





# SEN. VANDENBERG MAPS 10-POINT U. S. PROGRAM

## PROPOSAL WOULD ADVANCE ACTION IN U. S. CONGRESS

### Remarks Spur Lawmakers in Efforts For Revision Of Tax Laws

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—A 10-point business recovery program advanced by Sen. Arthur Vandenberg, R., Mich., today consolidated proposals for cuts and broader action than any so far indicated by the administration.

Vandenberg, asking "where do we go from here," said that "business must not be permitted to run the government; but unless it is permitted to have a latitude to run itself, prosperity will die on the vine."

His remarks spurred congressional action on the part of the contributed profits tax and for federal retrenchment.

Other developments on the business front included:

**Fix Exemption**  
1. Senate Majority Leader Alben W. Barkley, D. Ky., said he believed the most desirable basis for amendment of the undistributed profit tax—as the administration plans to do—would be to fix a percentage on the percentage basis.

That would mean that a specified percentage of profits would be exempt from the penalty tax if it remained on a percentage basis.

One figure discussed on Capitol Hill was 30 per cent. Another method would be to fix a percentage in dollars which would operate to the advantage of small businesses.

2. Increase from 80 to 90 per cent in the amount of private housing loans which the government can guarantee under the federal housing act was widely discussed in connection with the President's plan to encourage investment in building.

Administrator Nathan Strauss of the U. S. housing authority revealed that attorneys were studying whether any of the \$100,000,000 available this fiscal year could be used to aid privately financed housing projects under the Wagner-Steagall act.

**10-Point Program**  
The Michigan senator offered this 10-point program:

1. Stop the governmental "hymns of hate" against business.
2. Balance the budget as soon as possible.
3. Substitute "incentive taxation" for "punitive" taxes and modify or repeal the surplus and capital gains taxes.
4. Amend the social security act to stop the "needless drain" on both sides of the account.
5. Revise the Wagner labor relations act.
6. Give up the fight over the wage-hour act; legislate to bar interstate shipments of goods made by sub-standard labor.
7. Eliminate "executive despotism" through repeal of many of the emergency powers given the President.
8. Enact farm relief with bureaucratic control.
9. Provide that America stays out of war through an "insulating" neutrality policy.
10. Abandon "all anti-constitutional activities."

## Ex-General in Czar's Army to Be Deported—But Not to Russia

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 23 (AP)—Nicholas Bogomoloz, once a mighty general of the czar, was today a mighty humber cobbler with a hole-in-the-wall shop where he makes his morning coffee on a burner beside his bench and sleeps on a cot in the rear.

Yesterday he stood in disgrace before the bench of United States court and was stripped of his American citizenship and that sin bore him a charge was that he brought a pretty unmarried war nurse with him in his flight from the home-land and that she bore him a child.

His shoulders straightened into military bearing again and he seemed to be standing at attention while waiting for Federal Judge Paul J. McCormick to pronounce judgment.

At his side, weeping, was Anna Zaporozhchuk, for whose love he lost his citizenship she is 35, he is 60. The woman's citizenship was cancelled six months ago for the same reason.

Live in Separate Rooms  
The former nurse admitted that she had lived with the general as his wife, and bore him a daughter, Tatiana, now 15. But that they have lived in separate rooms. She took the name "Mrs. Bogomoloz" for her daughter's sake, and because her own was more difficult to pronounce. She had to support herself; the general and the child until he learned the cobbler's trade.

Bogomoloz used an interpreter in court. American army officers sent affidavits denouncing him. They said he was in command of an armored train which attacked American troops in Siberia and killed two Americans. This attack provoked an international incident.

Ignores Affidavits  
The judge ignored the affidavits, however. He said that the cobbler's affairs since coming to this country in 1923 were all that should be considered. His conduct here, the judge said, was sufficient to cancel his naturalization.

The general was back at his shop today. Immigration officials said deportation proceedings would be started at once. They had not decided where he would be sent.

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BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Whispering and rumormongering about a general sales tax on food, as a substitute for processing taxes to pay for the proposed farm program, is to be heard from certain members of the house ways and means committee.

Politically, and perhaps from the standpoint of sound tax policy, such a suggestion may seem preposterous. But it indicates that the way congressional groups are being pulled to post when what they really want is an expensive program which would cost any money.

The current farm program costs \$600,000,000 a year. The new one will cost at least \$700,000,000. But the new bill is not a simple one. It demands that the difference be made up in new revenue and Secretary Hoover urges new processing taxes, the house agriculture committee has turned over that little problem of financing to the ways and means committee. It is likely that the members are known to be opposed to processing taxes.

CONSUMER WILL PAY The alternative to processing taxes is either a general tax or a program that doesn't meet the surplus crop problem. Heavier general taxation is what nearly everyone is trying to avoid. So the ultimate answer is likely to be processing taxes, although strenuous opposition is also expected from Senators Smith, South, Carolina, Bailey of North Carolina, George of Georgia, and others who depend on textile interests for political support.

Proposed processing taxes call for cents a bushel on wheat, three cents a pound on cotton and one cent a pound on rice. The effect of these would be a sales tax on consumers, although it is said some of the men who were able to buy stocks they were called by the low 1922-23 prices are entitled to exempt 80 per cent of their gains from income tax, as soon as a five-year period from the purchase date expires. Thus one who made a million-dollar investment and now has a million-dollar gain would pay income tax on \$400,000 of his gain, according to treasury officials, who express no sympathy.

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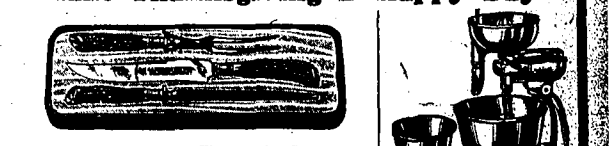

Experts See Possibilities of Panther Club Turning Down Bid to Rose Bowl

CHICAGO, Nov. 23 (U.P.)—Pittsburgh and Fordham stood out today among 24 bowl candidates as the key teams to the New Year's day post-season football games.

Each has one game left, Pitt with Duke at Durham, N. C., and Fordham with New York U. at New York.

It seems fairly certain that either Pitt or Fordham, providing they win their final tests, will meet California, already named to represent the west, in the Rose Bowl game at Pasadena.

Pitt apparently has the inside track on the fact that California authorities continued the situation by announcing the eastern school picked must have standards similar to California's members of the California squad picked Pitt in a straw vote.

There is a possibility that Pitt, even if selected, may not go to the Rose Bowl. Last year Pitt was invited to the Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans before getting the Rose Bowl bid. Pittsburgh authorities may feel that they are something to the Sugar Bowl for turning down last year's bid. In addition the shorter distance to travel would be a factor.

Pitt-Alabama game in the Sugar Bowl would overshadow the Rose Bowl attraction regardless of what eastern team California selected. Alabama has been invited by Vanderbilt Thanksgiving day to complete its season unbeaten and untied.

If Pitt goes to the Rose Bowl game, Fordham is almost certain to go to the Sugar Bowl and vice versa. Alabama appears to be the third choice for the Rose Bowl game, and No. 1 choice to represent the south in the Sugar Bowl providing the Crimson Tide wins the Southeastern title by defeating Vanderbilt.

Up to Bory

Coach Jack Sutherland, nicknamed "The Silent Scot," refuses to be excited about his team's chances of getting the bid from California university, the west coast's representative.

It remains entirely up to the west whether Pitt will accept a bid if one is offered. Sutherland said as he prepared the Panthers for their last game—against the Blue Devils of Duke university Saturday.

As for the Sugar Bowl game at New Orleans, it was learned Pitt has rejected Sugar Bowl invitations for three consecutive years, in the past.

Might Play Alabama

One official pointed out that the only possible inducement for the players to accept a Sugar Bowl invitation, if extended, would be if Alabama is the southern team, which is invited to play at New Orleans.

A game between Pitt, if it defeats Duke Saturday, and Alabama, if it remains undefeated by licking Vanderbilt, might steal the football spotlight away from the Rose Bowl contest on New Year's day.

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# French Link Arrest of Spies with Plot to Overthrow Government

## INFORMATION ON MAGNOT LINE IS GIVEN TO NAZIS

### Leader Captured as He Tries to Flee Into Germany Near Huningue

PARIS, Nov. 23 (AP)—The arrest of six spies on the northeastern frontier near France's famous Magnot line of defenses was linked by authorities today with the alleged plot of the mysterious Cagouards (hooded ones) to overthrow the popular front government.

The spies confessed that they gave information concerning fortifications and troops on the French side of the river Rhine to Nazi agents in Freiburg, Germany.

The alleged leader of the spy ring, a German named Dugler, was arrested at Huningue, just as he was about to flee across the frontier. Two were arrested at a meeting of the Comite de la Brique, a French social party which reportedly is an organ of the outlawed Fascist organization. The other three were arrested at a group from which the Cagouards had acquired many members.

The "Magnot line" of the French defenses since it is not fortified in accordance with treaty stipulations following the Franco-Prussian war which also formalized treaty neglected to erase. France has scrupulously respected the area.

An army passing through Switzerland at the only point where the natural defenses do not protect the route in the lowlands about Basle could drive through unopposed, and arrive behind the Magnot line.
