# Administration Leaders Await FDR Message to Guide Congress

## FOREIGN POLICY, MONOPOLY PLANS TO BE DISCLOSED

### President to Make Personal Delivery at Opening Next Monday

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Administration leaders looked forward today to a message from President Roosevelt to guide congress toward a firm foreign and national defense policy, a curb on monopoly and encouragement of business through a revision of taxes.

The message, to be delivered in person when the regular session opens Monday, was expected to be a comprehensive disclosure of the administration program as it shapes up after the trustees' report in the face of the current business recession.

Outstanding problems to be dealt with were forecast generally as:  
1. Foreign policy: Mr. Roosevelt was believed likely to deal at length with the nation's foreign relations, emphasizing his belief that the United States must accept certain responsibilities, and possibly outlining a national defense program that would, incidentally, aid in combating the recession.

2. Monopoly: General congressional opinion was that Mr. Roosevelt will seek rigorous action to check monopolistic tendencies but without definite decision on the type of legislation if any, to be enacted. Increased congressional interest in the federal corporation lines was indicated by Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., and Sen. William E. Borah, R. Ida., including an endorsement by Sen. George W. Norris. Mr. Web, aroused speculation whether the administration would back it.

3. Business aid: General tax revision including modification of the undistributed profits and capital gains tax, was considered certain to be in the President's program, which was expected to be pitched on a note generally pleasant to business for the "ten per cent" which Mr. Roosevelt in the past has blamed for much of the nation's economic troubles.

Middle Course  
Most authoritative indications were that the President would adopt a middle course on demands raised at the special session for quick and far-reaching aid to business. Mr. Roosevelt is expected to call for revival in some form of the wages and hours bill buried by the house.  
Another possible theme for the message was the New Deal effort to revive private enterprise and expansion in the utility field, whose leaders have conferred recently with the President without, apparently, gaining any drastic concessions in regard to government competition. It was understood, however, that the regional planning bill—for seven new TVA's—would be modified.

## APPROVAL GIVEN SEWER PROJECT

### Work at Five Points to Get Underway in Immediate Future

Issuance of a project number, expected in the immediate future, this afternoon was all that was needed to resume work which will result in completion of the Five Points sewer district job, stopped several weeks ago by orders from WPA headquarters in Washington.  
Mayor Lem A. Chapin last night at the regular meeting of the city council read a telegram from John Griffith, WPA field project supervisor at Boise on the same date, which said the completion of the project had been approved in Washington on Dec. 23. The wire was received here at 8 p. m.

At the present time the project is partly completed, citizens in the area saying it now forms a hazard inasmuch as much of the line is uncovered and the ditch filled with water. Certain taxpayers protested the stopping of the project at the regular council meeting last week and urged that the council make every effort to see that the work was completed.  
Street Commissioner Leonard Avant said the project would be started again as soon as a number for the work is received from the state WPA office at Boise.

## Hermit Seeks Permit To Run Bear Farm

NEW PHILADELPHIA, O. (AP)—"Spika Horn" Meyers, Michigan's famed naturalist, has begun a movement to establish a bear farm near his Ohio birthplace. At 64, the hermit wants to lease a good-sized tract of land in the Muskingum Conservancy district, to breed bears. He was born at nearby Pilot.

Meyers, accompanied by two of his pet bears, made a public appearance at offices of the conservancy here. Officials said they would take his plan under advisement.

## REBEL DEFENSE NEAR COLLAPSE

### Loyals Expect to Complete Domination of Teruel At Any Time

HENDAYE, French-Spanish Frontier, Dec. 28 (AP)—Spanish loyalists asserted today that the nationalist defenders of Teruel were weakening, and that the collapse of resistance, narrowed now to two small groups of buildings, might be expected at any time.

Both the seminary and the Bank of Spain building, the principal centers of resistance, were burning slowly and the loyalists asserted that fire from the buildings was decreasing noticeably in intensity. Loyalists insisted that two nationalist rebel columns on their way to Teruel were making absolutely no progress and that the nationalists were not even replying to appeals for help radiated by the defenders.

### Report Steady Progress

Nationalists, on the contrary, reported steady progress by the rebel columns—which were said several days ago to be "within sight" of Teruel—and said they were inflicting severe losses on the loyalists outside the city.

The nationalists asserted that they were beginning a turning movement against the loyalist right wing north of Teruel and that, if the movement succeeded, the loyalists would not only be thrown out of Teruel but would be thrown back beyond the point at which they started their recent drive for the city.

### Will Not Surrender

Every effort to persuade the defenders of the seminary and the Bank of Spain building to surrender failed. The rebels stopped heavy artillery bombardment to send two priests to the defenders to discuss surrender terms. The priests returned to say that the nationalists refused to surrender on terms, had sufficient water and food as well as munitions and were confident they could hold out until relief arrived.

Possibly to embarrass nationalist efforts to relieve Teruel, but possibly also as the prelude to a new big drive, loyalists began an offensive yesterday between Zaragoza and Huesca, the great nationalist base north of the Teruel zone.

"I can't say anything now, but I wish I could. It would aid very materially in that district where a large market for power exists. We are merely putting men into that district, along with other parts of the state, to determine what the needs are before making specific plans."

## INCREASE NOTED IN POWER LINES

### 85 Per Cent of Farm Homes On Tract Now Served By Electricity

Eighty-five per cent of all farms in Twin Falls county are receiving electrical service at the present time. It was announced here today by R. W. Carpenter, manager of the Idaho Power company.

During the past year, records of the power company show, more than \$50,000 has been expended on improvement and extension of power service on the Twin Falls tract. At the present time there are more than 550 miles of rural electric lines serving the farms on the south side tract where 10 years ago there were but 100 miles.

The last 12 months have seen 65 miles of new rural distribution lines constructed in this area, bringing electrical service to 170 more farm homes, Carpenter said.

The total percentage of farm homes using electrical service at the present time is believed to be equal to or greater than any other like community in the United States.

## WOMEN HIGHEST IN JUROR TESTS

### Survey in New York Shows Ladies Get High Marks in Oral Examination

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP)—Women are outdistancing the men when it comes to passing oral examinations to qualify for jury service in Erie county, according to G. Stuart Berrill, deputy county commissioner of jurors.

The reason, he said, is that a majority of women jurors are mothers who assist their children with school work, thereby keeping abreast of affairs better than the fathers.

Basing his conclusion upon the examination of more than 1,700 women for jury service, Berrill observed:

"Fewer women were disqualified for lack of knowledge of court terms than men."

Women are more honest than men in admitting they don't know the answer to a question. Men try to guess at the answer; women just say they don't know.

Defining "perjury" is difficult for many women. They just can't seem to grasp that perjury is making a false statement under oath. A typical answer, made by one woman, is "perjury is not a white lie."

Berrill commented that women jurors have fitted into the court scene very smoothly.

"I have heard no criticism of any kind, even from veteran lawyers who were opposed to women sitting on juries."

## 6,000,000 WORDS IN WEIRTON CASE

**Labour Board Hearing Only Half Finished; 40 Books Of Testimony**  
 STEUBENVILLE, O., Dec. 27.—The national labor relations board's hearing on anti-union charges against the Weirton Steel Co. already has produced 3,000,000 words—equivalent to 10 novels—and the case is not half finished.  
 Starting Aug. 15, the hearing has been in session almost continuously either here or at New Cumberland, W. Va. The board still is presenting its case, and when that is concluded Weirton Steel will present its evidence. This is expected to consume as much time as taken by the board's presentation.  
 Of the 279 former Weirton employees who charge they lost their jobs because of their activities with the steel workers organizing committee, only 120 thus far have testified. Board attorneys have expressed the opinion that all claimants who charge they lost their jobs through union activities will have testified before they are eligible for reinstatement in event of a ruling in favor of the SWOC, which brought the anti-union charges against Weirton.  
 Thus far, 225 witnesses have testified, 37 of them non-employees of Weirton steel. Recently the board summoned as witnesses a number of officers of the Weirton employees representation plan and the Weirton employees security league, which the SWOC charges are company-dominated, independent unions of Weirton employees.  
 Longest in History  
 The hearings, the longest in the history of the NLRB, have produced a record already 12,761 pages in length, which has cost the Weirton Steel company an average of \$415 a day. The record costs the steel company \$215 a page, the NLRB 12 cents a page. This is due to the reporting firm's low bid to obtain the contract with the board, thus increasing the page rates to the company. Two reporters, two dictaphone operators and a clerk are employed in compiling the record transcript.  
 The cost of the record is estimated at \$30,000. But in addition, Examiner E. G. Smith is paid \$25 daily for the labor board, which employs four attorneys, the steel company four, and the two independent unions acting as intervenors are employing two lawyers.  
 Weirton Steel employs about 15,000 men at its Steubenville and Weirton, W. Va., plants.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (UP)—There were indications today that the administration would continue its policy of paying 77.57 cents an ounce for domestic-mined silver after Dec. 31 but would leave the door open to a downward revision of the price within the next year.

President Roosevelt's proclamation, fixing the silver purchase price, expires at midnight Dec. 31. There is no provision in the proclamation for automatic extension.

These indications were disclosed in conversations with officials who professed not to know what the President was planning to do but submitted their own best judgment. One official said he believed the President would not issue another proclamation but would direct Secretary W. C. Clegg or executive order to continue paying 77.57 cents for a time and then begin a series of gradual reductions.

**Other Alternatives**

1. Issue another proclamation continuing the present 77.57 cents price.
2. Issue a proclamation reducing the price.
3. Permit the existing proclamation to expire without issuing another one.

## 'SUBS' RUMORED OFF U. S. COAST

CALIFORNIA PAPER SAYS REASON FOR NAVY ACTIVITY IS JAPANESE BOATS

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Dec. 22 (UP)—Rumors of alien submarine activity off the California coast, and the dispatch of a second squadron of nine naval destroyers here from San Diego for patrol duty, enlivened the navy's mysterious maneuvers in the Pacific today.

The Los Angeles Daily News said today that navy authorities were discussing reports that "an alien flotilla of submarines, probably Japanese," had been seen off the coast.

The newspaper said the information came from "a man well versed in naval secrets both in California and Washington," and that the informant said it was feasible for Japanese submarines to operate from some secluded place along the Lower California coast.

Commander C. J. Wheeler, secretary to Admiral Arthur J. Hepburn, commander-in-chief of the fleet, denied the rumor.

The navy has not taken any stock in it, Wheeler said. "The report is about a week old, first describing only one submarine. It appears to have grown into a flotta."

The Los Angeles newspaper informant said the navy had sent airplanes to scout for the submarines. He did not say what the flyers intended to do had they found them.

Navy authorities continued to describe the movement of destroyers as part of a "routine security program."

## Golden Eagle Often Brings Grief to Power Employees

The golden eagle might be a popular bird with some people but figuratively speaking it gives grief to power employees of the Idaho Power company an acute "pain in the neck."

Reason is because of the bird's habit of alighting on high power line poles so that it can survey the surrounding country with more ease in the quest for rabbits and other game. But when the eagle alights on the poles it sometimes means the end of power service to certain localities for at least awhile.

Wings Bill Wires

In explaining the "bird hazard" this afternoon, R. W. Carpenter, manager of the Idaho Power company in Twin Falls, said the "crazy" birds decide to "take off." Having a wing spread of some six feet or more, they come in contact with two or more wires at once, and their own lives and more than likely disrupt the power flow through the lines.

"Every year we have some trouble with them," Carpenter said as he told of activities among company employes in preparing for winter work. "In some cases we have been notified that it is necessary to hire a marksman to take care of the birds' trucks, especially those which see service outside the city."

will be equipped with snow tires, Carpenter said. This is necessary because the trucks cover a territory which extends to Oakley on the south, Bliss on the west, Shoshone on the north and Milner on the east. Much of the country is desert.

Use Snowshoes

"Some of our men have become quite adept in the use of snowshoes," he said. "On one line, the Snake-Mountain City, it has been necessary, on occasion, to use airplanes so that service might be restored with a minimum of time loss."

Snow cabins are maintained by the company at intervals along the more isolated lines, he said. In the cabins, aside from bedding and materials for building a fire, food and drink are also kept. The cabins are so placed that they are easily accessible in case of storm and will keep a crew comfortable for several days. If the necessary arises.

But the "unsung heroes" of the power company are the patrolmen for the outlying lines. There is a lonely occupation and they must keep at it winter and summer all year around.
