SENATE APPROVES FARMS MEASURE

Death Ends Writing Career of O. O. McIntyre

Columnist Succumbs To Heart Attack in New York Apartment

NEW YORK, Feb. 14 (U.P.)—O. O. McIntyre, the small-town boy from Gallipolis, O., who won fame and wealth interpreting the big city, died today.

The columnist was taken ill on Saturday. Following his lifelong practice, he refused to call a doctor. He died about 2 p. m. today in his Park Avenue apartment.

McIntyre—Oscar Odd McIntyre was his full name—would have observed his 64th birthday on Feb. 18.

His death apparently was caused by a heart attack. Only his wife was with him in the apartment. She said that his last words were a request to her:

"Turn your face toward me so I can see you."

McIntyre applied to New York the principles he had learned when he was a reporter for the Gallipolis Journal in 1902. At his death he had been a columnist in "New York Day," was syndicated in 350 newspapers and papers earning him a huge salary.

McIntyre gained a great popularity by personalizing New York, by treating to masses of stories of steel and its millions of inhabitants as though they were people and people whom he knew intimately and whom his readers wanted to know.

He was born in Flatburg, Mo., Feb. 18, 1874, and was educated at Bartlett's college in Cincinnati. From the Gallipolis Journal he went to the East Liverpool, O., Tribune as a feature writer and in 1909, when he was 22, he became a political writer and later managing editor of the Dayton, O., Herald.

From the Herald he went to the Cincinnati Post as successively telegraph editor, city editor and assistant managing editor and became associate editor of Hampton's magazine.

McIntyre took the big leap—back to New York when his literary flair brought him the coveted job of drama editor on the New York Evening Mail. Not long after his arrival in New York he started the syndicated column which he continued until his death.

He was also the author of several books including "Bring the Light," "23 Selected Stories," "An-Other Odd Book," "The Big Town." He was a contributor to many national magazines including Life, Liberty and the American magazine.

He married Maybelle Hope Small of Gallipolis in 1908 on his 34th birthday.

Democrats Decline Comment on G. O. P. Coalition Proposal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (U.P.)—Conservative Democrats who have been constant critics of the New Deal program, at least for the moment today, on a weekend proposal for a coalition of republican and anti-Roosevelt Democrats.

The complete absence of Democratic congressmen who have fought the administration's reform program was accepted as tantamount to rejection, at least for the present, of the coalition proposal announced by Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, R. Mich., and other ranking Republicans in a 1 1/2 day dinner throughout the country—was not new. But it was believed that the next move must come from Democrats.

Particularly significant was the flat refusal of Sen. Josiah W. Bailey, D. N. C., consistent critic of the New Deal, to comment either on the coalition proposal or on the warning of Gov. George D. Aiken of Vermont that a third party would result from the failure of Republicans to purge their leadership of ultra-conservatives.

Likewise, Sen. Bennett C. Clark, D. Mo., an opponent of some New Deal measures, and Sen. Joseph C. O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., who works with the president over the reorganization program, declined comment.

Roosevelt Given \$440,000,000 Act For Final Signing

Second Major Bill to Receive Complete Congressional Action

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (U.P.)—The senate today completed congressional action on the administration's \$440,000,000 farm bill and sent the measure to the White House for President Roosevelt's signature.

The final vote was 58 to 31.

The farm bill was the second major New Deal measure to receive final congressional action at this session. Congress earlier approved the \$2,000,000,000 housing program.

Senate approval was given the farm bill after Republicans bitterly denounced it was a false promise to the farmers of the nation and a forward step toward regimentation.

Sen. Hiram W. Johnson, R., Cal., who told the senate that he had voted for every farm bill presented during the last 20 years, declared his opposition to the administration measure because it was "the beginning of the end."

JAPAN OFFICIAL HINTS REVEALING OF NAVAL PLANS

TOKYO, Feb. 14 (U.P.)—A foreign office spokesman started today that Japan might be willing later to divulge her naval building program provided that interested nations made formal inquiries instead of seeking them by written notes.

The spokesman was discussing Japan's refusal to comply with requests in American, British and French notes for details of Japan's navy program.

He said that a "certain foreign diplomat" had made overtures and indicated the possibility that the information he asked might later be given, whereas compliance would have been impossible had he asked through formal channels.

Objected to Method

Further questioning officials revealed a considerable thought that Japan's answer to the three-power inquiry might have been different if different methods had been used.

Officials said that the door had not been completely closed by Japan's reply. But they said there was no doubt that the American, British and French notes had stiffened the Japanese navy's attitude against revealing information.

SNOW BLOCKADES ONLY ONE ROUTE

Heavy, wet snow over most of this section of Idaho today failed to close any roads with the exception of the one which leads to the crater of the Moon. This road, J. Matt Johnston, state highway engineer at Shoshone, said, would be open by this afternoon.

The storm, which has been threatening for several days, started here at Ketchikan. Road officials in Shoshone said that the snow had subsided in Twin Falls from one-half to one inch of snow had fallen. Warm air conditions, however, soon melted the snow, but by afternoon the streets were "glacé."

The snow was a "glacé," hitting hardest in the district around Hazelton and Ketchikan. Road officials said that more than five feet is on the level at Ketchikan at the present time. Heavy duty plows out of Shoshone are on the way to clear the roads in Blaine, Camas, Bula, Oyster and Lemhi counties. Gates summit, closed for the past two months, will remain closed for the balance of the winter.

TEN MISSING AS FERRYBOAT TIPS

RYDNEY, Australia, Feb. 14 (U.P.)—Ten of 17 persons aboard a double-decked ferryboat that capsized yesterday in shark-infested waters while following the United States cruiser Louisville remained missing today.

Nine persons were known to have drowned. The bodies of four were recovered from a cabin of the boat by divers. It was feared that the others missing were trapped some 100 feet in the boat which sank in 70 feet of water.

Is in Hospital

Nine other persons previously reported missing were found safe.

One officer, five seamen and 18 members of the ship's band were in the shark-infested water and attempted to break cabin windows to release passengers.

Operations to raise the ferryboat were started.

PEACE OFFICERS CONVENING HERE

Law enforcement officers of Idaho and other states will convene here at sheriff's offices here for a county-wide instruction "school" and regional meeting, Sheriff E. W. Prater said today.

About 30 peace officers are expected to attend. Instructions will be given by special sheriffs deputies, to report on duties and to city and county police forces throughout the county.

Chief emphasis at the "school" portion of the meeting will be on duties as peace officers and cooperation of the public, and involving public confidence.

The session is scheduled for 2 p. m.

SEN. POPE PLANS PROCESSING TAX ON WHEAT AND COTTON

PROGRAM WOULD CALL FOR LEVY OF 15C BUSHEL

 WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (Special)—Sen. James P. Pope, D. Ida., author of the administration farm bill, disclosed today that he was preparing legislation to raise additional wheat and cotton benefit payments through processing taxes.

Pope's plan, calling for 15 cents a bushel tax on wheat and two cents a pound on cotton, was revealed as the senate prepared to vote this afternoon on the farm measure, concluding congressional action and sending the bill to the White House. The vote at 3:30 p. m. will be an adoption of the conference report already approved by the house.

The processing tax plan, which was expected to stir up a congressional storm, presumably will have the backing of the agriculture department, although an alternative proposal for excise taxes is under consideration.

Favors Levy
 Pope, who has not yet drafted the tax bill, favors levying processing taxes on agricultural commodities and then using the revenue for benefit payments to producers of those commodities.

Under the farm bill only the \$440,000,000 soil conservation fund is available for benefit payments to producers and revenue derived from processing taxes would be too much "velvet" for parity payments.

The taxes proposed would be: 15 cents a bushel on wheat to raise about \$75,000,000. Two cents a pound on cotton to raise about \$40,000,000.

The plan would be designed to meet criticism as to the cost of the farm measure and to meet President Roosevelt's demand that taxes be provided to meet all new costs.

Commit Millers
 Pope said that prior to introducing his bill he was consulting with millers' representatives regarding the possibility of legislation for excise tax on wheat which would achieve the same objective as the processing tax but would be easier to collect.

He said that the theory of the tax was based on the fact that both cotton and wheat are world market crops and that the collection of a tax on the domestically consumed portion of those crops could not change the world price.

Therefore, the taxes could not be passed back to the producer, who is the wheat or cotton farmer.

The supreme court, in invalidating the AAA processing tax, did not declare processing taxes generally invalid, it was pointed out.

On Normal Consumption
 According to Pope's proposal, the tax would be levied on a normal consumption of about 650,000,000 bushels of wheat and 1,000,000,000 bushels of cotton. Normal consumption would produce revenue at the rate of 15 cents a bushel and the total of that revenue would be divided by the total number of bushels of wheat produced under farm bill contracts.

Thus, by dividing the total of world and domestic wheat produced under contract into the total yield of the processing tax, the agriculture department would determine the amount of parity payment per bushel to be made to cooperating farmers. Pope estimated that it would be 13 1/2 to 14 cents a bushel.

As an example of the result, it was pointed out that a wheat farmer in Idaho raising 1,000 bushels of wheat might get a market price of 10 cents. To that would be added the regular 12 cents a bushel benefit payment under the soil conservation act and, in addition, about 1 1/2 cents parity payment from the processing tax. The result would be about 23 cents—or parity wheat.

Burley Chamber To Erect Signs

BURLEY, Feb. 14 (Special)—The Chamber of Commerce is planning to erect billboards east and west of the city extolling the virtues of Idaho potatoes and letting the traveling public know that this is the potato center. Potato dealers of the city have promised to support the project.
