## Taking Stock of Child Labor.

 Child labor has been an issue in the United States for sol long that it is helpfultake stock of the situation.
The child labor amendment to the constitution has been pending before the states for 14 years. Thus far, 28 state legislatures have ratified it-eight less than the three-fourths majority needed to place the
amendment in the constitution.
Meanwhile, hundreds of bills have been introduced in Congress proposing other amendments or seeking to
remedy child labor faults through straight legislation. The latest of these is the Wheeler-Johnson bill, which Would prohibit shipment across state lines of goods
produced by child labor. The measure has passed the produced by child habor.

The most recent survey of the child labor situation
was made by the National Child Labor committee study was based partly on information gathered by the committee, partly on government records and census figures.
Whether you believe in child labor or not, the survey
showed, among other thing8:
That almost 700,000 children between 10 and 15 years of age (inclusive) were engaged in child labor in 1930.
That the number increased between 1930 and 1938, then decreased markedly during the NRA pertod.
That child employment increased as much as 100 por cent during the year after NRA was invalidated, a8 shown by government flgures
That approximately 50,000 boys and girls are inyear while working.
That a large percentage of children applying for work permits are "physically unfit" for labor. child labor, and the least school attend ance are most child labo
identical.

The committee asserted that the child labor amend ment has been kept out of the constitution thus far by a poweriul and werl
tion by manufacturers.
Opponents on the other hand, contend that the amendment, giving the federal government power to under 18 , would place too much power in the hands boys and girls.

These charges and counter-charges have beeni made many times in the last 14 years, or course, and prob abs will be reiterated

Whether Congress, by changing the wording of the opponents is problematical. The National Child Labo committee expresses hope that the Wheelec-Johnson bill will pass, but serves notice it will continue to fight
for the amendment regardless of the outcome of the measure now beforo Congreas.
