An important fact of the occurrence of shingles is that they are usually preceded by a chain of groups along the course of one or more of the nerves of sensation in the skin of the body. The final result is that quite definitely a nervous disease as well as a skin disease. Shingles usually are found in people whose nervous resistance has been lowered by overwork, disease, or some long continued toxic action on the human body. The action is usually preceded by a chain of a neuritic character in the region of the body that is affected and the final result is that they are usually followed by burning, tingling or other irritation.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—The plans for the national planning program which will be before congress are so many and diverse that it is difficult to comprehend the program at one gulp.
Under the Norris bill in the senate and the Mansfield bill in the house, the nation would be divided into five planning regions, among which the Tennessee valley and adjacent area would be one.
The plan would initiate the carrying out of the Roosevelt dream of substituting planned development and conservation of natural resources for the familiar congressional "pork barrel."
"Food control, prevention of soil erosion, reforestation, starting of water for irrigation, cheap electricity, reclamation as against water conservation, and opportunities for millions and employment for the unemployed are among the objectives."

The whole proposal is involved with the running battle between Roosevelt and the public utilities. Power interests are sending their agents to Washington to fight the Norris plan, claiming it would destroy and displace the private power industry.
Aide from the proposed Sen. Lawrence development, contingent on an international treaty, the only area available for large-scale public power development, which would be the Columbia river basin, which already has the Bonneville and Grand Coulee projects, municipal plants in Seattle and Tacoma and a widespread public power sentiment.
The real purpose of the power interests is to wreck TVA and their suit against TVA. A constitutional amendment will be heard by the supreme court in its present term. The amendment is to act on regional planning programs before the court hands down its TVA decision.

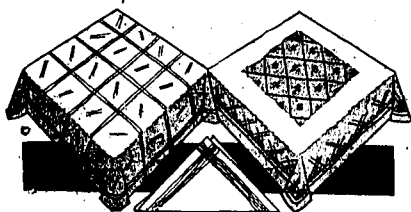

U. S. GUNBOAT SPEEDS TO NANKING TO AID IN EVACUATION

PANIC NEARS AS CHINESE PREPARE TO QUIT CAPITAL

Riot Natives, Government Officials Wait For Ships To Go Up River.

By WELDON JAMES
 NANKING, Nov. 17 (UP)—The United States river gunboat Oahu was ordered to proceed under full steam to Nanking today from Ichang, 430 miles up the Yangtze, as every man ready for war.

Wealthy Chinese and government officials crowded the water front, waiting anxiously to go up river, and poorer people crowded the railroad station waiting for freight trains, though most of the city's population elected to remain.

The Russian embassy announced plans to follow the Chinese government to safer quarters up the river within the next few days, leaving only two members of a staff of 20 here.

Embassies to Follow
 Reliable sources said that the United States, British, French and German embassies would follow the government. For the present they awaited an expected official announcement of the government's evacuation plans.

Reasons for the urgent order to the gunboat Oahu were not given but it was assumed to be in connection with the evacuation and the danger of a Japanese thrust at the capital.

It was understood that high authorities had decided that Chungking, in remote Szechuan province, should be the emergency seat of government.

Operate at Hankow
 It was understood that all ministries would operate at Hankow for the present, moving to Chungking later. President Lin Sen, however, will move his headquarters direct to Chungking.

A check up accounted for 56 American here today. They and other foreigners, unaffected by the excitement, intended to remain for the present.

The 155 Germans made plans to evacuate in case of necessity by river boat.

Liaison officers here of the eighth route army, the former Chinese Communist army, denied reports that the eighth army was retreating on the northwestern front. Instead, it was asserted, the eighth army organized a reinforcing body of 25,000 armed peasants, who were aiding them in harassing the Japanese in quiet fighting.

ROAD EQUIPMENT READY FOR SNOW

Past weather records in Twin Falls show that at least one general blizzard can be expected to seriously hamper traffic both in the district and on state highways. This snowfall and blizzard usually comes during January.


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RED CROSS SEES QUOTA OVER TOP
