Improper Conduct - He cited improper conduct, and then made the statement that many of the jurors felt that if they returned a verdict of guilty as charged, Van Lack would be submitted for a national competency board of psychiatrists to establish his sanity.

He said the instructions of the trial judge were misleading inasmuch as they "mean there would be other procedure as to his sanity to take the responsibility from the jury shoulders in deciding whether or not he was sane."

"I realize that if this letter must be published," he said, "there are many who will criticize me for giving you this information, but if that is so, I must bear it to my sense of justice and the oath I took to give it."

Dr. Fisher called Van Lack "a mad dog" and "a monster." He expressed the opinion that the purpose of the bill was to serve justice as well as to confine Van Lack for life instead of hanging him.

Dr. Blair, Tacoma, testified to insanity of Van Lack's early life, saying that the present insanity was a source of trouble to his parents, and that opposition had been made to accomplish any relief for him.

Dr. Blair said that execution of Van Lack would kill two birds with one stone. He said that it would materially shorten the lives of his mother and father, "who were very young to anyone in their lives."

The pardon board recessed for a short time after presentation of the insanity claim.

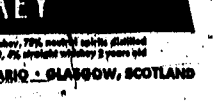

TAYLOR TO FILE CROSS-SUIT ON P. C. O'MALLEY

STATE ATTORNEY SEEKS RECOVERY OF 2 YEARS' PAY

Case Results From Attempt To Get Back Salary For One Month

BOISE, Dec. 3 (Special)—P. C. O'Malley, former director of the state insurance fund who Thursday filed suit to recover \$728 in wages allegedly due him from the state. Today he filed a cross-suit with dismal possibilities.

Attorney General J. W. Taylor said he would bring action questioning why O'Malley should not return to the state his salary for the last two years—almost \$8,000—because he had allegedly mismanaged his office.

The state supreme court in writing the opinion which resulted in O'Malley's discharge June 3 said that he had caused overdrifts in his departmental appropriation and was thereby disqualified from holding office.

O'Malley's check had been held up on the strength of an audit of his department. He took now his pay for May and three days in June. An alternative writ was granted, and State Auditor Harry Parsons must show proper cause or give O'Malley the salary claimed. However, if Taylor files his cross-suit, O'Malley could not be paid until that matter of litigation was settled.

Baby Subsidy Newest Farm Aid Proposal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (Special)—Whenever legislation involving economic policy is debated in congress, self-appointed economic planners from all parts of the country send thousands of alternative plans to congressmen. The most ingenious bit of this work we have seen is a "save America" plan which came in the mail from Ruth Hall Chatfield of Baldwin, N. Y.

The author's idea is to substitute for federal crop control a federal infant subsidy. The plan is to make grants of \$300 to "married American citizens" for each child up to a family of five children. Thereafter, the bonus is increased to \$1,000 per infant.

The purpose, apparently, is to produce enough children to eat up the surplus of farm-commodities and, incidentally, "save America."

Congressman Burdick of North Dakota has introduced a resolution providing for a congressional investigation of trading in futures in contract markets with reference especially, but not exclusively, to "wash sales, cross trades, accommodation trades, and fictitious sales." These transactions on the Chicago mercantile exchange came in for much vituperation during the farm hearings attended the farm hearings this October. On the Chicago board of trade was blamed a substantial share of the plight of the American farmer. A similar resolution will probably be proposed to the senate before long.

Gain Reported In Postal Revenues

Receipts For November Rise Over 1936 Figure

10 MILLION GET HOLIDAY TREES

BALZAM, Minn., (AP)—Woodmen are busy in the land of snow, spruce and balsam, building up a \$10,000,000 business of preparing trees for the 1937 holidays.

From the Pacific northwest through the Minnesota-Wisconsin "land of the sky blue water" and as far east as Maine, the modern protype of the early lumberjacks are bucking snow and fast-freezing logs to get Christmas trees that will be bedecked with gay ornaments and bright colored lights.

Porest service officials estimated that when operations reach their peak late this month, 10,000,000 more trees—balsam, spruce, fir and pine—will be this year's total.

National forests will supply about 300,000 trees. The remainder will come from private and state lands. The stump value ranges from 2 to 6 of 10 cents a tree, depending on the size. That's what the land owner gets.

The man who buys the tree in the city, after the trees have been brought in from the woods will pay from 25 cents to \$3 and up. Commercial cutters who go into the business on a big scale frequently cut trees early and store them in boxcar refrigerators, according to the forest service. This practice, it was said, is popular especially in areas where snowfalls in November and early December prevents loggers from penetrating the woods that late in the season.

While the greatest annual forest output of Christmas trees is in the west, the largest demand comes from the east. This area alone consumes two or three million trees annually. Last year, the Kootenai national forest in Montana, with 127,000 trees, was the national forest service's biggest holiday tree producer.

Canada also contributes—Minnesota, Michigan and Wisconsin swamps contribute their trees to Chicago. The greatest Christmas tree output of other cities in the plains states. In addition, a large number of trees are imported annually from Canada. Foresters cut trees early and store them in village parks, and which cost \$35 or more.

Cutting in national forests is done specifically to thin and clear stands. Several states have enacted laws designed to prevent wholesale depletion of forest preserves.

And the forest service said, one large forest fire might destroy as many young trees as are used in the entire country's Christmas trade in one year.

FARM PRICES GO BELOW PRE-WAR

Construction for Jerome Cabin to Begin This Month

BOISE, Dec. 3 (Special)—On Nov. 15 the index of prices received by farmers for "all commodities" dropped below the pre-war level for the first time in two years. The index stood at 98 per cent compared with 103 per cent on Oct. 15 and 117 per cent on Nov. 15 a year ago, according to Richard C. Ross, agricultural statistician.

The "all crop" index declined slightly from a month ago. Although still at a very low level the "fruit and vegetable" index advanced three per cent, with grains, feed crops, and other crops lower than on Oct. 15.

The index of "all livestock and products" on Nov. 15 was reported to be 130 per cent of pre-war. This is a drop of nine per cent from the Oct. 15, 1936 figure. Poultry and dairy prices advanced from a month ago with meat animals and other livestock products declined rather sharply.

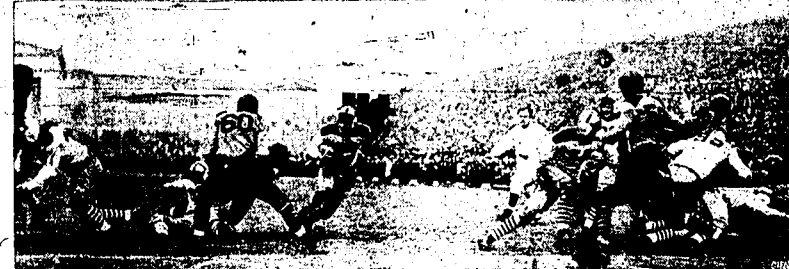

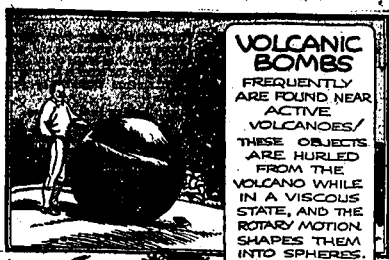

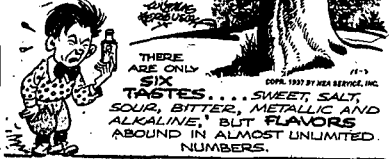

Treat Oysters Gently And They Reciprocate

It used to be very Victorian to eat oysters by gas light in grand and over-decorated Oyster Palaces. Today, every housewife knows as much about the good taste of the fresh or frozen oyster as any gay belle of the "naughty nineties."



Oysters Indienne makes a delicious luncheon or supper dish. It is made by combining Bluepoint, a rich sauce, curry powder and steamed rice in individual casseroles.

Oysters on Brochette (serves 6)
One pint Bluepoint oysters, drained, 12 slices bacon cut in quarters. Arrange each oyster between 2 slices of bacon on toothpick. Place in pan. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Broil about 3 minutes; then turn and broil other side about 3 minutes longer, or until bacon is crisp. Remove to platter. Arrange oysters on brochettes. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Garnish with chopped parsley. Serve at once.

Oysters Benedict
Six thin slices hot water ham, 1 pint Bluepoint oysters, drained, 3 English muffins, halved and toasted, Hollandaise sauce, 12 strips pimento. Spread ham on skillet. Sauté oysters in ham fat in skillet until edges become crisp. Arrange 1 slice ham and 1 oyster on each toasted muffin half. Cover with Hollandaise sauce and garnish with pimento. Serve hot.

Oysters Indienne
One pint Bluepoint oysters, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 cup oyster liquor and rich milk, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, dash of salt, dash of pepper, 1/4 teaspoon cup powder. Sauté oysters very gently in 1/2 cup oyster liquor. Add rich milk and stir in flour and seasonings. Add oyster liquor and milk gradually and cook over low flame until thickened. Stir constantly. Add oysters and heat thoroughly. Serve with boiled rice.

"I want something which will permit me to advance through hard work. I can go anywhere, anytime and can have a girl stay with my mother until I can afford to bring her with me," his letter ended.
