Says Credit High

JAPAN HITS SLEDGE-HAMMER BLOW AT CHINESE LINES

"SAVES FACE" BY SMASHING HOLES IN RAIL DEFENSE

Japan's military sledge-hammer today with a sledge-hammer blow through the greatest Chinese defense line since the great wall.

Japanese troops, artillery and bombing planes crashed through the northern front-scene of Japan's military defeat a few weeks ago—and claimed to have broken Chinese lines along the vital Lung-hai railroad, which is the key to China's very capital at Hankow.

Cape Out Section

Sections were carved out of the important east-west railroad on both sides of the junction at Hanchow, which was encircled and attacked with loss of 800 lives among civilians alone.

Many thousands of Chinese troops were reported trapped in the city, bridges were blown up to prevent military movement along the railroad and the station regarded as the gateway to Hanchow, was in Japanese hands.

Chingchow, another strategic railroad junction west of Hanchow, was bombarded with grave danger to American and other foreign interests.

Chinese discounted the extent of Japan's advance, but their defense armies, estimated up to 800,000 men, admittedly were in retreat from the Hanchow area. Their only line of counter-attack rested with guerrilla armies reported ready to slash at the Japanese communication lines.

Joy in Tokyo

The Japanese victory was essential to re-establishment of the invaders' military prestige. After their recent disaster at Pailowang, near Hanchow, and the news was awaited as a signal for vital celebration in Tokyo and elsewhere. But in addition to its "face saving" significance, complete success in the Hanchow area would open the way for seizure of the entire railroad line to link the Japanese-controlled territory in the north with the area setled around Shanghai and Nanking.

Strategically, the Hanchow area would be greatly weakened.

Meanwhile, the United States diplomatic difficulties in regard to Mexico continued. A report from London that Great Britain eventually might ask the state department to handle its interests in Mexico as a result of a separation of Anglo-Mexican relations due to Mexico's expropriation of oil land.

The state of rebellion against Mexican President Lázaro Cárdenas were heard from San Luis Potosí state, had appeared unlikely to develop.

Returning Codiello, military leader of San Luis Potosí, had a friendly telephone talk with the president and the area was reported calm.

WOMAN SCALDS BABY TO DEATH

SALT LAKE CITY, May 16 (UP)—Mrs. Clella Winn, 40, told authorities today that murder was in her heart when she assertedly put her two-year-old daughter in a tub of boiling water and held her there until she was burned fatally.

"I didn't know it was my own child though," she was quoted as telling Deputy Sheriff Dominick Burns.

Mrs. Winn is held under guard in the psychiatric ward at the county hospital while authorities investigated the case. Sheriff's officers said she may be charged with first degree murder.

Deputy Sheriff R. C. Jackson said Mrs. Winn confessed that she placed her baby in a tub of boiling water.

The child died within an hour at the hospital of third degree burns from the neck down. Neighbors who heard the child's screams summoned officers, and Mrs. Winn was found in a hysterical condition.

Deputy Jackson said Mrs. Winn told him that after killing the baby she intended to take her own life. She gave no reason for the crime.

Mrs. Winn is the mother of two other small children, but made no attempt to harm them.

Robert Winn, the baby's father, arrived home soon after the tragedy and accompanied Shirley to a hospital. He was unable to explain his wife's action.

BLAZE DESTROYS BROODER HOUSE

PAUL, May 16 (Special)—Chickens, two wheels of a motor-truck and several hundred bushels of grain were included in the loss sustained Sunday afternoon when fire destroyed a brooder house on the

branch of Mrs. Fred Lee, three miles north of Paul.

Mrs. Lee discovered the blaze when she visited the brooder house after a group of Sunday guests departed. Without a phone and with no close neighbors, she had no means of fighting the fire at once.

Neighbors who saw the flames, and others called from Paul, rushed to the scene as soon as they were aware of the fire and succeeded in preventing spread to the ranch house and other buildings.

A number of chickens were removed but the bulk of the brooder

bens refused to leave and were burned to death. The truck, wheels and grain, also lost, had been stored in the brooder house.

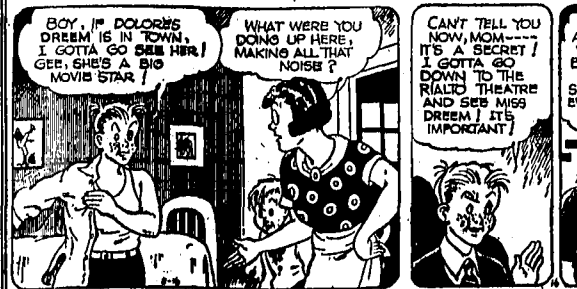

The session was to allocate areas to be used as recreation grounds to various temporary uses planned this summer before the permanent development gets underway, according to Chairman Stanton O. Hale.

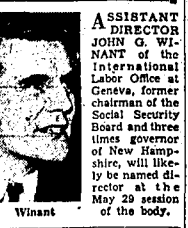
