recently.

When completed the edifice will house the city offices, library and council chamber. The structure will be 75 by 140 feet and will be located on F and Seventh streets.

According to government requirements the work must be started not later than Dec. 1 and the building completed by Aug. 1, 1938.

## BOOKS OPEN FOR BOND ELECTION

Registrations Being Taken at City Hall For Projects Vote Set Nov. 9

Registration for the city bond election which will be held Nov. 9 opened today at the city hall with one registration being received, and that not for the bond election.

Frances M. Guntenshouer, who was the only person to register, explained to City Clerk W. H. Eldridge that because she was not a city taxpayer she could not vote in the bond election, but wanted to register just to see how the vote in the next city election, which is permissible.

On Nov. 9 taxpayers will vote on three proposed local projects, being permitted to vote for or against each or all of them. They include a storage basin in connection with the city water supply, a new library building and a program calling for surfacing of a majority of the city streets.

Registrations will be taken, Eldridge said this afternoon, each work day from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. with the addition of two hours on the evenings of Thursday, Friday and Saturday preceding the election.

Of the city's many 5,000 registered voters, only a little more than 2,000 will be eligible to vote in the bond election, since these are taxpayers.

## YOUTH HELD FOR EMMETT MURDER

Audel Robnett, Kansas Young Man, to Face Charge Of Killing Girl

EMMETT, Ida., Oct. 9 (AP)—Audel Robnett, 21, Kansas City, Kan., youth, stood accused today of the murder of Anna Jean Phillips, 15 year old school girl, during a drinking party near Ola Tuesday.

The girl was shot through the heart with a bullet from an automatic, purchased by Robnett from a Boise pawnbroker the day before the shooting.

Eight hours after Robnett "borrowed" a car from the Davidson Motor company in Boise and bought three bottles of orange juice, he drove up to the ranch home of Charles Griffith, near Ola.

In the back seat of the car was the nude body of Miss Phillips. Scattered around the interior of the car were school books and clothing. Robnett, placed through the lungs, told officers summoned by the Griffith family that he had been accidentally shot while putting up a target and that the girl had then shot herself.

But examination of his wound and the wound above the girl's heart showed deep powder burns, and officers concluded the gun was fired both times at close range.

They said the gun was probably held a foot from the girl's breast, and was almost pressed against Robnett's body when it was fired to wound him.

From his conclusions, they drew a charge of murder against the lad and alleged that he killed the girl and then tried to commit suicide.

Considered Suicide A letter found in his possession, written to the sister in Kansas City, said the youth had "considered" suicide.

He told officers the girl had asked him to marry her but that he had refused, because he "didn't have the money."

An autopsy on the girl's body showed evidence of illicit relationship with the youth, but no evidence of a mother.

Robnett said he had known the girl since June when he met her at a cherry festival at Emmett.

Friends of the girl said she was "well developed" for her age.

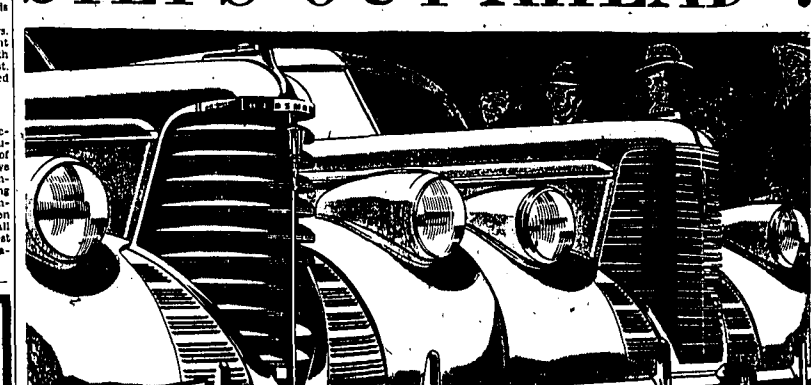
