Chinese Government Suspends Shanghai Operations

Activities End In Settlements And Outer City

DEFENDERS WILL CONTINUE CONTROL OVER TRIBUNALS

By EDWARD W. BEATTIE SHANGHAI, Nov. 24 (UP)—The Chinese government capitulated to Japanese demands today and prepared to suspend its chief functions in greater Shanghai, including the international settlement and French concession.

The Japanese had threatened to use force, if necessary, to end anti-Japanese activities in conquered areas around the city.

It was announced officially that the Chinese city government, headquarters of the martial law bureau, and headquarters of the Kuomintang (Nationalist political party) were suspending all their functions.

Chinese courts in the foreign-controlled but Chinese-owned settlement and concession will continue to operate.

One of the first indications of Japanese domination of the city was the appointment of two Japanese to high posts in the customs service.

Name Customs Officials Sir Frederick Maze, inspector general of Chinese customs, named Fashinke Akashi, former official in customs office at Tientsin, as administrative commissioner for Shanghai, and Katsuki Kato, already a minor official here, as revenue accountant for the Shanghai area.

The general belief was that the Japanese would make important strides in the Japanese-controlled areas in the settlement.

On Tokyo's foreign office spokesman had had been informed of details of a request of Lieut. Gen. Iwane Matsui, Japanese commander-in-chief, for Japanese participation in the administration of the Shanghai postoffice, but believed it "natural" that any commander would demand a measure of control of any machinery which could be used against him.—(Ed.)

Mains Hold Up Advance Some official sources believed that the Japanese would not take over the administration of the customs unless a formal state of war was declared.

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APPLE MEN EYE PLAN FOR SLASH IN TREE EXTENT

County Growers Hear Advice To Seek Aid in Removing Third of Acreage

Members of the Twin Falls Horticultural association today had under consideration for adoption a legislative program which would be ultimately end in the up-rooting of one-third of all the apple trees in the United States.

Such a plan, patterned after the present government soil conservation efforts, was offered in Twin Falls last night as members of the association met to discuss market troubles the Idaho apple advertising plan and also to fabricate the number of cars of apples being here in this district at the present time.

The up-rooting plan was advocated by Joseph H. Day, Eden, president of the association because, he said, "I sincerely believe that apple-growers will make more money with one-third of the trees left standing than they would if all were left up."

Eye Feders Funds Under Day's plan, the federal government would be asked to provide funds which would be paid to the growers destroying one-third of their trees. This land would then be returned to alfalfa or some similar crop.

The time to ripe to make a start toward federal assistance in pulling one-third of the apple trees in the United States, Day said. Such a program would be patterned after the order of soil conservation payments. It would, in fact, be legislation to control the number of apple trees planted in the United States.

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Growers Oppose Rail Rate Boost

State Traffic Association Secretary to Protest Before Board at Washington

Growers and shippers of the Twin Falls area today were on record as "strongly opposing" any rise in freight rates charged against perishable commodities.

Action in opposition was taken here last night at a special meeting of representative members of the two groups as data heard for the interstate commerce commission to pass on a proposal submitted by the railroads that the rates be increased 15 per cent, or a maximum of 15 cents a hundred pounds.

Meeting with local growers and shippers was Austin Anson, secretary of the Idaho Shippers' Traffic Association. He will go to Washington to appear before the commission to protest approval of the contemplated rate increase. The Washington meeting is scheduled for next Monday.

Urged to Write Likewise, growers and shippers were urged to immediately write or wire Idaho's congressional delegation in Washington in order to present a strong opinion might be presented to the commission.

At the meeting here it was pointed out that any rise in freight rates would reflect back on the grower in that it would tend to reduce local prices. This, it was pointed out, would cost growers the loss of approximately \$30 a car.

"The burden of this contemplated 15 per cent increase in rates would reflect back on the growers," Mr. Anson told the group, "and would mean a loss to them. This would not only be true of local growers but would reach each grower in the country." (Continued on Page 2, Column 3)

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Board Members Vote to Recess Until New Date

Action Makes Definite Consideration of Plea

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 24 (UP)—The state board of pardons met today and decided to hear Douglas Van Vlack's application for commutation of his death sentence to life imprisonment at 10 a. m., Dec. 6.

The board was in session 10 minutes, and by unanimous vote of its three members, decided to stand in recessed session until that date to permit "expeditious hearing of the application for commutation."

Today's action makes definite the fact that the board would hear the petition. Standing whether the board would be able to hear the application raised "tossy" when the board recessed. The attorney for Van Vlack had not taken necessary action to advise a hearing for their client.

Taylor Makes Motion The motion to recess again until Dec. 6 was already prepared. It was introduced by Attorney General J. W. Taylor, who read the statement to members of the board. Mrs. Masters, secretary of state, made the motion formally, and Gov. Barreille Clark seconded it. The vote was unanimous.

It was revealed that the action had been decided upon by at least two members of the board. The board members were asked to stand in recessed session until that date to permit "expeditious hearing of the application for commutation."

When the board recessed yesterday there was a possibility Van Vlack's petition would be "unheard by the board and that his execution Dec. 10 would then depend upon the mercy of the governor, numerous protests—some written—poured into the statehouse.

It appears that it had been then decided to make every effort to give Van Vlack the hearing he is entitled to. (Continued on Page 2, Column 3)

WHEELER CALLS FOR ASSURANCES TO U.S. INDUSTRY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (UP)—A series of conferences on Capitol Hill today suddenly renewed speculation on the possibility that the administration would speed efforts to reassure business in regard to relief from undisciplined foreign exchange burdens. The move coincided with a conference here between the state department and industry.

Whether an administration-approved move to revise the profits tax at this season would result or whether there would be announcements of intention in an effort to encourage business was uncertain pending the outcome of discussions among treasury and congressional leaders.

Kennedy Takes Lead Joseph P. Kennedy, chairman of the maritime commission, and regarded as a leader in the administration business aid campaign, took the lead in the conference. He met with Chairman Pat Harrison, D. Miss., of the senate finance committee, Rowell M. Merrill, undersecretary of the treasury, and L. H. Parker, chief of staff of the joint committee of internal revenue.

"I would not be opposed to action at this season if it were possible but the obstacles are great," Harrison said. He added significantly, however, "if tax revisions accord only to the farm bill."

Other Developments The possibility of expedient tax reassurance to business came as the industry rapprochement with industry widened.

Hundreds of family dinners, many of them drawing guests from out of town, will form the chief feature of Thanksgiving in south Idaho homes and ranches.

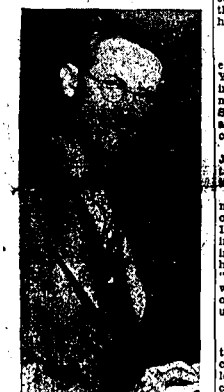
The post office will shut down on Sunday, with no city or rural regular deliveries. Postmaster M. A. Stronk said.

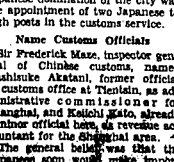

Anti-Tuberculosis Campaign Material Goes Out After Thanksgiving

Christmas seal sale supplies will go out to Twin Falls schools immediately after Thanksgiving, it was announced this afternoon by Mrs. Doris Stedley, county superintendent of public instruction.

All common schools will receive the supplies, and independent districts including Filer, Marad, Hollister, Hansen, Murtaugh and Casper.

Similar supplies will be distributed to the Twin Falls school system by the Anti-Tuberculosis association under Mrs. W. Orr Chapman, local president.

Each school will receive the seal from the Buhl chapter under Mrs. John A. Noble, and kindergarten students will be supplied through the association group under Mrs. L. A. my brass.

School children in this and in other south central counties will receive awards for per capita sale of the seal, which forms the annual finance drive for the fight against tuberculosis.

The awards, presented by the state Anti-Tuberculosis association, include special pencils to each child disposing of a specified small amount of seal; state roll of honor, bringing a gold pen and ribbon to the two students highest in each county, and a bronze plaque to the school making the highest per capita sales in the state.

The next meeting of the group will be held in December and plans have been made for a dessert luncheon to be held before the season.

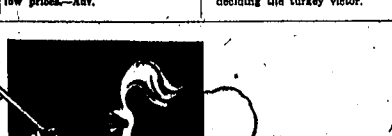

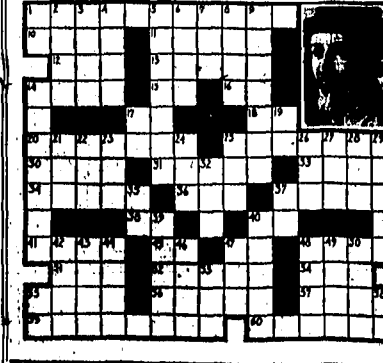

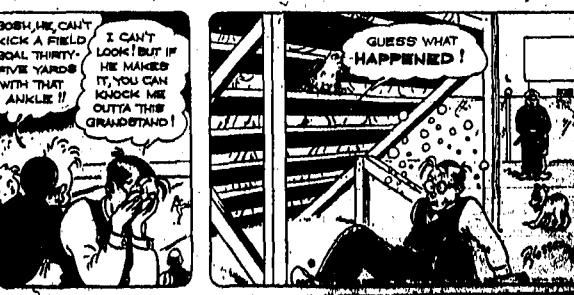
