JAPANESE PLANES ATTACK BRITISH CARS

Assassin's Bullet Ends Career Of U. S. Consul General in Syria

J. Theodore Marriner Murdered by Armenian

BEIRUT, Syria, Oct. 12 (UP)—J. Theodore Marriner, 45, American consul general and one of the most brilliant members of the United States diplomatic service was assassinated today by an Armenian to whom the consulate general had refused permission to visit the United States.

Special Session

The assassin was held on a murder charge. Police said there had been several cases of insanity in his family. Marriner, in his motor car, was driving through a narrow crooked street of the ancient city when the assassin fired from a doorway with a revolver. He died instantly. Marriner's chauffeur leaped from the car and caught the assassin. Persons nearby joined him and the Armenian was beaten severely by police arrived, rescued him and took him to prison.

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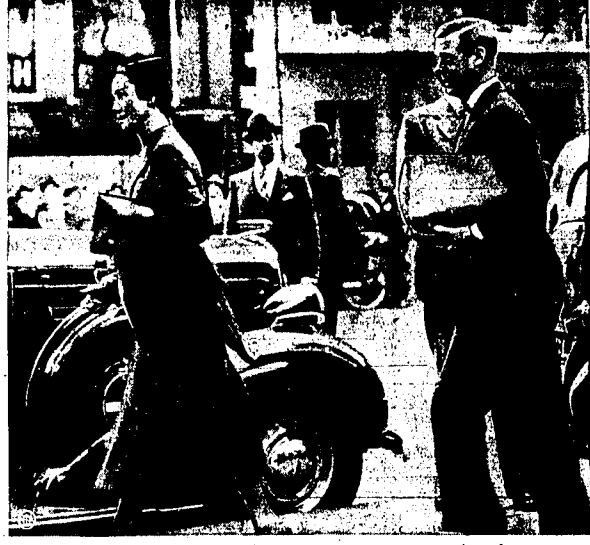

By JOHN E. MORRIS SHANGHAI, Oct. 12 (UP)—Three motor cars carrying attaches of the British embassy and a Soviet consulate car were attacked and machine-gunned by airplanes today on the Nanking-Shanghai road.

The Soviet consulate announced that a Japanese plane turned a machine gun on a consulate car which went out to pick up Leonid Shabor, secretary of the military attaché, who had been with the British party.

BRITISH URGE FRENCH FRONTIER OPENING, REPORT SAYS

SOURCE CLAIMS ENGLAND WANTS AID FOR LOYALS

Assertion May Cause Another Crisis: Great Britain's Backing to Be Asked

By RALPH HEINZEN (Copyright, 1937, United Press)

PARIS, Oct. 12 (U.P.)—Responsible quarters said today that the British government was exerting extreme pressure on France to open the Spanish frontier at once to permit a full flow of men and munitions to the loyalists.

It is asserted that France has been urged strongly to withdraw her troops from the Spanish zone and to declare the frontier wide open.

France and Britain seem agreed that Italy must be forced completely to evacuate the Spanish zone.

He was born in Portland, Me., May 17, 1892. A graduate of Dartmouth and Harvard, his first diplomatic post was at the legation at Stockholm as secretary. Then he went to Bucharest as secretary, and was among the special United States envoys at the marriage of King Carol and Princess Helene in 1922.

Next, Marriner was detailed to duty in the eastern European division of the state department at Washington from 1922 to 1926. Thence he was sent to Bern as secretary of the legation and there he was secretary to the American delegation to the Geneva disarmament commission meetings in 1926 and 1927.

Marriner became charge d'affaires in Switzerland and acting head of an important committee on the committee. He went to Paris as a member of the United States delegation for the signing of the Briand-Kellogg pact in 1928.

Returned to Washington. Returning to Washington, Marriner headed the important western European division.

In 1931 Marriner was made counselor of the embassy at Paris. When American Ambassador Walter Edinger retired in 1933, Marriner became charge d'affaires, the youngest man since Monroe was minister to Paris since the United States was established.

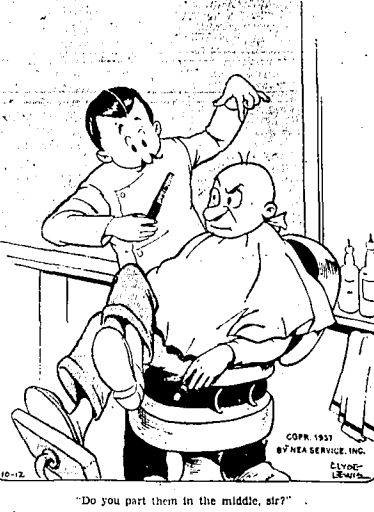

MINISTERS BACK LAW ENFORCING

Clergymen Support Agreements Fighting Violation; Stress Liquor Control

Through support of south central Idaho clergymen in the Snake River Ministerial association had been extended today to officers and agents of the law in their fight against liquor control.

Seven resolutions giving endorsement to the clergymen were announced by a special committee of the association. The resolutions were adopted by the members of the association here Oct. 4. "That the members of this association, through their local ministerial associations, urge strict and consistent enforcement of state and local laws by city and county enforcement officers; particularly as regards the operation of all gambling houses, and the operation of vehicles by those who are under the influence of liquor."

"That members of this association ask for the support of their congregations in arousing public opinion in favor of enforcement of all such laws and cooperating with law enforcement officers."

"Publicity urged."

"That the members of the state be urged to continue to give extensive publicity to violation of all laws of this kind; and to indicate to the public by their own responsible actions or criminal offenses, so that people may be made aware of how often intoxicating liquors are responsible for death and serious injury."

"That the state legislators be urged to continue to give their attention to the present abuses."

"That the Snake River Ministerial association, as a group, offer their prayers and encouragement to all groups working for the enforcement of the law."

"That the secretary of this association send a copy of this report to the newspapers of this district; and to the chairman of law enforcement commission."

CLARK SAYS HE WILL NOT ENTER IN CONTROVERSY

Minority Report States Lava Hot Springs Not Good Site For Institution

BOISE, Oct. 12 (AP)—Gov. Saml Clark said today that he did not intend to enter the whirl of protest arising over selection of Lava Hot Springs as a site for the state's new tuberculosis hospital.

"That's up to the committee," the governor said. "As I see it, every part of the state which had a probable site for the hospital is complaining. The committee had full power to make a selection and had done so."

A minority report written by Dr. R. W. Nourse, Boise, and Mrs. R. and Hodges, Moscow, members of the tuberculosis hospital committee, severely criticized selection of Lava Hot Springs as the place for the sanitarium.

"Most Excellent!" On the other hand, the majority of the five-man committee, headed by Dr. Alexander Barclay, Coeur d'Alene, said the site chosen was "most excellent."

On one point the objections seemed to define themselves as a conflict of medical theories as compiled by Dr. Barclay said the altitude of Lava was one of the deciding factors in making the selection.

Dr. Nourse said the place was "too high" and subject to "bad dust storms" during the summer.

General complaints were that "by no means" did the selection fall within requirements of the bill which authorized the hospital.

"Isolated, remote," Specifically, objections were that Lava Hot Springs is "isolated and remote, unavailable for proper surgical consultation, devoid of intellectual or cultural advantages, too much of a distance from the city to be readily reached in winter."

Dr. Arthur Jones, Boise, president of the State Medical Society, said the committee was "incomplete" and W. Taylor for an opinion to determine if Lava Hot Springs is definitely located, a requirement of the legislative act creating the institution.

"The town is on the main line of a railroad, and another requirement of the act."

Just what action can be taken is not known. The bill empowered the committee with "full and complete authority" to make a decision, and that decision has been made.

If the majority wanted, the committee could recommend the site.
