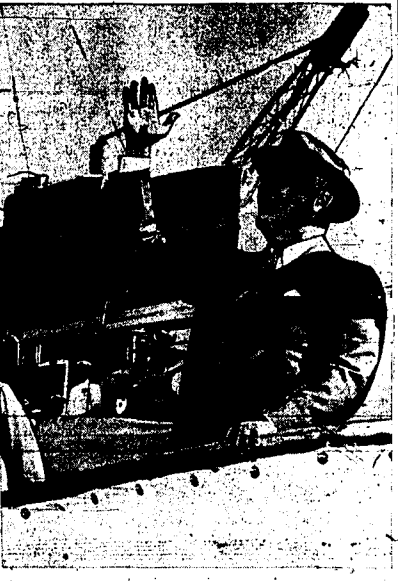

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LA FOLLETTE BLAMES GOP, NEW DEAL FOR NEW PARTY

SOLO ASSERTS MAJOR LEADERS FORGOT PLEDGES

(Copyright, 1938, by United Press) WASHINGTON, May 3 (U.P.—) Robert M. La Follette, former U.S. senator, today said that failure of the two major parties to fulfill campaign pledges had forced his brother, Gov. Philip La Follette, of Wisconsin, to form a new third party, the National Progressives of America.

"Young Bob," son of the late Robert M. La Follette, who led the largest third party movement in history in 1924, said that the vacillating policies of the Democratic and Republican parties, together with the factional fights which have "divided" each party, have placed the country at the most critical political cross-roads since the Civil war.

"I doubt," he said in an interview with the United Press, "if there are any who are willing to assert, without qualification, what kind of Democrats and Republicans there are. There are too many cut issues between them now and there have been none since 1932 except on questions of presidential candidates.

"In 1932, 1934 and again in 1936, the people gave the Democrats a mandate to solve the economic problems but despite overwhelming majorities in congress, internal fights within the party have blocked the entire program.

"I said that a sharp schism in Republican ranks had prevented them from getting together on any more concrete program than the Democrats.

"Popular demand" for determining the extent of the new National Progressive party's activities in the 1938 and 1940 elections, he said.

He said that he and his brother are launching the new "liberal" movement on a long range basis, in contrast to their father's sensational campaign which was based on "rums, rackets and rosters" and resulted in his polling nearly 5,000,000 votes in the 1924 presidential election.

He said that the party will split New Deal ranks and result in the election of "a reactionless president" in 1940, La Follette conceded that the National Progressives might draw strong support from factions in both parties.

Spud Outlook Sees Hope Of Price Gains for 1938

Possible ray of hope in the form of better prices for Idaho potatoes was offered growers today in the U. S. department of agriculture "Outlook" released this afternoon.

The survey of the national spud situation shows a U. S. crop of about four per cent less than last year, and about the same size as that of 1933 with similar geographical distribution. If the 1938 crop approximates that of 1933, according to the USDA review, Idaho growers can expect to receive an average price of somewhere between 75 cents and \$1 per hundred for U. S. No. 1 Russets.

March 1 Intentions The crop size estimate is based on indicated planting intentions of March 1. Those show a national planting of 3,101,700 acres for 1938, as compared with 3,126,200 acres in 1937. This would be the "smallest" planted acreage for at least nine years.

The high yielding areas, Maine and the western states, indicated intention to plant about the same acreage as last year. The 10 western states have been furnishing "more and more of the nation's potato supply," the Outlook says. It adds: "In 1938 both Idaho and the western states as a group will have a larger proportion of the total United States potato acreage than ever before."

Normal Yield Acreage abandonment and yields somewhere near normal are termed the most likely occurrence this year. Under that set-up, the 1938 crop would approximate 348,000,000 bushels—about the same size as in 1933. For the 1932 crop, average price to growers, bulk per hundred, was 75 cents for U. S. No. 1 Russets at Idaho Falls.

The USDA forecast adds that "if little change takes place between now and next fall and winter, wholesale prices will be about 10 per cent higher and consumer incomes about 15 per cent higher than they were in 1933 and 1934. Freight rates will be five per cent, however."

Dr. Thomas Whitney Surette, of the faculty of Black Mountain college, told a New York audience the other day that his college wouldn't take a million dollars if someone offered it...

BRITISH TROOPS OUST JAPANESE AT POINT OF BAYONETS

GUARDS-SEAMEN CLASH OCCURS IN CONSULATE YARD

SHANGHAI, May 8 (AP)—British troops bayoneted Japanese troops at the consulate point of the Garden bridge creek, which separates the British consulate general today in the most serious of a series of clashes which started Sunday.

Two truckloads of British seamen, clad in khaki troop uniforms, sought to cross the Garden bridge across the creek, which separates the international settlement proper from the Japanese Hongkong area, to reach a British gunboat docked at the waterfront.

Japanese sentries challenged both trucks and refused to permit them to pass despite Japanese navy vessels which the Britons presented.

One of the navy trucks, ignored the Japanese and forced its way across the bridge to the gunboat. The second truck back, Japanese followed it inside the compound or courtyard of the British consulate general.

Eye-witnesses said that in the court yard the Japanese pushed aside a British sergeant major, sought to cross the bridge to the gunboat. The British navy men pulled their bayonets from their scabbards and started for the British trucks. They hurried down from the truck and lifted the Japanese.

Japanese flee from the Japanese turned and fled from the British. British army officers said that after the truck returned to the courtyard a Japanese officer tried to "persuade" the sergeant major by the arm.

It is added politely that the Japanese "retired" when the sergeant major returned.

British navy headquarters said they intended to make representations to the Japanese against the incident.
