

Mellon Absolved of Levy Fraud

APPEALS BOARD UPHOLDS CHARGE OF TAX EVASION

15 Men in Group State That Financier Did Not Intend To Cheat

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (UP)—The board of tax appeals today upheld a portion of the federal government's charge for back taxes against the late Andrew W. Mellon but absolved him of fraud.

All 15 members of the board acquiesced in the decision, and the petitioner was controlled by the late Pittsburgh capitalist.

Seven of the 15 judges, however, dissented on most of the remaining issues.

The government had sought to collect \$3,075,103 in 1931 income taxes and penalties from the Pittsburgh capitalist and former secretary of the treasury, who died last Aug. 26. The board did not specify the exact amount of Mellon's liability but ruled that a final settlement should be negotiated between attorneys for the government and Mellon's estate on the basis of the board's findings of fact.

Covered 10 Points
The board's opinion covered the 10 salient points in the case. The board found that Mellon's donation of five paintings by old masters to the A. W. Mellon Educational and Charitable Trust, was a "valid completed gift."

Mellon claimed a deduction of \$3,247,090 for this gift. The board's petitioner did not file a false and fraudulent return with the purpose of evading taxes; the opinion said in connection with this transaction.

"No part of the deficiency, if any, resulting from the recomputation of the taxpayer's income, is due to fraud with intent to evade taxes," Mellon Absolved

The board also absolved Mellon of a charge that he filed a false and fraudulent return for the purpose of evading taxes. The government charges involved two income tax returns—sale of the common stock of the Union Trust company of Pittsburgh and stock of the Western Electric Service corporation also to the Union Trust.

On basis of the findings, Mellon's estate apparently won the battle in a major issue, and lost three. One issue was compromised. The decision followed more than four years of litigation. The case has been before the board of tax appeals for 18 months.

Mellon died August 26 while the board still was considering the case. Claimed Overpayment

The treasury contended that Mellon was deficient \$250,000 in his 1931 income taxes, and levied a 50 per cent fraud penalty of \$1,025,000. Mellon said he had actually overpaid his taxes by \$131,045 and demanded a refund.

The litigation, while not involving the largest sum, was conceded to be the most important ever before the board in its 15 years existence.
