## 300,000 Chinese Soldiers Prepare Nanking Defense

### Fires Set to Slow Advance of Japanese

**By WELDON JAMES**  
 NANKING, Dec. 9 (U.P.)—Great fires burned for miles around Nanking today as 300,000 Chinese soldiers prepared to defend the city to the last man.

The fires had been set by the Chinese to retard the advance of the Japanese while preparations were completed to defend the capital, and to destroy anything which the invaders might use.

The last of the Chinese army withdrew slowly through the three gates kept open in Nanking's historic wall built by the Imperial Ming.

Some detachments of retreating Chinese troops in the vicinity of the city were said to be warily dependent. Some of them, plodding toward the city in freezing weather during the last two days, had not been given orders to try to infuse a fanatical fighting spirit.

Scouting the walls at points facing east and south, this correspondent saw that the entire surrounding countryside appeared to be a mass of flames.

## Prater Rejects Plea for Slayer's Sanity Hearing

Speculation Eyes Possible Last-Ditch Move at Boise

Van Vlack with the shadow of the gallows lengthening, today had been refused a sanity hearing by Sheriff E. F. Prater of Twin Falls county.

And speculation here this afternoon centered on whether or not that refusal is appealable, and whether Van Vlack's attorneys might try a last-ditch maneuver at Boise as execution time became only a matter of hours.

Prater refused to ask for the inquiry after the appeal was made last night by Mr. and Mrs. Carl Van Vlack and T. W. Northstrom, Twin Falls attorney, Mrs. Van Vlack did not confer with Prater, and Northstrom presented the plea. The attorney and Prater then conferred with District Judge J. W. Porter.

The judge, under an old Idaho law, would have to give his concurrence if the attorney had decided to ask the inquiry to determine Van Vlack's sanity before a 12-man district court jury here.

## CONVICTS SHOW NO TENSION AS DEADLINE NEARS

Attorney, Religious Advisors Parents Only Ones Allowed to Visit Prisoner

BOISE, Ida., Dec. 9 (U.P.)—Barring last minute developments, Douglas Van Vlack, 34, convicted slayer of his wife, Mildred Brock of Tacoma, will die at 12:10 a. m. Friday on gallows in the Idaho state penitentiary.

His last day of life drew swiftly to its close in orderly fashion. The prisoner was quiet. There was no evidence of tension on the part of inmates.

Only change in prison routine was abandonment of the penitentiary school, which normally is held in the same room in which the gallows were built.

Today, for obvious reasons, the school was not held. It will be resumed after the execution has taken place and the gallows have been dismantled.

Last Sunday Van Vlack will have his last dinner anything he desires to eat. He had not selected the menu. William Cross said that details would be attended to later in the week. No one will be permitted to see the condemned man except his attorney, his religious advisors, and his family. If Van Vlack expresses the wish to appear in newspapers before his execution, they may be held, the warden said.

Warden Cross said Van Vlack was quiet with no indications of regret that he fully realized the end of his existence was near.

His parents spent the maximum amount of time with him. They were in the office of the Governor. They entered together on the morning of the execution.

Most of the day with them he had been calm and composed. He had father had stayed in Boise, except for a vain trip to Twin Falls last night in an effort to secure a sanity hearing.

They returned to Boise at four a. m. today.

Warden Cross spent an hour and a half in the office of the Governor, General J. W. Taylor. The two went over the case: "as it applies to execution." He said that Cross and Taylor were in the office of the Governor.

## FAMILY OF SIX BURNED IN BLAZE

All Members Except Father Die in Fire That Destroys Illinois Farm Home

OREGON, Ill., Dec. 9 (U.P.)—Firemen searched today for the bodies of Mrs. Glenn Lewis, 77, and her five children, who were burned to death last night by a fire which destroyed their farm home.

Her husband, Mr. Lewis, was burned seriously on the arms and face. He suffered other injuries when he fell 18 feet to the ground from a porch roof during an attempt to save his family.

He told firemen that he, his wife and the children were asleep on the second floor when the fire broke out. "I got out from the roof and told my wife to lead the children to the window. But I slipped on ice and fell off."

The children were Louise, 4; Dorene, 7; John, 8; Jack, 9; and Donna Mae, 2.

## 1 DEAD, 16 HURT

### CONTRACT URGED FOR BEET LABOR

Signed Document Important Issue Before Next Season, Says Dayley

Signed working agreement contracts between growers of sugar beets and field laborers was here this afternoon by J. N. Dayley, president of the Twin Falls County Beet Growers association, as one of the "most important" issues which should be considered before the next season.

Dayley pointed out that under the present setup the growers were uncertain how long a worker would stay in the fields at the time the man was hired.

"There is no doubt in my mind that we will hear from organized labor so far as beet workers are concerned," Dayley said. "When this organization of workers will be affected is not known but there is some chance that we growers will be facing it next season."

"I would suggest a contract between the grower and the field laborer so we would have some assurance that when a man came to work for us we would know how long he was going to stay. This would permit growers to have protection against the uncertainty they now face."

### WPA WORK WILL TAKE UP 'SLACK'

Four Projects Scheduled to Start in Twin Falls This Week

Four major WPA projects which are expected to take up some of the slack in employment now that harvest season has ended, are scheduled to get underway in this section before the end of the week, it was announced here this afternoon by John Griffith, WPA district engineer.

The projects will ultimately see employment given to approximately 175 men and will mean an expenditure of \$47,876. To start approximately 40 men will be working.

**Park Project**—Principal among the projects is that which calls for expenditure of \$26,188 for beautification work at the Shoshone falls park. The city sponsoring the work under the direction of Park Commissioner W. E. Taylor. The city's share of the expenditure is listed at \$2,175. It is planned to carry the work on throughout the winter with walks, fences, fireplaces and other conveniences the principal sources for work.

Second project in importance, from the standpoint of money expended, will be that which calls for the replating of wooden water mains in Buhl with cast iron pipe. The project is about one-quarter complete at the present time and will be resumed this week. Total cost of the improvement is listed at \$12,357 with the city of Buhl standing \$6,114 of the expense.

**Home Road Work**—Another of the four projects is that sponsored by the Twin Falls highway districts which calls for work on farm to market roads in the Berger district under the direction of J. D. Sinema, engineer. Expenditure will total \$7,048.

Second project in Twin Falls to get underway will be that which calls for expending \$2,315 in a search over public, state and county lands for gravel to be used on local streets. The city's share of the expenditure will be \$725. The work will be under the direction of Leonard Avant, commissioner of streets.

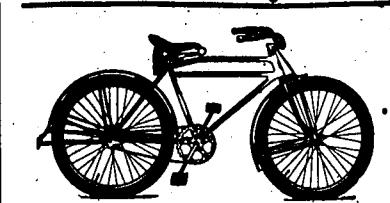

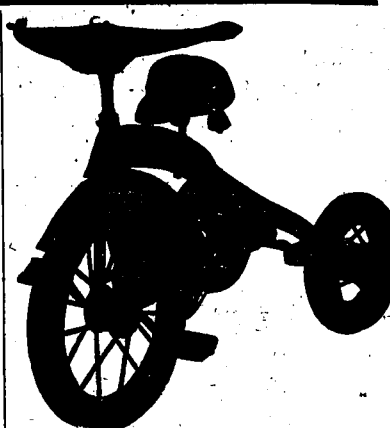

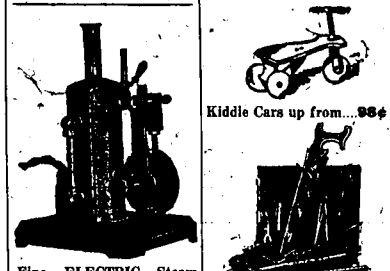

# WINTER'S WORST COLD WAVE SWEEPS ACROSS COUNTRY

## TEMPERATURE IN WYOMING TOWN HITS 26 BELOW

50 Reported as Dead Since Monday Due to Stormy Weather

(By United Press)  
Whipped by an icy gale from the northwest, the winter's worst cold wave swept across the United States today and drove temperatures down to subnormal levels that touched the zero mark in several places.

New lows were forecast and government observers indicated the wave would continue for two more days.

At least 50 persons have died since Monday from causes attributable to the weather.

The cold moved into the west gulf coast and central Texas, leaving only the far west and a few scattered localities in comfort. Low temperatures that threatened Florida crops were reported to have risen to above the freezing mark.

**Snow Covers Half**  
Snow covered the entire northern half of the country and the middle Atlantic states. Drifts piled up by high winds blocked highways and impeded rail traffic.

The lowest readings in the country were 26 below zero at Casper, Wyo., and eight below at Williston, N.D. The area around Edmondton, Ala., was the coldest spot on the continent, with a temperature of 30 below.

The cold gripped the central south and imperiled the sugar cane crops in central Louisiana. Smudge pots were kept burning throughout the southeast; a farm truck and citrus crops blew.

**Snow Flurries**  
Billings, Mont., reported a high temperature of four above zero, accompanied by snow flurries. It was three below zero at Cheyenne, Wyo., and zero at Denver.

Pennsylvania reported 23 degrees since Monday. Seventeen were attributed to automobile accidents on slippery pavements; three died from exposure; three children were killed in the western part of the state in car accidents.

The coldest spot on the continent reported 15 degrees: Buffalo, three; Texas, two, and Chicago, two.

## 15-INCH SNOWS BLANKET GALENA

Fifteen inches of snow blanketed Galena summit as of Monday morning. It was announced here today by E. Moore, forest supervisor at Hatley.  
Depth at Ketchum was five inches, at Graham's ranch nine inches. Mascot nine to twelve, and Old Baldy No. 3, 18 inches. Hatley itself had no snow on the ground Monday. Moore's report shows that at Williams ranch in the Salmon river country there were five inches this week. Stanley had one inch.  
In point of cumulative snowfall, the Wood river valley has had 11 inches since Oct. 1, the report shows. Average for the date is 12.45 but a year ago there had been only one-quarter inch.

In the Soldier creek area, the cumulative fall since Oct. 1 has been 28.5 inches.

## 100 In Attendance at Second Day of Game Managing Meet

MOSCOW, Idaho, Dec. 9 (AP)—The Idaho game management conference opened its second day here today with two sessions being devoted to big game of the state. More than 100 wild life technicians were attending and participating in the conference.

J. K. Dwinelle of the Missouri, Mont. regional office of the U. S. forest service explained the place of wild life in the national forests to the group in the morning session. He told of some of the difficulties encountered by the forest service in game management.

Of interest to Idaho sportsmen was the statement by Dwinelle that the greater share of big game in northern Idaho was found in the Clearwater watershed, which lies east of Lewiston, Idaho, and is tapped by three tributaries of the Clearwater river.

Although the average sportsman would believe the big game would be found to the north, Dwinelle discounted the belief, saying better living conditions for big game were found in the Clearwater area. In Deer population of northern Idaho was estimated at 29,000 by the forestier. Of that number, 80 per cent live in the Clearwater area, he said. Elk number 11,400 and 58 per cent live in the Clearwater district. Reasons for the large population

## JURYMEN CLEAR FORMER BROKERS

Verdict at 12:15 a. m. Sets Van Düssel Brothers Free of Charge

District court jury men at 12:15 a. m. today acquitted two former Twin Falls and Spokane brokers who had been accused of embezzling \$1,100.  
The jury returned a not guilty verdict in favor of E. D. Van Düssel, Twin Falls, and J. A. Van Düssel, Spokane. They formerly operated Standard Securities company here and were accused by C. C. Tarpington, Gooding, of appropriating \$1,100 with which they were to have purchased mining stock for him.

**Jury Dismissed**  
Jury men were dismissed until Monday.

Defense by the brokers held that owners of the stock violated a contract with them, refusing to deliver it, and as a result caused the embezzlement charges.

The two men were freed today as a result of the verdict. E. D. Van Düssel has been free under \$1,000 bond, which Judge J. W. Porter executed. J. A. Van Düssel has been held in county jail after failure of habeas corpus efforts. He was released.

**Civil Suit Pending**  
Next step in the embezzlement claims will come probably at the next term of district court, when a civil suit for damages, filed by the Van Düssel's, will come up for trial. They claim officers of the Five Points Mining and Milling company "maliciously disregarded agreements by which Standard Securities contracted to sell the mining stock. The civil suit asks \$1,100 actual damages and \$10,000 punitive damage.
