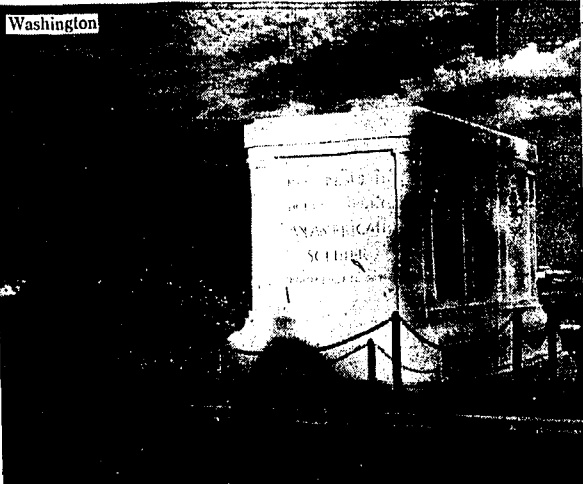
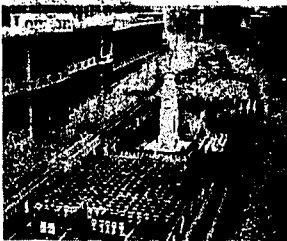


## ARMISTICE DAY 1937 1918



Nineteen years have passed since Armistice ended the world war on Nov. 11, 1918. But through still gather to honor the unknown dead. Above, a great concourse of people gathered about London's Cenotaph, standing in silence before the memorial in the center of the busy Strand. Below, King Leopold places a wreath on the tomb memorializing Belgium's dead at Brussels.

Slowly and with measured tread, a solemn procession before the marble tomb on the heights of Arlington above the Potomac at Washington where... rests in honored glory an American soldier known but to God. Peaceful and secluded, the tomb of this soldier sees little of military display, little of great gatherings of people, but instead a continuous stream of individuals and delegates on organizations who have not forgotten. They leave their simple wreaths on the marble flagstones almost unnoticed by the capital city which bustles and seethes across the river, carrying on the government for which the soldier died. But on the heights of Arlington, at least, there is peace, and the soldier, though unknown, is not forgotten.

Black-shirted militia and steel-clad crusaders stand stiffly about the tomb of Italy's unknown soldier below the statue at right of the top picture. Below, an impressive phalanx of flags moves solemnly up Paris' Champs Elysees to the plain tomb beneath the Arc de Triomphe where France's unknown soldier lies beneath an eternal flame.

Here ended the long struggle. Standing white against the shimmer green of the Forest of Compeigne, stands this new monument to Marshal Ferdinand Foch, on the spot near Metz where German emissaries came to him 19 years ago to ask for the end of fighting. The monument marks the exact spot where stood the railway carriage of the allied commander-in-chief when the guns along the western front stopped speaking and unknown soldiers ceased for a time to die.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—The possibility of an exemption from the capital gains tax for profits made on new housing construction has become considerably stronger since the House committee first reported that device for stimulating a building boom was being considered by the administration.

It would be a strange thing if the four new \$60,000,000 battleships now to be added to the American navy should be the means of leading the world back to disarmament and peace.

That single truth was the dominating factor at the Washington arms conference. We initiated that conference, the stupendous reduction program which grew out of it was initiated by us.

Naval reduction was not the only fruit of that conference. The far eastern situation was tense. A war was obviously in the making—a war which looked certain to involve America.

It was able to do those things largely because Uncle Sam was the man who could put the most chips on the table.

Right now the world is fast approaching a new crisis in its affairs. Once again it is staggering under an arms race; once again the clouds are black on the oriental horizon.

## REBELS TO OPEN 'FINAL OFFENSE'



Bloch is 52. He was born at Woodbury, Ky., and was appointed to the naval academy from that state in 1895. He served in the Spanish-American war, and participated in the China relief expedition and the Philippine insurrection. During the World war he was in command of a transport. His home is at Bowling Green, Ky.
