JAPANESE SHIFT TO 'LESS FIERY' LEADER IN CHINA

SHANGHAI, Feb. 19 (UP)—A shift in the Yangtze valley area probably will result in improvement of relations between Japanese and foreigners with interests in China, foreign military observers believed today. The belief was based on observations that the new commander, Gen. Shunroku Hata, is less fiery, has closer connections with Japanese political leaders and more interests at stake than his predecessor, Lieut.-Gen. Iwane Matsui, who has been recalled.

Better Discipline
Whether the shift in command presaged an immediate mass drive hit by temporary staff officers of Hankow, military observers were at a loss to say. It was believed that Gen. Hata would check his first efforts toward restoration of discipline to prevent recurrences of incidents between Japanese and foreigners.

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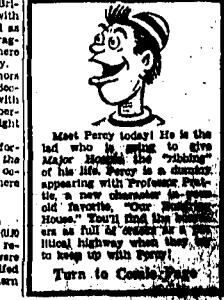

DRIVE TO TRANSFER BEAVER STARTS IN SOUTHERN IDAHO

ANIMALS SLATED FOR NEW HOMES IN FOREST AREAS

First step in a new Idaho game program to re-plant beaver in forest areas where they will prove a benefit is now underway in the south central region. It was announced here this afternoon by Grover C. Davis, district deputy game warden.

Seventeen live beaver were taken this week from lower Snake creek, parts of Snake river, lower Trapper creek and lower Goose creek, Davis announced. These animals were placed in Minidoka forest at such locations as Devils creek, House creek, and further back in the Sublet country in the Black Pine division of the forest.

At the same time, Davis, deputy warden and returned today from Boise, where they attended a conference of state game department and federal biological survey officials. Further details of the beaver transplanting program were discussed at the party.

The aim is to get the surplus beaver out of the populated farm areas where they don't belong. Davis said today, "back into the woods where they belong and good." The program is designed both to save the beaver and to rehabilitate timber streams by beaver dams.

The district deputy game wardens are in charge of the regional zones in which the live-trapping is being carried out. Davis said today that he will be extended to all of the eighth central counties.

London Backs Independent Austria

ENVOY PROMISES DIPLOMATIC AID

By FREDERICK C. M. JAHN
 VIENNA, Feb. 19 (AP)—Charles M. Palarek, British minister to Austria, visited Foreign Minister Guido Schmidt today and was understood to have assured him of Great Britain's continued interest in Austria's independence.

It was understood that Palarek indicated that Britain would give strong diplomatic support in this direction and that he emphasized that Britain and France were co-operating closely in all central European problems.

Palarek's visit came as Austria's Nazi and Nazi sympathizers emerged from years of eclipse and prepared for a gigantic, triumphant celebration tomorrow of their emergence into full participation in the government—and they hoped—eventual power.

Occasion of Celebration
 Further Adolf Hitler's speech to his German Reichstag, and the release of Nazi political prisoners in Austria, were made the occasion for the celebration.

Knockers Throughout Austria laid in emergency stocks of beer and installed radios over which Hitler's speech could be heard.

Housewives and daughters of Nazi families sewed industriously putting Nazi swastikas on decorations.

Feasts of Discontent
 There was a rumble of discontent among members of the governmental fatherland front, peasants and workers. But there was no sign that there would be clashes tomorrow when the Nazis celebrated.

Jews sat today around their Sabbath banquets, praying and recalling persecutions their people had survived in older times. Some thought darkly of the days of 1490 when half of Vienna's Jews were massacred and the other half, despoiled, were driven from the country.

Port to Be Improved

BURLEY, Feb. 19 (Special)—Further improvements for the local airport were planned this week, according to Mayor Harry L. Harpster. The fence will be extended to give the run 200 yards of the track, and the government is spending \$10,000 to install a radio airway beam to guide planes in cloudy or difficult weather.
