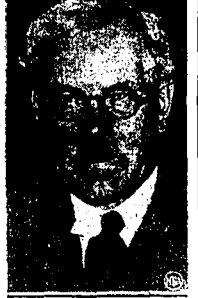

MORGENTHAU MAY TELL OF SPENDING PLANS TONIGHT

TREASURY HEAD, SEN. BYRD SPEAK BEFORE ACADEMY

Subject to Be "Government Expenditure"; Program Will Be Broadcast

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (UP)—The first authoritative intimation of President Roosevelt's spending plans to cope with the present business recession is expected tonight in an address by Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr.

Morgenthau and Sen. Harry P. Byrd, Va., will speak in New York before the Academy of Political Science. Their subject will be "government expenditure." Advance copies of Morgenthau's speech is that it will deal with future as well as past spending and the problem of balancing the budget.

These two men are fairly representative of the disputing elements now striving for control of the New Deal-Democratic party. Cleavage is most evident on questions of spending, taxation and federal incursions into fields of regulation and operation hitherto occupied by private industry.

To Be Broadcast
S. Parker Gilbert, a partner of J. P. Morgan and Company, will preside at the Academy dinner. Byrd will speak at 7 p. m. (MST), to be followed immediately by Morgenthau at 7:30 p. m. Both addresses will be broadcast.

Morgenthau's discussion comes during a series of White House conferences at which Mr. Roosevelt is attempting to coordinate his hopes for balancing the budget with conditions which apparently demand acceleration of the scale of spending.

The decision confronting Mr. Roosevelt is whether to adopt another big "pump priming" program of government expenditure or to attempt to maneuver business and finance into private spending operations which would quicken business activity.

Some of Mr. Roosevelt's usually influential advisers are urging the latter course. Notable among them are Chairman Jesse Jones of the reconstruction finance corporation and Marinier S. Eccles of the federal reserve board.

PALESTINE GETS MILITARY COURTS

JERUSALEM, Nov. 10 (UP)—Military courts were established today, to become operative November 16, to deal summarily with disturbances of order.

The decree authorizing the courts to act came one day after the killing of five Jews near the Klyatskya quarters here.

Arab workers were removed from Jewish quarters in the city under police protection to prevent retaliation.

Twelve Arabs were arrested on suspicion of complicity in the murder. Three of them were trailed by police dogs—while airplanes hovered protectively overhead—to the village of Yfatot from the quarters.

IRRIGATING ENDS OVER THIS AREA

Only Few Farmers Are Using Water at Present Time, Report Shows

Irrigation activities for the present season have practically ended with the exception of a few farmers, who, because of the lack of frost, are watering cultivated ground now rather than waiting until spring.

Reason for some farmers irrigating at the present time, it was explained, is that the ground below more pliable, soaks up the water. At the same time the report from Grandall shows two of the three principal reservoirs are holding back less water at the present time than they did on the same date a year ago.

Twin Falls county's auditor and county office, known to be the only such office in the state which shows a profit and not a deficit, maintained its ranking for the first six months of 1937, according to a semi-annual county audit report received from Middleton, Mo. & company, Boise.

State Receipts Show Gain Over 4 Million

BOISE, Nov. 10 (UP)—At the end of the third quarter of 1937, the state of Idaho had taken in cash receipts totaling \$4,870,701, more than it had received for the same period in 1936, State Auditor Harry O. Parsons reported today.

In his quarterly report, the auditor showed that cash receipts until Sept. 30 this year had reached a sum of \$1,083,815, compared to a last year's total of \$1,232,023. In total available cash, the state was almost \$1,000,000 richer than it was last year. Total funds available were listed this year at \$24,217,500, while in 1936, the total was \$17,692,070.

Cash Balance Higher
The auditor's cash balance, as reconciled with the state treasurer's account, was \$4,343,047, as compared with a last year's figure of \$3,927,721.

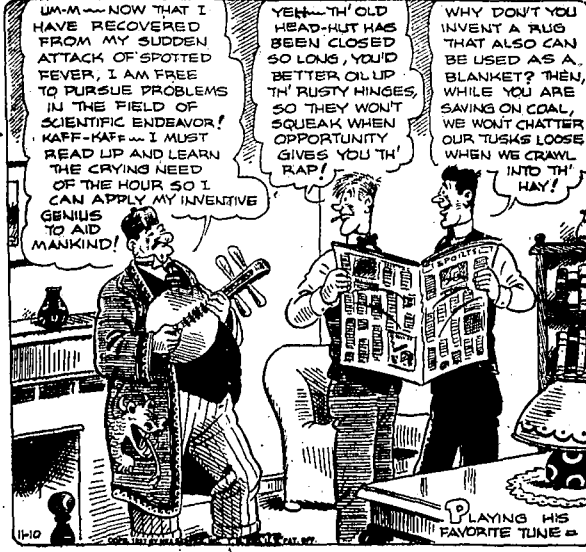

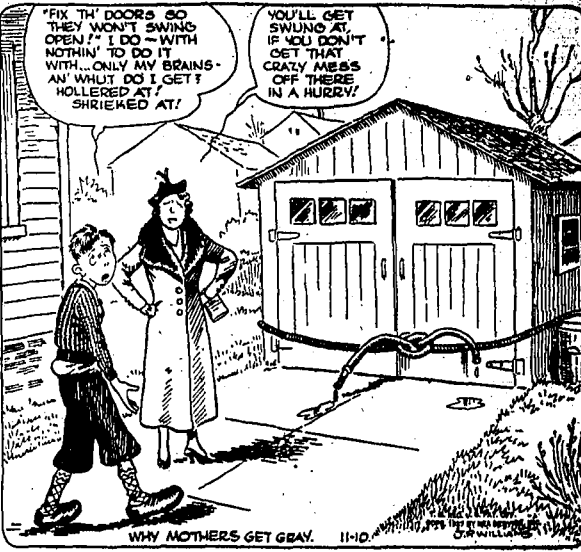

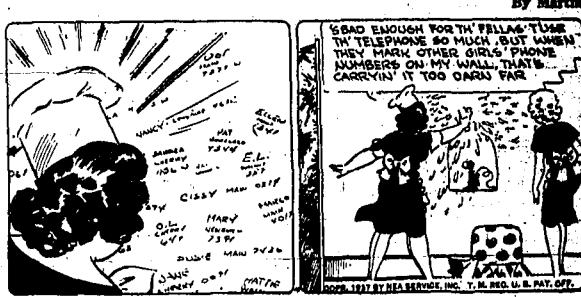

Reservations for the new Challenger Inn are being taken at all the leading hotels and tourist agencies. For the Christmas holidays, both hotels have already been booked for the month.

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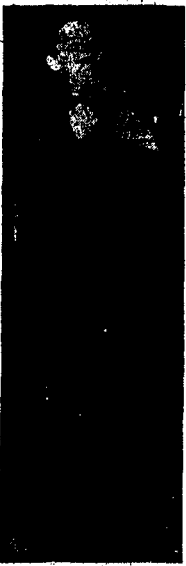

SCHOOL ADDITION READY BY DEC. 1

Washington Structure Waits Novel Wardrobe Doors, Other Equipment

Modern new four-room addition at Washington school will be put into active use "about Dec. 1," Supt. Homer M. Davis announced this afternoon.

The building is "pretty well completed" today, the head of the school system said. Still lacking are the special doors on the wardrobe, installing of radiators and placement of furniture and equipment.

Doors from East. The wardrobe doors, which must come from Massachusetts, have not yet arrived. The new furniture is also in course of shipment.

H. J. McNeal, Caldwell, is general contractor for the Washington addition. Home Plumbing and Heating company and Kyle M. Walter, both of Twin Falls, handled the special contracts.

The building represents a "fine job," Mr. Davis said. Members of the school board, after frequent individual survey trips to the addition, agreed with the verdict.

The wardrobe doors are among the highly unusual features of the building. They are coordinated with the three classrooms and the three class rooms. All the portals open inward when the first is pushed. When the doors are closed, they lock automatically and allow additional blackboard facilities.

Closets ventilated. Another unique feature of the wardrobe is the leaving of four inches underneath the doors and placing of ventilators all the way thereby assuring a flow of air to dry out wet clothing during snowy winter days.

Lincoln rooms. In the new unit offer both beauty and high utility. Lighting, heating and other facilities carry out the same up-to-date provisions throughout.

One of the four rooms is larger than the rest and will be utilized as a physical education room under the program that will become general in the school system next year. The room is also available as a recreation room.

Hot lunches. Serving of hot lunches will be started next year at the school. It will be a general policy in the grade buildings next year with the F. T. A. exception. The Washington addition comes into use about Dec. 1. Primary pupils will occupy the new rooms and the incoming sixth graders will take over other rooms in the present building.

By next fall, all sixth grade students will be moved out of junior high school. In the Washington addition, the new Binkel school and the new Lincoln unit.

RED CROSS HEAD OUTLINES POLICY

Mrs. Alexander Explains Why Chapter Is Not in Local Community Chest

Explanation of the Twin Falls county Red Cross chapter's reasons for not participating in the Community Chest here, were outlined this afternoon by Mrs. D. L. Alexander, chairman of the unit.

Mrs. Alexander's statement said: "Several local individuals have inquired as to the reasons for our Red Cross chapter not affiliating with the Twin Falls Community Chest. In stating our Roll Call this fall we are stressing that the Red Cross is a membership organization. Its great peace-time program, locally and nationally is supported by members throughout the nation.

Separate Drive. "Because of the Red Cross quasi-governmental nature, because of its congressional charter and because of its local, national and international responsibilities, it is absolutely necessary that a strong conscious membership be maintained. This condition does not exist when the chapter receives its financial support from a joint fund raising campaign. This policy is national in scope and has developed after considerable study by Red Cross chapter delegates from all parts of the nation assembled in national convention and is further backed by opinions of the national Red Cross central committee, which is composed of representatives of the federal government, outstanding leaders in private welfare and chapter representatives.

"In taking this position, neither the local chapter nor the national Red Cross has in mind any idea of weakening the recognized need for Community Chests. The Red Cross leadership in many communities has assisted in forming centrally organized fund raising campaigns. However, I am confident the best interests of the Red Cross and of the Community Chest movement will be served by having this chapter, as do nearly all others, continue to adhere to the traditional membership basis of financing the great Red Cross program."

Governor's Statement. Support of residents of the state was urged by Gov. Barzilla W. Clark in the following statement: "With the annual Red Cross roll call taking place between Armistice day and Thanksgiving day of this year, I wish to call upon the people of the state of Idaho to join this great humanitarian organization.

"The quota for this 21st annual roll is 26,225 members for Idaho. This is in contrast with 18,458 members last year.

"Although the Gem state has been exceedingly fortunate in the absence of disasters it is felt that our people will be anxious to respond to the Red Cross roll call this fall and subscribe the full quota asked by the national organization.
