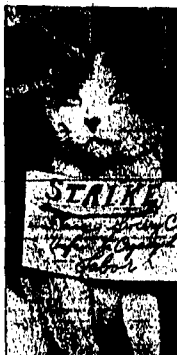

England's Debt
To U. S. May Be

PLAN IS LINKED WITH
POSSIBLE TRADE PACT

LONDON, Nov. 25 (U.P.)—Settlement of Great Britain's war debt to the United States probably on the basis of approximately 50 per cent of the original settlement figure of \$4,600,000,000 was predicted today by the Daily Express. The debt question, the Daily Express said, is closely linked with negotiations for a new Anglo-United States trade pact, which are now practically completed. The debt conference will be only a formality at the conclusion of the pact.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, hereby designates the fourth day of November, 1937 as a day of national Thanksgiving.

Moore has been only slightly less respected than White for Colorado's undefeated and untied season to date.

Second Year Men

Players named on the United Press eleven for the second year are Dreher, White and two Utah players, McDonough, end, and Schlickman, tackle.

Brown of Colorado and Schlickman of Utah drew the tackle berths by a narrow margin over Kimberly, outstanding Montana State lineman, and Wendenburg, Denver's promising sophomore tackle.

Utah's steady play and the brilliant work of the giant Utah tackle earned them the top honors. McDonough, giant Utah end, is selected for the second straight year as Dreher's running mate.

Oliver Wallace of Denver and Barnhardt of Greeley are awarded the guard positions on their spectacular, steady play throughout the entire campaign.

Who's loop's leading center, ground gainer, punter and extra point boomer, draws the captaincy of the team, but is placed at halfback where he would be even more sensational than at present if relieved of the signal-calling chores.

The quarterback spot goes to Paul Deacon of Colorado college, a surprise selection which is amply justified by the brilliant kicking and

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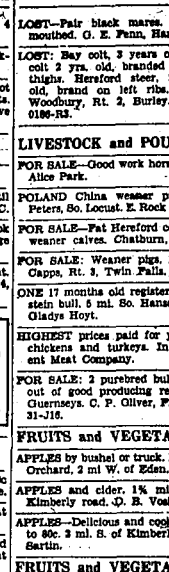

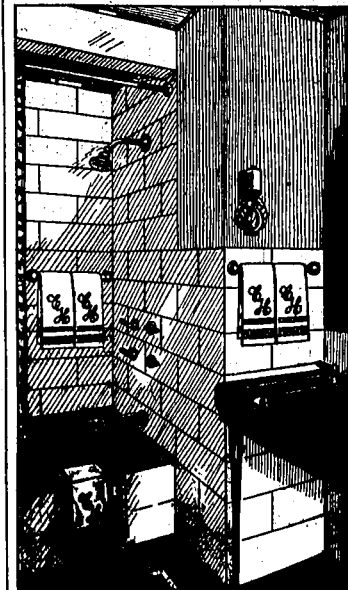
