# TENSION GAINS AS JAPANESE INCREASE AGGRESSION

## TWO OF BRITISH GUARDS BEATEN IN SETTLEMENT

SHANGHAI, Jan. 7 (AP)—British authorities reported today that two soldiers of the 2nd Battalion, 22nd Indian Brigade, were killed and several British troops were wounded in the latest incident involving Japan's ever increasing aggressiveness in the Japan-controlled international settlement.

The attack occurred last night on Brechen road, on the extreme western side of the settlement, where several British troops were killed in the early days of the Japanese campaign against Shanghai.

A. Turner and F. G. West were the policemen beaten. Turner was mauled when he advised Japanese troops he thought it unnecessary for them to search for the Chinese civilian, West was beaten when he came to Turner's assistance. Neither was injured seriously.

The attack followed yesterday's protest to Japanese authorities by the settlement municipal police against the alleged manhandling of two other British soldiers. One, Bennett and J. Sinclair, at the Japanese naval landing barracks on Christmas day.

Bennett and Sinclair went to the Japanese barracks in response to a Japanese summons and assertion that they had delayed a military messenger. They reportedly spoke in the ribs with sticks and threatened with swords before they were beaten.

Foreign military experts believed that the Japanese drive south through Shanghai province had gained momentum but probably would meet stiffed Chinese resistance as it progressed. At least 70,000 Chinese troops were said to have been concentrated at Hsichow.

### 14 Planes Destroyed

Meanwhile, a Japanese naval spokesman asserted that 14 Chinese planes were destroyed on a recent gigantic raid on the Hankow and Wuchang airbases. One Russian plane fled without fighting.

Genie squadrons in the provisional capital of Hankow continued to dig among smoldering debris in sections of the city for atomic bomb victims. At least 14 persons were killed but the authorities feared the toll would be considerably higher.

From Canton came reliable reports that the projected Japanese invasion of south China, scheduled for late December or early January, had been postponed chiefly because the Japanese fear they must strengthen their forces in Manchukuo.

The chapter of Future Farmers of America has established a procedure of accumulating and handling funds that is effective in giving the boys training in financial matters and in improving the financial rating of the organization and its members.

The loan fund is a new operation, is an outgrowth of a Chapter Thrift bank which was discontinued several years ago. The depository, located in the Thrift bank did not work, because most members preferred to carry their own accounts in one of the local banks.

## WORKERS TAKE MOVE FOR CITIZENSHIP

Five foreign-born persons in Twin Falls county have taken steps toward citizenship during the past three months. County Recorder Frank J. Smith said today.

Three of the five filed declarations of intention, the first step in naturalization, and two filed petitions to the court, the final step before the district court citizenship hearing. The cases in recent years have been conducted such hearings once a year. The 1938 session is set for May 19.

Mr. Smith's quarterly report on naturalization actions was sent today to the secretary of labor at Washington. His monthly reports go to the State, Department of the Immigration and naturalization service, Salt Lake City.

## SHOSHONE EYES IMPROVED ROAD

SHOSHONE, Jan. 7 (Special)—The regular session of the Shoshone Chamber of Commerce was principally occupied with discussion of proposed road improvements between Shoshone and Dietrich.

Petitions had been circulated asking for the closing and surfacing of the regularly established road, and the proposition for the extension of a market road to the south were not considered at this meeting.

As soon as the petitions are completed they will be turned over to the highway department for action.

### Budget Not Made

## Triumph Mine May Close Up

KETCHUM, Jan. 7 (Special)—The Triumph mine may be forced to suspend operations in the near future because of the present erratic tendencies of the metal markets and the decided slump in silver brought about by President Roosevelt's proclamation of Dec. 13 in which he reduced the domestic silver on silver almost 13 cents an ounce.

"We will continue to operate as long as we can avoid an unreasonable loss in view of the present uncertain market, with our present limited production," said Neil Snyder, operator of the Triumph today. "Our company is making every effort to remain open and in operation in order to protect the jobs of our employees."

At present, the 125 men employed at the Triumph, practically all of the original crew, are working three weeks a month.

The mine has a decrease of approximately 10 cents per man in the sliding scale of wages, effective Jan. 1, due to the decrease in lead and zinc of 63 and 28 cents, respectively.

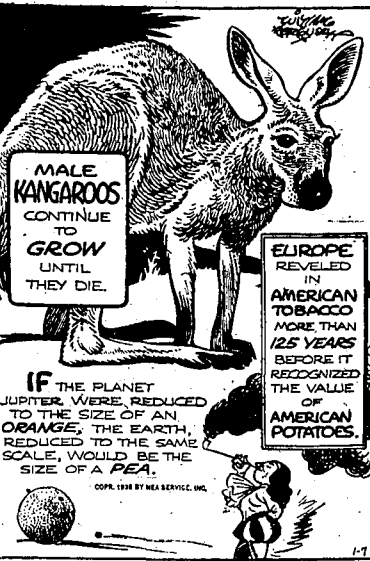

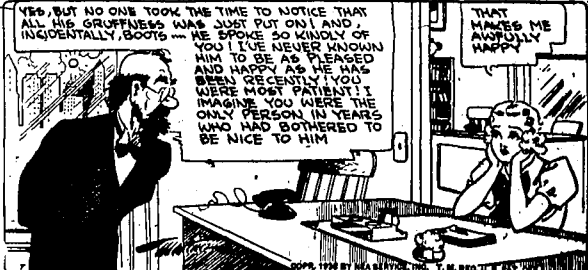

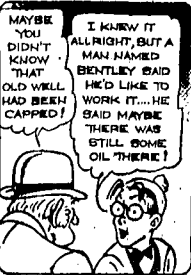
