33 DEAD AFTER COAL MINE BLAST

Maddened Youth Kills Doctor and Wife Only One Survivor Out Of 34 in Section When Southern Pit Explodes

EASTERN BOY, 18, FOUND SITTING IN CAR WITH BODIES

Cruising Radio Officer Picks Up Youngster Asleep at Wheel in New Jersey

NORTH ARLINGTON, N. J., Oct. 16 (UP)—Police found in an automobile today the bodies of a man and a woman. The driver, an 18-year-old boy, said he had murdered them in South Paris, Mo.—the man Wednesday, the woman Thursday.

The bodies were identified as those of Dr. J. G. Littlefield and his wife, a leading physician of the hamlet of South Paris, near Bangor, Me. The slayer was Paul Dwyer, one of the doctor's patients. He said he had killed the doctor because he wanted to rob him. His motives for killing the doctor's wife were vague.

A cruising radio car noticed a young man parked at the curb early today and stopped on the front seat, his feet propped up on the dashboard. The policeman approached, thinking the driver, a late evening drunk to his home, was the first thing they saw was the sole of the youth's shoes were worn through. WPA Men Must Accept Jobs--Lane

Director of Employment Federal Agency Tells Men to Take Posts

Complying with regulations of the Washington office, WPA workers will be required to accept employment in private industry when employment is offered at the standard wage for that particular industry in the community, Roy C. Lane, director of employment, said today at a meeting with WPA workers at headquarters in the city hall.

Lane, announced to the Evening "Times" that WPA workers either man or woman, refuse employment in any private industry at the going wage for such employment, and sufficient definite information regarding such refusal is received in the area office from persons or agencies tendering such employment, the cases of such refusal will be definitely closed," Lane said.

Labor Shortage. "As there is a shortage of labor in the potato, apple and beet harvest fields at the present time, the cases of all workers accepting employment in the harvest fields will be held open until such employment is no longer available," Lane continued.

WPA laborers are subject to assignment by the United States Employment service and, therefore, contact should be maintained with the service offices, where employment of labor apply for such labor as is required to fill their needs. Farmers also may make personal requests for labor on the employment project, of the project farmer supervisor, where the services of the employment office is not available.

A great shortage of harvest workers is noted in the Twin Falls and surrounding districts. Estimates, reports by the employment service, indicate that approximately 600 men and women are needed immediately, even now, because local labor has been "holding back" as regards acceptance of field work, it has been necessary to contact the Pocatello and Boise offices asking for more men and women.

U. S. Accepts Bid To Conference of 9-Power Signers

Norman H. Davis, Ambassador-at-Large, to Represent America at Meeting

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (UP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull announced today the United States government's acceptance of an invitation to attend the meeting of the nine-power pact signatories at Brussels, Oct. 30.

Hull said that the United States would be represented by Norman H. Davis, American ambassador-at-large. The invitation to attend the conference of the treaty signatories, with a view to ending the undeclared Sino-Japanese war, was received from the Belgian government today.

Invitation Accepted. This government is accepting the invitation from the Belgian government and its degrading as its delegate Mr. Norman H. Davis, Hull announced.

Davis, with his advisers, is expected to sail for Brussels the middle of next week. Signatories of the nine-power pact agreed to guarantee the territorial and political integrity of China.

Davis will have as his advisors Dr. Stanley Hornbeck, far eastern advisor to the secretary of state; Robert T. Pell, press officer; and Charles E. Bohlen, secretary of the delegation.

U. S. to Mediate. The invitation, it was explained, does not make clear whether only signatories or also "adherents" will attend the consultations. Hull said the agenda is undetermined so far as he knows. President Roosevelt, in stating this government's position said it would seek to "mediate" the far eastern conflict.

Growers Get Final Beet Cash Tuesday

Payment of \$60,753 Boosts 1936 Crop Near Two Million

Final payment on the 1936 sugar beet crop, bringing to \$1,876,173.82 the amount paid growers of the Idaho district for last year's operations, will be made on Tuesday, Oct. 19, when checks are mailed from the local headquarters, it was announced this afternoon by R. H. Tallman, Idaho district manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company.

Total of the payments to be made per Tuesday, records show, will be \$60,753. Payments by districts will be: Burley-Rupert, north side, \$11,210; Burley-Rupert, north side, \$11,210; Twin Falls, south side, \$22,393; Twin Falls, north side, \$7,624; Gooding district, \$1,244; Richfield district, \$1,214; Weiser district, \$2,265.

DUCE AGREES TO WITHDRAWAL OF SOME OF TROOPS

Acceptance of Proposal Is Expected to Help Solve European Crisis

BY RICHARD D. MCMILLAN LONDON, Oct. 16 (UP)—Italy agreed today to partial withdrawal of foreign volunteers from both sides in the Spanish Civil war.

The agreement was expected to go far towards solving the crisis caused by Premier Benito Mussolini's previous refusal to discuss withdrawing volunteers with Britain and France. The compromise was reached at a secret session of the "chairman's sub-committee" of the non-intervention committee of 27 nations.

Italy Accepts. Dino Grandi, Italian ambassador to London, told the sub-committee: "I am authorized by my government to state that Fascist Italy accepts the proposal for partial withdrawal of a certain number of volunteers in equal quantity from both sides as a substitute for the application of the British plan and the condition fixed by the plan itself."

British plan, backed by the French, was understood to provide: Withdraw 5,000. An immediate "token" withdrawal of at least 5,000 volunteers from both sides. A commitment to supervise the progressive withdrawal of remaining volunteers.

CHINESE VILLAGE IS SET ON FIRE

Sixty Japanese Planes Move To New Port After Burning City

MULGA, Ala., Oct. 16 (UP)—The bodies of 33 men were found in the Woodward iron company's coal mine, which was partly wrecked by an underground explosion today, Robert M. Marshall, vice-president of the company, announced.

Only one of the 34 workers on the level where the blast occurred was saved. Ivan Fox, miner, was taken to the Bessemer hospital suffering from burns and gas. Rescue crews brought the last of the bodies of the victims to the surface shortly after 9 a. m., and Robert M. Marshall, vice-president of the Woodward company, announced officially that the disaster's toll was 33 dead and one injured.

The explosion wrecked but one level of the shaft shaft. About 500 other workers fled to safety after the explosion.

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SHANGHAI, Oct. 16 (UP)—The densely populated village of Tung-chang in Foochow was in flames tonight after Japanese planes descended the Yangtze river and turned heavy artillery on the section.

Sixty Japanese planes took off from the airport for Woorung where a new landing field has been established. The planes were seen to be on the ground at Tung-chang.

Japanese troops tried to force their way across Woorung creek, Chinese soldiers asserted. In an effort to take the village of Miao-chang, they were driven back by the Chinese, said, but in addition to heavy casualties they lost more than 20 machine guns and 100 rifles.

It was admitted that Chinese as well as Japanese losses were severe in a hand to hand fight at Chung-ho, where the Japanese were trying to reach Tzang. Here also, Chinese asserted, the Japanese were thrown back.

REBELS CAPTURE 31 MORE TOWNS

Twenty-Four Hour Drive Nets Big Gain in Spanish Civil War

HENDAYE, French-Spanish Frontier, Oct. 16 (UP)—Spanish nationalist authorities asserted today that their men had captured 31 villages in 24 hours in their drive toward Gijon, last large loyalist seaport on the Bay of Biscay.

Moving speedily, the nationalists took the important communications center of Trinidad, on the front, and believed themselves to be in excellent position not only for the final drive on Gijon but to advance simultaneously on Oviedo, the nearby mining center, and the port of Villa Velosa.

Loyalist authorities at Madrid asserted that their airplanes severely bombed nationalist troop concentrations on the Aragon or northeast front and destroyed a train on the railroad between Teruel and Zaragoza. It was asserted that one German airplane also shot down and one of the German crew captured.

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three nurses and two doctors. But for some reason, they did not come to visit her. And somebody was sending expensive baskets of flowers without cards. Miss England drove to the hospital Wednesday in a large automobile that was tilted and upside, unbraked. She said she had a "kiss theory." Physicians saw at once that she was in the advanced stages of mercurial poisoning. It is one of the most lingering and agonizing deaths and few have ever returned from the poison. It destroys the body tissues, in a slow but certain process of disintegration.

## WILL TAKE POTATO SURPLUS OUT OF MARKET

### Eight States Picked Among Those to Receive Help; Programs Mapped

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The federal surplus commodities corporation announced plans today to receive 25,000,000 bushels of surplus potatoes from regular commercial channels.

The corporation will purchase potatoes under three marketing orders announced by the agricultural adjustment administration.

Purchases will be made in Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, Colorado, Nebraska, Wyoming and Idaho. The orders become effective Oct. 15.

Plans for three potato diversion programs to go into effect as soon as arrangements can be completed follow:

1. Diversion of potatoes grading U. S. No. 2 or better into manufacture of potato starch and flour.
2. Feeding potatoes to livestock will be encouraged by diversion of payments upon low grade potatoes either under the U. S. No. 2 or better into manufacture of potato starch and flour.
3. Continued purchase by the FPC in local markets for resale to stock raisers and farmers for distribution to the needy.

The order does not affect Maine potatoes since growers in that region rejected the marketing agreement proposed at a referendum last November.

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## BUHL RESTRAINED ON BEER PERMIT

### Court Orders City to Halt Move For Revocation of Thomey License

Buhl's city officials were under attack today for their action to move for revocation of the beer license held by Henry Thomey, Jr., for his establishment at 111 N. Broadway.

Judge J. W. Porter granted the alternative writ of prohibition asked by Thomey, who is fighting an order issued Oct. 11 by the Buhl city council, instructing him to appear at a hearing next Tuesday on cancellation of his beer permit.

The district court will set 10 a. m. Oct. 29 as date of a hearing at which Buhl must show cause why the temporary writ should not be made permanent.

The case may form a test of statewide interest on the question as to whether or not municipalities have the power under Idaho law to revoke licenses which they have previously granted. Thomey's attorney—Paul S. Boyd of Buhl and Chapman and Chapman, Twin Falls—contend in their petition to the court that Buhl does not have a beer permit "retroactive duty issued."

The order issued last Monday by the Buhl council directed that Thomey's beer license be revoked and his father, Henry Thomey, Sr., and A. E. Mulliner, owner of the premises.

Cites Six Reasons

It cited six reasons for the decision to cancel the beer license.

Thomey is selling beer to those under 18, selling intoxicating liquor, selling beer between midnight and 8 a. m., selling to persons under the influence of intoxicating liquor, and failure to maintain a quiet and orderly place and obtaining of the license by fraud and misrepresentation.

Thomey's district court fight against the move names the city of Buhl, Mayor Carl L. Thompson, and Councilmen H. A. DeNail and Grand Miller.

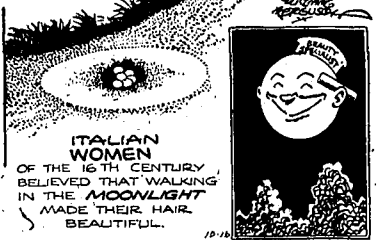

Don't you see the eighth wonder of the world? Here's what happened.  
Started by Quake  
About three years ago, we had a small earthquake. It was a tremor opened in queer cracks. And this

my farm started sinking right into the earth.  
I ran to the house and told my wife. She looked at me sort of acquiescent and then took her chair to see if the elder barrel was empty.

You can't actually see any land moving. It goes very slow. But you can hear it. And in one week 16 acres sank 100 feet. And in two weeks it was down 300 feet.  
It sure looked bad.  
Scientific men rushed in from all over. They said, "Don't worry, Mr. Robertson. It'll be all right. The land will be mighty right again."  
That certainly cheers me up.

Call From London  
But before that my neighbors all came over. One calls came in from all over. One call was from London. England. Then a drove of reporters showed up.  
I had to fence off part of it so they wouldn't fall in. And what's left was all trampled down.  
Now, I'm a patient man, but that was too much.  
I had to do something. So I built an observation tower and started selling tickets at a quarter a head. Why don't you listeners come out and see my sinking farm. But you'd better hurry because it may sink through the China.

## VATICAN NEUTRAL IN CHINESE WAR

Prelates Indignant at Rumor Of Favoring Japan Over Communism in China

VATICAN CITY, Oct. 16 (UP)—The Holy See has been, and remains, strictly neutral in the conflict between Japan and China, and presents dispatches circulated abroad that the Vatican has instructed its missionaries in the far east to take sides with Japan against Communism in China.

The church's position was officially stated by the highest Vatican authorities to be that the Holy See is opposed to Communism, as proclaimed by the Pope; that the church, through its representatives in China and Japan, as well as other countries, will combat Communist tendencies; but that no memorandum was sent to the far east advising Vatican representatives to support Japan.

Prelate after prelate declared that reports of the dispatch of such a document were ridiculous.  
Cardinal Pomaoni—Zionist, prefect of the Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith, one of the highest offices of the church, announced through his secretary, Father Heintz:  
"There is absolutely no foundation for this rumor."  
Monsignor Dominico Tardini, assistant secretary of state, said indignantly:  
"It is not true; there is absolutely nothing in it."
