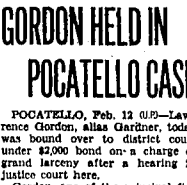

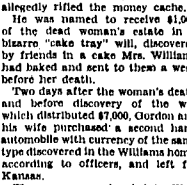

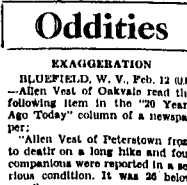

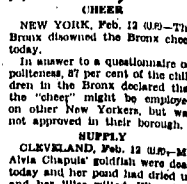

PLANS FOR SUPER-HIGHWAY SYSTEM GAIN MOMENTUM

SENATOR PUSHES PROGRAM TO AID U. S. DEFENSES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (UP)—A congressional campaign for construction of a trans-continent super-highway system gained momentum today when sponsors emphasized its potential value in national defense.

While we could not, of course, build such a highway system until our national defense program had been approved, it would be an important adjunct to national defense through the speedy movement of military troops.

Sen. Favorable Report Mr. Bulley said he was confident of an early favorable report on his bill by the banking and currency committee.

Military experts were giving the proposal thorough study with a view to making certain that all requirements for military use are met.

The width of the roads, the material used and the bridges and tunnels to be built are being studied.

The cost of the bill is estimated at \$500,000,000. The bill calls for construction of the highways as a self-liquidating public utility.

The bill also provides for the construction of additional facilities for national defense and to promote public safety.
