#### New York Gives Mayor Big Edge For Re-election

**DeWey Wins For Prosecutor; C. I. O. Detroit Ticket Meets Defeat**

Two results stood out today in the counting of votes in yesterday's off-year elections in 16 states—the collapse of Tammany hall as a power in New York City and the defeat of John L. Lewis' committee for industrial organization in its first concerted effort to win control of a major city government.

Mayor Fiorello H. La Guardia became the first "reform" mayor in New York's history to succeed himself. He overpowered his Tammany-Democratic opponent, Jeremiah T. Mahoney, and carried his running mate, including the youthful "track-events" Thomas A. Dewey, to an overwhelming victory.

The C. I. O. lost its fight to make Philip B. Clifton, Democrat, mayor of Detroit, and failed to place any of its candidates on the nine-member city council. The new mayor, Edward W. Kelly, Democrat, the belated support of the American Federation of Labor. Despite the reverse, William M. Gurnea, president of the United Automobile Workers, C. I. O. affiliate, said that the returns showed that a "new social order" has entered the city's political life.

Loss in Ohio  
The C. I. O. and A. F. of L. fought side by side for mayoralty elections in Akron and Canton, O., but both lost both sides of the republican counter-faction. The C. I. O. secured partial credit for the re-election of Mayor Cornelius D. Soule, Democrat at 7,500 out of 10,000 in the majority election. # Maine Takes Spud Business by Idaho Failure to Advertise, Grower Says

## Marshall Seeks Resumption of State Publicity

While Idaho marks time and its vegetable advertising campaign is in the doldrums because of legal difficulties, Maine's potato growers "are pushing ahead and taking eastern business right out from under our noses," Joe P. Marshall, member of the Idaho advertising commission and vice-president of the National Potato Growers association, charged here this afternoon.

Main growers, through chain store contracts, have "jumped the price of Maine potatoes 38 cents a barrel in two weeks," Marshall said. In the meantime, he pointed out, Idaho spud prices slumped to as low as 55 cents a hundred pounds in Twin Falls.

The vegetable advertising act has become inoperative pending legal test. Atty. Gen. J. W. Taylor ruled the act unconstitutional. Idaho supreme court test which might clear the law and enable the commission to go ahead has not yet reached the high tribunal.

"Losing Millions" "The test of the act hasn't reached the court yet, and growers are losing millions," Marshall said today. "The matter ought to be pressed to conclusion so that the law, if held legal by the court, can get into action again. We need that advertising resumed."

Eastern chain stores which had been boosting Idaho potatoes "have dropped that effort because the advertising by the state has stopped," Marshall asserted.

One chain group executive claims that his concern increased its sales of early Idaho spuds through the summer by 108 per cent because of the state's advertising program. In conjunction with the chain's own publicity, the Idaho "spud king" said. He declared he has the commission available for inspection.

The concern which reported the 108 per cent gain in sale of early Idaho spuds, according to the letter in Mr. Marshall's possession, was the Kroger Grocery and Baking company of Cincinnati, O., one of the largest chain stores of the United States.
