FRENCH PAYMENT OF DEBTS URGED

Senator Strongly Condemns Failure to Meet Obligations

PARIS, Nov. 18 (AP)—Strongly condemning suspension of war debt payments to the United States, Senator Henry Berenger, specialist in a lecture today on the possibility of American aid against a German-Italian-Japanese military alliance.

Senator Berenger, who is chairman of the senate foreign relations committee and one of the principal counselors in French foreign policy, charged that the German-Italian-Japanese anti-Communist alliance actually constitutes a military alliance and that it is aimed at conquest with France as the first victim.

Of the United States, he said: "Certain of our compatriots, among them those who wish to participate in Franco-American ceremonies, would do well to reflect once for all that true alliances can not be proved by speeches or festivities on happy days but through loyal execution of engagements solicited and contracted in difficult days—meaning the war debt obligations."

He warned that despite President Roosevelt's "Cuba" speech, American foreign policy was still largely one of "no entanglements," and that France must not place too much hope in a change in American sentiment.

"It would be an error to believe that the World War has profoundly changed this doctrine," he said. "If the United States fought on the sides of certain peoples in Europe and Asia, they were not allied to them. Directly provoked, they were by German submarines and by German diplomacy in Mexico, they took unilateral action against Germany," he said.

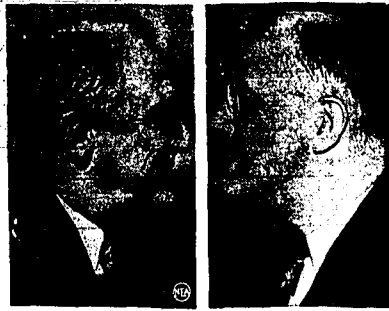

Shaw Denies Reference To Windsor Abdication

LONDON, Nov. 18 (AP)—George Bernard Shaw today had denied that, in carrying out a threat of years' standing to rewrite Shakespeare, he interpolated into "Cymbeline" the story of the duke of Windsor's abdication from the British throne.

Cymbeline was produced Tuesday night at the Embassy theater, with the program headed: "Cymbeline, by William Shakespeare and George Bernard Shaw."

Shaw had cut down the last act by two-thirds, retaining about eight of the original lines and writing in the rest himself.

When the king's lost sons Cadwal and Polydore are discovered, Cadwal is hailed as "future king of this rude island"—the rudeness referring only to the times, which are those of the Romans.

Then Cadwal, in the Shakespearean blank verse, retorts:

"No! not this kingly business has no claim for me... compelled to worship priest-invented gods. Not free to wed the woman of my choice, being stopped at every turn by some old fool crying 'You must not!' or still worse, 'You must... I abdicate and pass the throne to Polydore.'"

Polydore replies: "Do you, by the heavens! Thank you for nothing, brother."

Shaw said today: "You must not try to find in the passages more than there is on the surface. It is written as part of the play and is necessary to it. It is not to be taken as my view of the abdication, as a happy solution to the king's difficulties or anything else. I had no intention of inferring anything apart from its use in the play."

PARIS READY FOR FASCIST 'PUTSCH'

Mobile Guards Reinforced Following Discovery of Arms Caches

PARIS, Nov. 18 (AP)—Discovery of large arms caches and reinforced concrete shelters in the heart of the city, believed to be part of a plan for a "putsch" of Paris, caused reinforcement of mobile guards at several ministries tonight.

Guards at the entrance of the ministry of interior and ministry of posts and telegraphs were strengthened. The government was understood to have taken a most serious view of the situation after the discovery of two tons of weapons, munitions and explosives.

The discovery led police on the trail of a widely ramified organization believed to be composed of Royalists or Fascist groups. Five persons were under arrest and additional arrests are expected.

Business Does Not Give Labor Square Deal, LaFollette Charges

PLANS CURB ON NEW VIOLATIONS OF CIVIL RIGHTS

Opposition to Union Has Not Been Confined to Courts, Says Solon

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—Sen. Robert M. LaFollette, R., Wis., charged business with failure to give labor a square deal today and announced his senate civil liberties committee was preparing recommendations for new legislation to curb violations of civil rights.

LaFollette made his assertions in the first issue of the National Lawyers Guild Quarterly, a new magazine published by the attorneys' association. He denied assertions that union labor is not responsible and countered with evidence produced by the committee of which he is chairman purporting to show that industry has fought labor organization tooth and nail.

"The opposition to labor's fight for recognition has not been confined to the legislatures and the courts," he wrote. "Recalcitrant management has countered legal and legislative advances with new or intensified use of old extralegal devices to rob labor of the fruits of its victory."

LaFollette's counter-attack on the labor movement which began in 1933 provoked a counter-attack from industry in which labor espionage, organized violence, and private munitioning played a major part.

"The right of workers to speak freely and assemble peacefully is immediate and practical, a right which translates itself into the concrete terms of job security, wages and decent living conditions," LaFollette said.

LaFollette said the committee had been amazed at the campaign of vilification to its legislative efforts. He said that frequently, when papers of companies were subpoenaed, they were destroyed.

The agent for a detective agency, he said, "manufactured a series of innocuous reports for delivery to the committee in substitution of originals which remained locked in his safe."

"Representatives of another espionage agency of my reports out of the back door of their Detroit office while a staff member of the committee, subpoena in hand, entered at the front."

"A supplier of gas and machine guns applied ink eradicator to his ledger in an effort to conceal the fact that one of the principal purchasers for his arms was a detective agency which also supplied the 'links and nobles' who use them."

"What is to be said of corporate management," LaFollette asked, "which relies upon agencies with such a record of irresponsibility in the execution of its labor policy? That American corporate management has done so to an extent heretofore only suspected is now confirmed by the record."

Everything is complete with the exception of the furnace and pews, which will be installed soon as cash and subscriptions obtained during the day came to \$1,044.

Hoover Suggests World Clubhouse

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover, prattling the work of boys' clubs, said last night that he wished the industrial world and the political world could be given some sort of a spiritual clubhouse. Mr. Hoover spoke at a dinner in honor of Albert B. Hines, who has been director of the Madison Square Boys' club for 25 years.

"If we had just one generation of properly born, adequately educated, healthy children, developed in character," he added, "we would have Utopia itself—even if we don't succeed with planned economy."

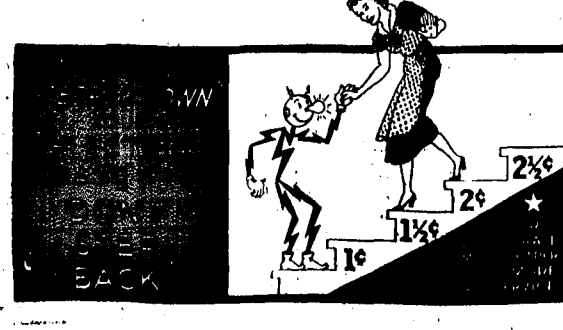



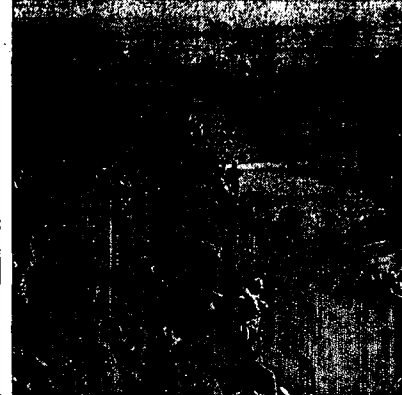

By ROGER JOHNSON STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Nov. 18 (U.P.)—A Rose Bowl invitation goes on the auction block here Saturday and there will be two bidders—University of California's Golden Bears and Stanford University's Indians.

Eighty thousand football fans expect a slap-bang battle in Stanford stadium—the "big game" of the Pacific coast—between the California powerhouse and the Stanford Opportunity.

It's called the big game because: 1. It promises a bigger market for gardenia corsages than any other game in the country except possibly Army-Navy and Yale-Harvard tilts.

Most Grads in West—California and Stanford, collectively, can lay claim to more old grads than any other two universities in these parts. And they all get misty-eyed at alumni banquets this time of year, thinking how much they have lost. No joy, but plenty of the old western light.

But this time the "big game" will be more than a flower market and rallying-ground for alumni. The winner undoubtedly will get the western Rose Bowl bid and the outcome will decide whether California wins the Pacific Coast conference race or whether the Bears and Indians will be tied for leadership.

If California wins—and the betting odds are in its favor by a comfortable margin—it's the Rose Bowl without a murmur. But if Stanford wins, the Pasadena Rose tournament selection committee is in for a bad afternoon. With the two teams tied for first place in conference standings, the committee would have to be guided by sentiment.

All hands agree the California line is stronger than Stanford's. Stanford has done virtually no scoring on straight power and down-field marches. It has capitalized on fumbles, blocked kicks, intercepted passes, and registered an occasional single pass or field run by Bill Faulman or Pete Fay.

"Try-Leaguer" Welcomes Because of its publicity value, an eastern "try-leaguer" probably would be most welcome to the promoters and there has been some talk of Yale or Dartmouth being invited. However, neither would be likely to accept since sentiment in both institutions is strongly against post-season games.

Holy Cross and Villanova are still undefeated in the east. It is unbeaten and untied in the Rocky mountains but these teams are the least likely to get Washington State against any of them being named.
