MEXICO SEVERES BRITISH RELATIONS

Attorney Demands Retraction of Clark Statement

CROWLEY JOINS IN ATTACKS ON IDAHO'S LEADER
 By DAVID N. JOHNSON
 BOISE, May 14 (UP)—Ariel L. Crowley, former state assistant attorney-general, today demanded that Governor Barzilla Clark "unequivocally retract" a statement in which the governor quoted Crowley as saying he had been asked to defend a state official free of cost in a civil suit.

The governor alleged in the statement that Crowley's expenses were being paid by appropriations from the chief executive's emergency fund under the guise they were to be used in defraying "office work" for a high state official.

The governor said in the statement that he had granted an appropriation of \$500 from his special fund but had directed a second request for \$150. Crowley allegedly told him he was defending the official free of cost.

The governor said in his statement that it was "entirely proper" to be indirectly paying for the official's defense.

"Utterly False"

Crowley said the governor's statement was "utterly false," that he had never had such a conversation with the governor and said that it (Continued on Page 2, Column 2)

British Residents in Shanghai Angered by Japanese Bayonetting

 SHANGHAI, May 14 (UP)—British residents threatened independent retaliation against Japanese today unless their government avenged the bayonetting of an unarmed British subject by a Japanese soldier.

British consular authorities, admitting candidly that they regarded the incident the most serious of the entire Japanese-Chinese war, urged the British residents' association to postpone a mass meeting to consider direct action to protect Britons in Shanghai against Japanese attack.

There was open talk of a break of relations.

Diplomatic quarters heard that the British authorities had dispatched a report of the strongest nature to London and that the report implied that the incident might warrant a break of diplomatic relations. The British consulate general denied this.

Thoroughly Angered

But it was indicated that British authorities and British military officials were thoroughly angry. British consular heads said that the present incident was even more serious than the Japanese airplane attack on the Hughes Steamship Co. in the Yellow Sea, then British ambassador to China, because it was aggravated by deliberate Japanese insults to the highest British representatives in Shanghai.

E. S. Wilkinson, a British naturalist and a special contributor to the New China Daily News, was walking through the Japanese consulate in Shanghai.

REPUBLICANS END COMMITTEE MEET
 CHICAGO, May 14 (UP)—Directors of the Republican committee on program returned today to their regional posts to organize a staff of agricultural, labor and business leaders which will be assigned to conduct "an open and honest audit" of the Roosevelt administration.

The "research" system was agreed upon at the closing session of a two-day conference between Dr. Glenn Frank, committee chairman, and his nine regional assistants. The staff will be organized under a "division of studies."

"The audit will be open and honest," Frank said. "These experts will study the entire New Deal setup, select those policies which they believe should be discarded and discontinue those which can be retained."

Eclipse of Moon Puts Lantern in Idaho Sky
 The moon went into eclipse above south central Idaho early today, but hundreds of residents of the entire area discovered that it didn't disappear during total eclipse.

At half-eclipse, the upper section of the moon was in deep red shadow. And at totality, the entire surface loomed dull inside the rim—which hung above southern Idaho like a Japanese lantern over the skyline.

As each portion became covered by the steadily advancing shadow of the earth, the murky outline of the moon remained visible to mark the progress of the eclipse.

Several hundred Twin Falls residents climbed out of bed during early morning hours to peek out windows and congregate on lawns. Telephones rang unexpectedly in scores of homes and apartments as

friends called each other with the admonition: "Look what's happening to the moon!"

One apartment dweller on Shoshone street remarked: "It gave me an eerie feeling to think about being on the planet whose shadow was creeping across the moon."

The spectacle at about 2 a. m. resembled a huge ball of fire with the flame dying out to a glow, which shed a reddish-orange tinge around the whole.

As the eclipse approached, the moon took on a lop-sided appearance while the earth's shadow was moving over the surface of its satellite.

The shadow seemed to come directly from the left side and went directly across the moon. At about 1:15 a. m. here the moon was about four-fifths covered and a few minutes later, several thousand dollars.

Gas Masks to Be Bought by Every Czech
 PRAGUE, May 14 (UP)—Czechoslovakia, preparing urgently against the possibility of war, today ordered every citizen of the Prague area to obtain an officially stamped gas mask by Dec. 31 under penalty of fine or imprisonment.

Police, promulgating the decree, said that men, women and children were covered. A price of 85 crowns (\$3) was set for the standard mask with the provision that poor persons might apply for a discount according to their necessities. There is a six-litre model, somewhat more comfortable, at 120 crowns (\$5.00).

BIDS ASKED FOR 9-PLANE HANGAR
 Bids were being asked this afternoon for construction of a new nine plane hangar at the local airport.

 MADERA, Calif., May 14 (UP)—Authorities today conducted a wide-spread search for a migratory ranch worker whom they wished to question regarding automobile registration papers found in the Texas brush, near the place where Mrs. Hazel Fromm and her daughter, Nancy, of Berkeley, were slain on March 30.

Working in the belief they had uncovered a possible clue to the solution of the slayings, deputies launched a systematic hunt for the same motor number as that on the registration papers was discovered in a garage here yesterday.

Under Sheriff Ernest Pickett's direction he knew the name of the ranch worker sought, but he expected to locate him today.

The sheriff's guard told Pickett the car was sold to Samuel H. Kelly, also a ranch worker, but that before payment on it was completed he turned it over to an unidentified man who failed to make payments.

The car was repossessed by the garage, several days after the slayings occurred, at the John Stevenson ranch in Fresno county. The ranch is unoccupied now.

Although garage men could not recall the name of the man to whom Kelly "sold" the car, they told deputies they believed he was still working in the vicinity.

There seemed no doubt that Hay meant to remind Britain that it owed more than \$4,000,000,000 to the United States on the war debt.

What a high and unimpeachable government, once called a suspension of relations, as opposed to a formal break, was an outgrowth of the government's action in expropriating \$400,000,000 worth of foreign oil properties.

Britain took a most far-sighted and laudable course in demanding return of the properties and Mexico was not slow to point the finger against the attitude and boldness of Secretary of State Cordell Hull and Ambassador Gifford Pinchot.

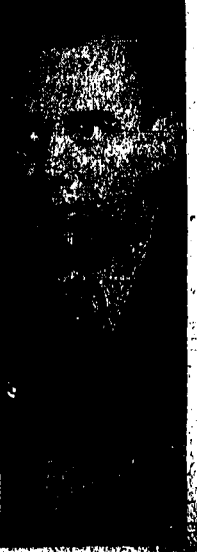
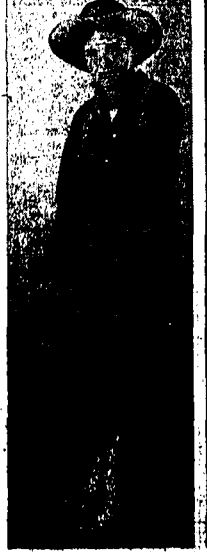
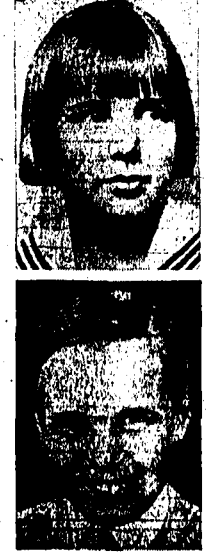
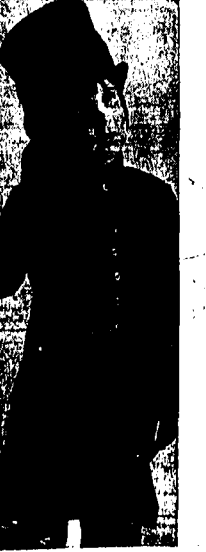
British Ship Is Sunk in Air Raid

MUSSOLINI SPEECH LASHES UNITED STATES ATTITUDE

SAYS DICTATORS WOULD JOIN FOR 'PEACE DEFENSE'

GENOVA, May 14 (Special)—Prestier Benito Mussolini told 800-900 widely cheering Italians today that if the democracies wanted to wage a war of ideas against dictatorship, the totalitarian states would close themselves into one bloc.

His hearers, massed in Victory square where he spoke from the tribune, grew more and more excited as he referred to the United States when he said: "The aims of the program are clear and they are simple. First, one, Nazi Germany also wants peace. But this peace must be an armed peace."

It was recalled Secretary of State Cordell Hull in a statement at Washington Thursday said that the United States would continue its policy of non-interference in the conquest of Ethiopia.

Likewise in Washington last week Secretary of War George D. Bache, in a speech directed at the dictatorship nations, said a "wave of indignation" might sweep over the democracies if they were to consider too far "that would make it extremely difficult to keep the peace."

Mussolini spoke with even more vigor in his usual cant and in a manner that had the appearance of repair of more cautious diplomats. Faithful to Germany. He said he would remain faithful to his new friendship with Germany and that he was ready to meet the treaty with Great Britain everlastingly.

With France as progressing as continued, "I do not know whether they will be successful because they want a Barcelona (Spanish) victory and we want a Franco (Spanish nationalist) victory."

—This—the first hint from any quarter in Italy—of France that agreement with France on a treaty of friendship was not absolutely certain.
