Assassin's Bullet Ends Career Of U.S. Consul General in Syria

J. Theodore Marriner Murdered by Armenian

BEIRUT, Syria, Oct. 12 (U.E.—J. Theodore Marriner, 45, American consul general and one of the most brilliant members of the United States diplomatic service, was assassinate today by an Armenian to whom the consulate general had refused permission to visit the United States.

The assassin was held on a murder charge. Police said there had been several cases of insanity in his family.

Marriner, in his motor car, was driving through a narrow crooked street of the ancient city when the assassin fined from a doorway with a revolver. He died instantly.

Marriner's chaufteur leaped from the car and caught the assassin.


