## 1 PER CENT LAW IS RULED VALID

BOISE, Feb. 8 (U.P.)—The state treasury department was ordered today by Judge Charles Koelsch of Ada county to release funds of the state fruit and vegetable advertising commission for payment of claims incurred through publishing Idaho's products.

The judge ordered a request against a writ of habeas corpus mandating the treasurer to hand over to the commission its funds, and declared for the second time within three months that the law authorizing collection of a one per cent per hundredweight tax on fruits and vegetables was constitutional.

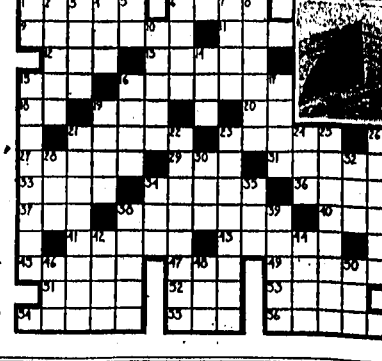

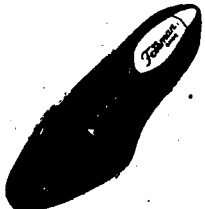

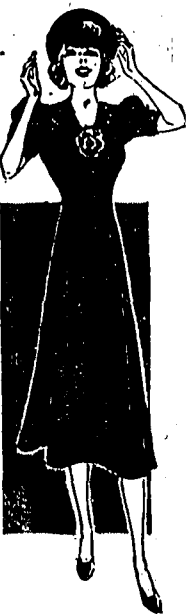
