They were not alone. From Twin Falls these 40 youngsters who entered the competition for 60 prizes donated by local merchants as a feature of "Twin Falls days" boys and girls traveled here from many rural routes from Piler and from Buhl just to enter.

### ADULT EDUCATION GOES TO BURLEY

Night Classes in Twin Falls Definitely Abandoned; Facilities Lacking

Adult education night classes in Twin Falls were definitely abandoned here to Burley today.

The classes, sponsored in Twin Falls for the past three years by the WPA and the state department of public instruction, have been finally abandoned here and will open at the Cassia county seat Monday under Mrs. J. Clifford of Twin Falls, R. F. Brown, assistant state supervisor of the program, said here this afternoon.

Fate of the WPA nursery school tugs in the balance today as Mrs. J. Johnson, local director, made last-minute efforts to arrange a building and to secure donations of fuel.

Discontinuance of the adult education classes was made because sufficient quarters could not be secured through Twin Falls school officials or county commissioners, the area assistant supervisor announced.

Loss of both the adult classes and the nursery school will mean losing a monthly payroll of \$1,500, according to Mrs. J. W. Briland, local director of adult education.

2,000 ATTEND AS FETE AT BURLEY GETS UNDER WAY

20 More Ships Expected to Take Part in State's Biggest Show

BURLEY, Oct. 23 (Special)—20 planes from over four states on the field by noon and from 15 to 20 more ships scheduled to arrive before tonight, the first annual air meet of the Idaho Pilots' association, being staged today and Sunday at the municipal airport here, opened with "perfect" flying weather greeting the visiting airmen.

Speeding Auto Falls to Make Curve, Strikes Obvert Near Burley

BURLEY, Oct. 23 (Special)—Two men were instantly killed near here today as their motor car smashed headlong into a bridge after failing to negotiate a curve.

The fatal crash occurred about 1:30 a. m. four miles south and seven miles east of Burley. The approach to the bridge here follows a gentle curve after a stretch of straight road.

When the car struck the bridge, which spans the right-hand canal, the entire south side railing was torn off, the car bounced back and hit the west bank of the canal and then headed for the bridge.

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### Former Editor of Post Passes

George H. Lorimer, Head of Famous Magazine, Dies in Pennsylvania

WYNNOTE, Pa., Oct. 23 (UP)—George Horace Lorimer, 69, former editor of the Saturday Evening Post and a pioneer in modern magazine technique, died of pneumonia last night at his 1,100-acre "King's Oak" home.

His sons, Graeme and Burford, were at his bedside. He is survived also by his widow, and former Alma V. Smith of Chicago. He had been ill several weeks.

Lorimer left the Post Jan. 1, 1937, after having been its editor-in-chief for 37 years. He had built it up from a general, colorless journal with a circulation of approximately 1,800 to a five-cent weekly with more than 3,000,000 readers.

His world's biggest magazine job, and in 1935 his salary was \$100,000 a year. It was succeeded by Wesley Winans Stout, who had been associate editor since 1924.

Washington Sees F. D. R. Move to Abandon 'Hands Off' Labor Policy

ROOSEVELT MAY CONSIDER PART IN PEACE PACT

Secretary of Labor States She Will Have No Active Interest in Meeting

By C. L. SULZBERGER

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (UP)—President Roosevelt may give his "hands off" policy in the current labor civil war if any progress is made at Monday's peace conference between the American Federation of Labor and the Committee for Industrial Organization, it was reported here today.

The administration has been believed that the President and other administration officers have resolved against any part in the preliminary peace conference.

At present leaders on both sides of the dispute are pessimistic regarding the outcome of the conference.

Might Send Message

It was believed that the President might send a message to the conference at a later stage in the negotiations should it appear that a "round off" peace conference is possible.

Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins said she would refrain from active participation in the meeting.

"I think they are well able to take care of themselves," she said. "I shall not send them a message."

The administration has more than usual interest in labor peace. This stems from three problems:

1. Budget balancing plans.

2. The possibility of many cases from jurisdictional disputes between the C. I. O. and the A. F. of L. in the next year.

3. The prospect of additional strikes in the next year.

Administration officials are responsible for a lag in tax receipts.

Treasury Heads to Get Choice Between New Taxes or Deficit

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (UP)—A choice between new taxes or a 1937-38 term relief treasury deficit of \$1.000,000,000 confronted the treasury today as budget statisticians searched the results for fiscal year.

President Roosevelt's Oct. 19 budget summation, in which he proposed a balanced budget was abandoned for this year, did not disclose any idle revenue which might finance a \$1,000,000,000 loan program.

An item of \$100,000,000 allocated to cotton loans was reported among the unretained expenditures in this fiscal year which contributed to the prospect of a deficit of \$200,000,000 or more when the year ends on June 30, 1938.

The Roosevelt-Wallace ever-normal granary plan of farm relief and commodity supply stabilization will cost from \$700,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000.

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Colored Metals May Be New Feature In Development of House Decorating

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 23 (UP)—Colored metals running the full chromatic scale of the rainbow may be the next fundamental development in decoration, the American Society for Metals was told today.

The color would not be in surface paint or lacquer to scratch and peel, but would be in the outer layer of a metal itself. The forecast was based on the findings of C. B. F. Young, instructor in chemical engineering at Columbia university.

"A dead white coating can be produced on aluminum," Young told the society in the closing session of its 12th annual convention. "It is possible to dye these coatings by immersing them in a suitable colored organic or inorganic solution."

These colored compounds thus formed are integral parts of the metal. The chemicals used are cheap, non-poisonous and the process is completed in about 15 minutes.

"Chromium may be colored black, brown or green. Copper is rather easy to color black, brown, blue, green, golden yellow, red yellow and other shades."

Iron and steel can be colored by heat treating."
