



Taking Stock of Child Labor

Taking Stock of Chikl Labor Child labor has been an issue in the United States for so long that it is helpful once in a while to pause and take stock of the situation. The child labor amendment to the constitution has been pending before the states for 14 years. Thus far, 28 state legislatures have ratified it—eight less than the three-fourths majority needed to place the amendment in the constitution. Meanwhile, hundreds of bills have been introduced in Congress proposing other amendments or seeking to remedy child labor faults through straight legislation. The latest of these is the Wheeler-Johnson bill, which would prohibit shipment across state lines of goods produced by child labor. The measure has passed the Senate, but not the House. Senate, but not the House.

The most recent survey of the child labor situation was made by the National Child Labor committee. The study was based partly on information gathered by the committee, partly on government records and cen-sus figures. sus figures. Whether you believe in child labor or not, the survey

showed, among other things: That almost 700,000 children between 10 and 15 years of age (inclusive) were engaged in child labor in 1930. That the number increased between 1930 and 1933.

A recent public health survey, financed by a \$4,000, 000 WPA allotment, resulted in the not too sturtling information that poor people are not as healthy as those who have money to spend on good food and doc-tors.

tors. Simultaneously, Columbia university announced after exhaustive tests that \$1.25 will provide three good meals per day for a family of five on relief. For the \$4,000,000 in relief funds spent on the health survey, 3,200,000 five-person families (16,-000,000 persons) could have been fed for one day. Taking it another way, more than 40,000 persons could have been fed for an entire year, using the university's means. the the menus

menus. The health survey probably provided some help-ful information and gave some jobs to canvassers, but its just possible that the well-being of poor people might have been benefited more by feeding 40,000 of them for a year than by inquiring about their health.


