Society Pioneer is Feted at Mother's Day Event

One of the first pioneer white women in all of southern Idaho from Fort Hall to Boise was honored with a combined Mother's day and birthday dinner yesterday at the historic Stricker's ranch six miles south of Hansen when Mrs. Lucy Stricker's daughters and friends entertained for her.

Mrs. Stricker, who will be 79 years old on May 16, entertained the group of over 30 guests with interesting stories of the first trading post established between Fort Hall and Boise in 1853. She came to the old Rock Creek stage station as a young girl in the 1870's.

Guests were also shown historic plaques on the ranch including the original log store building and stage station which was erected in 1863, the Oregon train canteen and the strong room built from the lava rock as a safe deposit of the old stage depot.

Last month the Sons and Daughters of Idaho Pioneers erected a sandstone marker at Hansen, to commemorate the old Stricker store, which is still standing and is now used as a residence. It is said to be the oldest house standing between Pocatello and Boise.

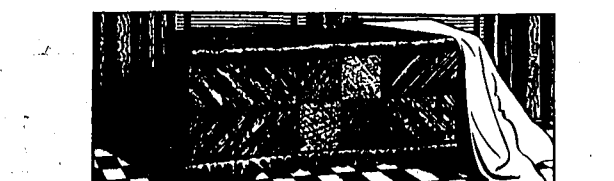

# Selassie Fights Conquest Recognition

## Geneva Opens 101st League Parley Today

By WALLACE CARROLL  
GENEVA, May 9 (AP)—Emperor Haile Selassie started a dramatic last-hour fight before the League of Nations today to prevent world recognition of Italy's conquest of Ethiopia.

To the consternation of statesmen gathered from all over the world for the 101st session of the League of Nations council, it was announced that Ethiopia would fight to the death.

It was believed that the emperor himself was waiting to make a personal appearance before the council.

For his fight against a British plan to obtain the council's blessing for recognition of Ethiopia's conquest by Italy—the essential part of the British-Italian friendship treaty—the emperor had quickly organized one of the most formidable groups of advisers on record to aid him.

Famed Advisers  
Sir Norman Angell, world famous economist and Nobel peace prize winner; Prof. H. Stanley Jevons, British political economist; Prof. J. L. Brierly of London, and Prof. Guston Jese, of the University of Paris, president of the International Institute of Public Law and the foremost French expert in international law, aided L. A. Tazias and Ephrem T. Macheden, Ethiopian government delegates, in the fight.

Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary, abandoned his plan to prevent the appearance of an Ethiopian representative at the council. He realized that the votes of Russia and China, if no other nations, would make it impossible for Italy to win.

Ethiopia was not the only explosive subject to plague the council members as they conferred in hotel sessions today, ready for the first secret session of the council late this afternoon.

Leads to Fight Loyalties  
Julio Alvarez del Vayo, Spanish foreign minister, was ready to fight against alleged Italian and German aid to the nationalists and against the Spanish non-intervention agreement which he asserted served only to deprive the legitimately constituted government of Spain of arms.

China was ready to appeal again for aid against Japanese aggression. There were other delicate problems in the plight of Roumanian and Austrian Jews and the request for complete neutrality to Switzerland, despite any pledges it had made to support collective action by the league.

The final sale list included five used cars, three pieces of farm machinery and an old tractor.

A second auction is planned for late in August, probably in a downtown location, Chairman Detweiler said.

## DEATH DODGERS HEAD FOR BOISE

Packing up their thrill-dealing equipment, the Death Dodgers left here today for Boise, where the circus will be presented next Sunday at the Ada county fairgrounds.

A substantial crowd watched the automobile and motorcycle stunts of the circus troupe at Piler fairgrounds, where the show was offered under sponsorship of the Twin Falls American Legion. Riders through fire and other similar stunts brought applause from the stands.

A sensation—of-the-big-balloon—which didn't get up in last year's circus because of poor weather—provided a highlight Sunday. With "Lucky" Fordyce presiding, the "Skip" Fordyce presiding as the bag was filled, the balloon sailed up under impetus of a combination of hydrogen and burned sugar and glycerin. The bag, when filled, stood 80 feet high and 40 feet across. Its 1,200 yards of cloth required 600 cubic feet of smoke to carry it upward.
