# RAIN ENDS TO HALT FLOOD RISE AT WALLACE

## U. S. Treasury Abandons Gold Sterilization Program Metal Will Enter Credit Channels, Says Morgenthau

WASHINGTON, April 19 (U.P.)—The treasury opened the way today for further enlargement of the vast pool of lendable bank funds in President Roosevelt's recovery drive by abandonment of the gold sterilization program.

Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau jr. announced that the program, which was instituted in 1936 as a brake on credit inflation, was ended and that in the future gold acquired by the government will be permitted to enter credit channels.

Simultaneously, Chairman Jesse H. Jones, of the Reconstruction Finance corporation, appealed to banks in a radio address to join the government in extending credit to the business world. One of the "big three" agencies enlisted in the President's attack on the depression, his said the RFC would direct its \$1,500,000,000 into fields where it will increase employment.

"Lots of Everything"  
"So much has been said about fear," he said, "that we have all become imbued with the idea that something is wrong with the country, when, as a matter of fact, we have never had a greater abundance of everything needed for a really high standard of living than we have now. I am well aware that the banks want to lend and the money try to fit their lending policies to the credit requirements of today rather than yesterday."



Program Ended

The banker's policy is confidence in our country and confidence in our government, and if we demonstrate that confidence by action, better business will follow."

The treasury's action was the latest in a series of steps taken by the government to expand credit, supply money to business, and stimulate spending and lending programs.

**Beneficial Fund**  
Last week the treasury sterilized one million ounces of gold, making available \$1,000,000,000 immediately available for financing the New Deal recovery program. When this money is spent, it will find its way into banks where it will become available to borrowers.

On Saturday the federal reserve board ordered member banks to reduce by one-eighth the amount of money which they are required to keep in reserve against deposits, thus releasing \$750,000,000 additional funds for credit use. The securities and exchange commission also issued regulations to permit private and assist small businessmen in financing themselves through the sale of securities.

## PARIS STRIKERS RETURN TO JOBS

PARIS, April 19 (U.P.)—800 down strikers who had occupied 200 metallurgical factories in the Paris region all but returned to their jobs today. The strikers returned to their jobs today at the end of the Easter holiday.

All 18,000 men were involved in the strikes.

Because of a last minute disagreement on terms of employment, the 7,000 workers at the Renault plant, 35,000 employees were to return to work tomorrow after the smoothing out of technical difficulties which arose. Strikers evacuated the affected plants during the week-end and agreed to return to work after taking the holiday.

## Benefit Payments Boosted on Spuds

WASHINGTON, April 19 (U.P.)—The agricultural adjustment administration today increased benefit payments on potatoes and potatoes and increased the national cotton acreage goal from 27,000,000 to 29,000,000 acres.

The payment rate on potatoes in early producing areas was increased from 3 to 4 cents per bushel and in late producing areas, from 3 to 3.5 cents per bushel.

## LOYALISTS URGE LEAGUE PROBE IN SPAIN CIVIL WAR

GENEVA, April 19 (U.P.)—The Spanish Loyalist government asked today that the question of foreign intervention in the Spanish civil war be put on the agenda of the League of Nations council meeting which begins May 9.

The request came as a surprise—and one certain to prove unpopular to Great Britain.

Britain had promised Italy to raise before the council the question of recognition of the conquest of Ethiopia.

New Proposal  
Now the Loyalist government, which has long accused Italy and Germany of interfering in the war on behalf of the nationalists, threatened to raise anew a problem which had brought near war on more than one occasion.

Only last Saturday, at Barcelona, the Loyalist defense ministry charged that at least 15 Italian airplane pilots landed in the Spanish territory during March despite Italian insistence that the sending of "volunteers" had stopped.

**Headquarters**  
The Loyalist statement quoted Italian pilots captured March 28 on the Catalan front, as authority for the assertion that pilots still were arriving. One was quoted as saying that Italian air force headquarters were at Logrono, in north central Spain east of Burgos.

The pilots also mentioned that during March despite Italian insistence that the sending of "volunteers" had stopped.

"All bombs are made in Italy and shipments of them are arriving continuously. In Logrono there are 150 tons of bombs and munitions stores from Italy."

# Chinese Abandon Offensive

## Chiang Plans To Meet New Nippon Drive

By ROBERT BELLAIRE  
 SHANGHAI, April 19 (AP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek has decided to abandon the Chinese offensive in southern Shantung province to meet an anticipated Japanese drive on Suchow. It was reported today.

Suchow, strategic point on China's "backbone line" along the Lunghai railroad, is one of the key cities in the defense of Hanchow, the provisional Chinese capital.

Chinese reports admitted that their "big swords" failed to fulfill Generalissimo Chiang's order to capture Yihien, on a branch line of the Tientsin-Pukow railroad north of Suchow.

**Troop Concentration**  
 The Chinese reported that Chiang now has ordered his troops concentrated north and south of Suchow to meet an anticipated campaign of Japanese forces against his chief defense line. Reports said that the Chinese were hastily fortifying the area.

Chinese military authorities said that the first signs of the Japanese drive showed in resumption of heavy fighting near Ichi, northeast of Talerhchwang. Three thousand Japanese troops, using 20 heavy field bombardiers the Chinese defenses furiously.

**Rush Reinforcements**  
 The Chinese rushed reinforcements to Ichi. At Hanchow, Chinese forces counter-attacked in an effort to stop the Japanese drive at the opposite end of the Shantung front.

Meanwhile, Chinese and foreign reports indicated that the dispatch of large numbers of Japanese to Shantung was continuing. Several thousand sailed from Shanghai despite activities of Chinese guerrilla units in the Shanghai and Hankow areas.

In Tientsin, large port in Shantung province, United States consular authorities were expected to protest against the treatment allegedly inflicted by the Japanese on an American missionary, Dr. Arthur L. Carson of New York, former professor at Cornell university.

## SANDPOINT DEATH PROBE CONTINUES

SANDPOINT, Ida., April 19 (AP)—Authorities today continued an investigation into the death of Mrs. Georgia Basom, acting on the recommendation of a jury that she failed to return a specific verdict after considering the case yesterday.

Dr. J. W. Hagedorn, who performed an autopsy on the woman's body, that he believed she ended her own life. However, the jury did not place blame for the death, favoring more investigation. Police questioned the woman's husband, Royal, then released him.

Basom told officers he returned the couple's farm home last Thursday and found his wife dead a bullet wound in her head. A note, apparently left for him, indicated the woman killed herself. Basom said the two quarreled earlier in the day.

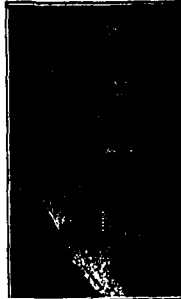

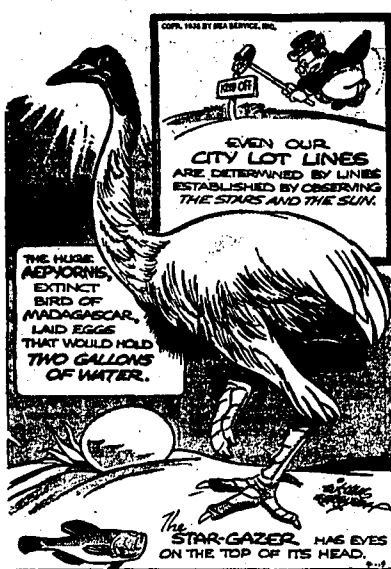

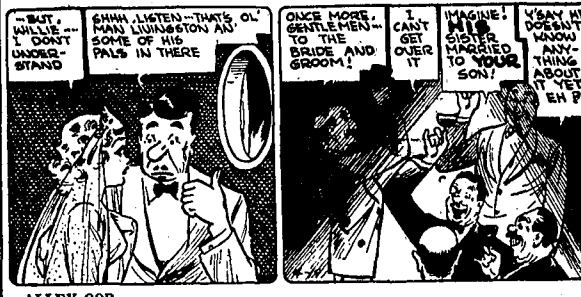

# SOVIET INFLUENCE DROPS IN EUROPEAN PEACE MOVES

## TREATIES SIGNED IN ATTEMPT TO DELAY NEXT WAR

Decline of Soviet Russia's influence may be the most significant by-product of Europe's new campaign to postpone the next war by a series of peace treaties.

These treaties, signed or in process of negotiation and intended eventually to make friends of Great Britain, France, Italy and Germany, are comparable to paper profits on the stock market. The psychological effect is a vital bulwark of peace today but unforeseen developments may wipe out this gain overnight.

Thus the campaign to write off hates and rivalries and create on paper a morally solvent Europe, as the political world has done in the past, may probably come nearer that goal than any modern treaty.

In these negotiations, Russia—once a power in European diplomatic circles—has been reduced to a non-essential role. Two developments today emphasized that role:

The Italian foreign minister Count Galeazzo Ciano announced that Italy, vigorous foe of communism, was ready to sign a treaty of friendship with France, an ally of Russia, and where communists were a potent factor in the government.

In Spain, the fascist-supported insurgents drove their military wedge deeper against the loyalist government of Madrid, the ally of Spanish communist activity—despite a new loyalist offensive in the Madrid area intended to weaken the rebel attack in Asturias.

Both developments tended to lessen the European sphere of the Soviet Union, which was the most aggressive and perhaps the most important factor in European relations.

Two years ago Russia was considered a powerful friend of what is now the Spanish loyalist government. In the meantime, the Soviet Union has formed a military alliance with France, Russia was the eastern protector of Czechoslovakia.

Eligible wool consists of the 1937 clip or the new 1938 wool. Wool on which loans are made must be of 14 inches, standard warehouses, approved by the RFU.
