A SQUEAL FROM HOLLYWOOD TO Forum Editors Yesterday does the editor of the Idaho Evening Times avail himself of the Public Forum...

But when the Evening Times is subjected to criticism, it also exercises its right to reply. Yesterday in this column, Raymond Skeen, a former Idahoan now living in Hollywood, Calif...

This is not written in defense because The Times was likened to a quill, small-town newspaper, but rather to return to Mr. Skeen that we will respect the virtue of sincerity and have not yet become so warped as to have lost our perspective.

We know it is the practice of certain authors to appear defiant of everything conventional and to make a study and support of a program, or an idea, which is largely hypothetical.

We know, too, that despite Mr. Skeen's attempted ridicule, many of our foremost film stars of today were reared in the area of humble surroundings. Mickey Rooney, who hails from this remote section of Idaho is, for example, making a fine good example for himself in the town where Mr. Skeen apparently has sought refuge from Idaho and its "ignorant, fanatical" people.

We agree with Dmitri. We believe Miss Nelson possesses an abundance of all those qualities prerequisite to being a successful U. S. camera model—including personality and good common sense. We doubt, too, whether Mr. Skeen could recognize in anyone with promise these qualities about which he professes to know so much.

After his spasm of self-esteem grandiloquence, Mr. Skeen modestly humbles himself by saying he, too, is an Idaho farmer, was educated in Idaho, hopes to do an Idaho girl, and rode a bronc last fall at the Piler rodeo.

He becomes rather presumptuous, however, when he assumes that we "flatter ourselves" in the eyes of the "world-conscious outsiders" in Los Angeles. Which category he apparently places himself in without the slightest apology. Moreover, this self-admittedly poor bronc buster who has suddenly turned erudite, goes so far as to challenge the Evening Times to print his letter "so Dmitri can read it!"

If he should dignify it with a reply, Dmitri would probably suggest to the author from Hollywood that his eager body might best be served by his returning to Idaho and resuming his career as a bronc rider. Meantime we'll believe Mr. Skeen's story that "beauty is Hollywood's cheapest commodity" that they "buy it in tubes and jars and paste it on in handfuls." So what Hollywood needs is brains? Why not look around in Idaho? Maybe by next year they're squinting that through their ears with grease guns.

HOUSING SESSION ENDORSES LOANS
