England and France Lead in Attempt to Cut Down War Fever

With the international war fever down a few degrees, Great Britain and France took the lead in drastic efforts to delay as long as possible the explosion of danger-packed Nazi-Fascist expansion in central Europe and the Mediterranean.

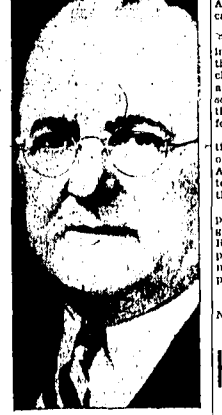

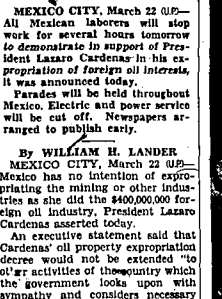

Appealing to the nation to support the Community Mobilization for Human Needs, the President emphasized his belief, however, that the federal government can never substitute its efforts for the personal interest in human suffering which manifests itself through the various community chest drives over the country.

He repeated a statement he has made many times before: "The able-bodied unemployed need work and should have it." That statement apparently is the key to the position the federal government will take as long as Mr. Roosevelt remains in the White House.

Few persons will quarrel with such a policy. Jobs for the unemployed mean both national stability and individual security. But the problem of the jobless, of course, continues very much with us—and the community chest drives deserve the support of every working man and woman.

An Austrian Summer

The same day that American newspapers published the news of Germany's complete absorption of Austria, which meant the historical death of that little state, advertisements appeared with this headline: "We suggest an Austrian summer."

Prepared in advance by the Austrian State Tourist Department, the advertisements further admonished the American reader to "Go native in Alpine Tyrol, quaint Vorarlberg, Explore Gothic Innsbruck. Plunge into Salzburg's heady whirl. Relax by the Salzkammergut Lakes; recapture romance on the beautiful blue Danube; in historic Vienna, the sentimental heart of Europe; linger by Carinthia's smiling waters."

Now those would be pretty words, if Herr Hitler hadn't decided all of a sudden that he might just as well grab off his native country while the big European powers were busy at other things. Some unpleasantness probably will come of Anschluss of Austria to Germany and there is just a chance that anyone lingering by Carinthia's smiling waters this summer will get a quaint bullet in him or perhaps inhale the heady fragrance of poison gases.

An American summer might be safer.

Good Bargain

Signing of the trade pact between the United States and Czechoslovakia finds much favor in both countries. Limitation of concessions on shoe imports to the U. S. appeared the only real American opposition.

To little Czechoslovakia the treaty brings tariff benefits covering 55 per cent of the exports to the U. S. To the Czechs this enlarged market means as much as a rich customer means to a very small store. The great majority of Americans are glad to help this "island of democracy in a sea of autocracy." Czechoslovakia is the last of the Central European democracies born in the brain of Woodrow Wilson and set up in an attempt to solve the nationality and race difficulties of that part of Europe. Its constitution and its government were modeled after the American plan, and it is good that the United States can do its bit toward preserving the status quo in Czechoslovakia.

Highway Sidewalks

The state of Virginia's plan to cut down the toll of pedestrian deaths on the open highway seems altogether sensible. Under a bill passed unanimously by both houses of the general assembly and signed by Gov. James H. Pricke, the state highway commission will build sidewalks along the most heavily traveled roads.

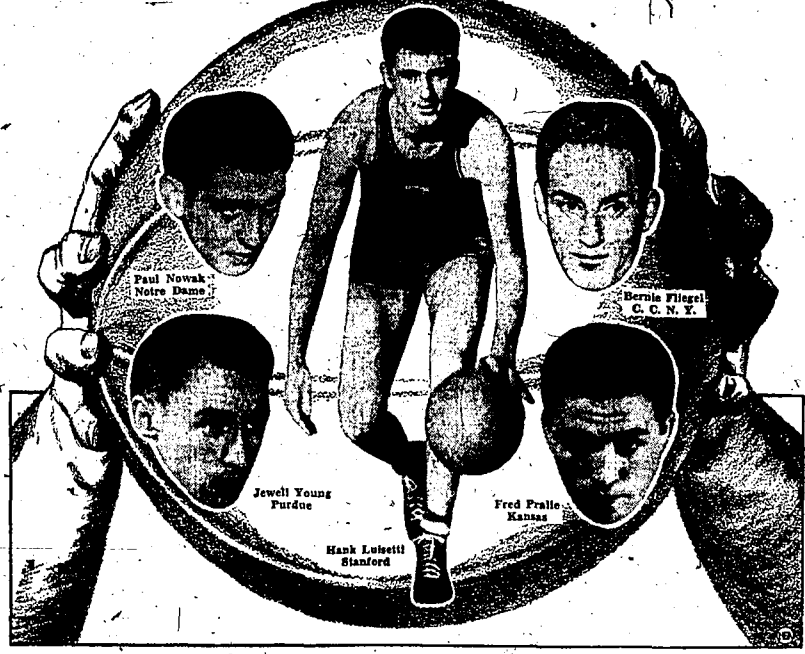

BRITISH CABINET IN EXTRA SESSION ON PEACE POLICY

CHAMBERLAIN TO SEEK APPROVAL OF NEW ISSUES

LONDON, March 22 (AP)—Cabinet ministers were called into emergency session today to approve a new line of foreign policy by which Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain hoped to keep Great Britain, and, if possible, Europe out of a European war.

This session and tomorrow's regular weekly session were concerned almost solely with the correlative problems of foreign policy and national defense.

On the basis of the decisions to be made in the two meetings, Chamberlain was scheduled to make a statement in the house of commons Thursday.

Future Events

Well informed political quarters forecast that the statement would prove a historic one. It will deal with the events of past weeks and will be intended to look into the future.

The cabinet was expected to give Chamberlain authority to declare a broad, comprehensive foreign policy covering every issue in Europe.

As part of this policy, there was growing belief that Chamberlain would "That Great Britain is not prepared to embark on a 'blank check' policy regarding the defense of Czechoslovakia against a possible attack."

World Aid France

(2) That Great Britain will aid France if she is attacked.

(3) That the use of force of restraint must be intensified.

Chamberlain apparently had won the united support of his cabinet for a reserved foreign policy. It seemed that after learning of reports from the continent that they would not welcome British "mediation" in European affairs but would back Britain to the hilt in aiding France and Belgium if they were attacked, cabinet ministers believed that peace and the nation would support Chamberlain.

Health Pupils Given Data on Drug Medicine

Members of all health classes in the junior high school this week are being informed of the use of dangerous drugs in a number of trade-marked medicines advertised and used widely in the United States as pain killers for headaches and other pains and as nose drops in the treatment of colds.

Information on these remedies has been furnished the school by the Consumers Union of New York City. This same information, the Union states, has been published in medical journals and New York papers but the trade marks were omitted.

Any pain relieving compound containing aminopyrine is dangerous and causes 15,000 deaths annually. The chemical name is then listed. Trade marked products containing it which are widely sold.

The nose drops warned against are Lido, which is a type of pneumonia which causes many deaths among children. The dangerous property is given as a mineral oil base.

Medical advice on the use of any type of an advertised remedy for colds is urged by the group. The information on these drugs was disseminated following the wide publicity given the deaths caused by use of sulfanilamide elixir.

The theramin has been termed the most modern of musical instruments and is played by vibration. Tones are produced from a small box which is controlled merely by the waving of the artist's hands. An electrical vibration principle is involved.
