CIO Candidates Lose in Pennsylvania Elections

Jones Wins Governor's Nomination

PHILADELPHIA, May 18 (U.P.)—Apparently repudiating leadership of national chairman James A. Farley on the basis of incomplete primary election returns, Pennsylvania Democrats today seemed to be rejecting the candidacy of Thomas Kennedy, of the CIO brain trust, for governor. The whole primary trend appeared to be against the CIO and its chairman, John L. Lewis.

Returns were not conclusive. But with 6,978 precincts unreported, Kennedy, a lieutenant of Lewis in the committee for industrial organization, was running some 100,000 votes behind his leading rival, Charles Alvin Jones, Pittsburgh lawyer. Jones was the pick of the state Democratic organization.

Gov. George H. Meade, Jr., who was Jones' organization ticket running mate, apparently was safely nominated for United States senator over Mayor E. Davis Wilson of Philadelphia, who ran with Kennedy.

Republican Name Jones
Pennsylvania Republicans nominated conservative Judge Arthur H. James for governor, rejecting the come-back candidacy of 73-year-old Clifford Pinchot who was backed by his opponents with the New Deal and the CIO. Pinchot denied any such connection. He conceded James' nomination was a factor in the counting as the conservative entry piled up a lead which assured him individual vote getting honors.

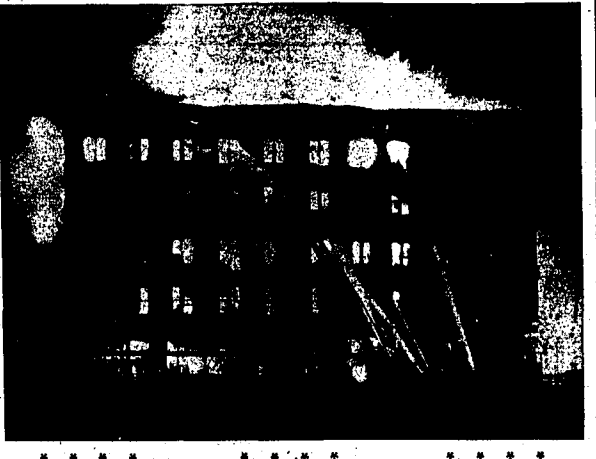
A striking factor today as the counting progressed was the generally heavy Republican vote which was topping Democratic aggregates.

The only heavy break away from organization sales in either party came in an incomplete return to the Republican senatorial contest where James J. Davis, R., Pa., who campaigned with Pinchot, was leading the G.O.P. regular state candidate, G. Mason Elliott.

Five thousand, eight hundred nine-six of 8,076 precincts gave: 2 to governor, Democrat Thomas Kennedy, 359,520; Charles J. Martigelli, 140,018; Charles Alvin Jones, 468,879.

33 Known Dead in Southern Hotel Fire

Death Toll Hits 33 in Hotel Fire

ATLANTA, Ga., May 18 (U.P.)—The finding of seven more bodies in the ruins of the five-story Terminal hotel which burned Monday morning increased the death toll today to 33. Firemen continued to dig in the wreckage, believing that there might be more dead.

CITY FILES PLEA FOR LIBRARY AID

Formal application for a \$22,500 PWA grant to aid in construction of the contemplated library building was made this afternoon. It was approved by Mayor Lem A. Chaplin.

If the application for the grant receives favorable approval by the PWA authorities the city's share of the funds, which will amount to approximately \$7,500, will probably be sought in a bond election, officials said.

Local residents recently turned down a bond election which, among other items called for construction of the library building. At that time, however, the entire expense of \$30,000 was to be provided by the bonds. Under the present plan, if PWA approval is given the application, the \$22,500 from the government would be a direct grant to the city and the balance would be all the city would be forced to supply.

The formal application for the library project was made after city officials, including Mayor Chaplin, Finance Commissioner Paul Taber, conferred with C. O. Heckley of Portland, northern regional director for the PWA. The conference was held Monday at 4 p.m. Delegations from Buhl, Elmer and Kimberly were present as well as representatives of the Rock Creek highway district.

'Bad Blood' Revealed in Trials at Harlan

LONDON, Ky., May 18 (U.P.)—There was "bad blood" today behind the little strain of rope where defendants sat waiting for completion of the jury which will judge their guilt or innocence in the Harlan county mine conspiracy case.

One of the defendants has accused another of trying to break the ribs of the defendant who killed him. The accusation was made before the senate civil liberties committee months ago, but the "bad blood" did not develop until Hugh Taylor was arrested yesterday and brought into court to sit with the other defendants accused of having conspired to violate the Wagner labor relations act.

Taylor took his seat in the same section of the courtroom where Frank White, another defendant, was sitting. A fifth yellow rope separates the defendants—mine executives and former Harlan county peace officers—from the rest of the courtroom. Each day the defendants, who are in one hall, file into the courtroom and when the last man is in the top goes up.

White and Taylor were deputy sheriffs.

objection in attack
According to his testimony before the senate civil liberties committee, Taylor objected when he was ordered to attack Marshall Musick, a union organizer. He said that White and other deputies became angry at him because of the refusal. Taylor swore that he went to the sheriff and pleaded after the Musick home was raided with bullets and Bennett Musick, son of Marshall Musick, was killed. When he did that, he said, White warned him to "keep your mouth shut or you'll go down, too."

A few days later, Taylor testified, he was in his automobile on this road near High Split.

"White came up in another car," Taylor told the senate committee. (Continued on Page 2, Column 3)

Need for small reservoirs in outlying districts throughout Idaho will occupy the discussion spotlight Friday as the delegates to the Idaho State Reclamation association convention meet in annual session in Twin Falls. It was announced this afternoon by N. V. Sharp, Elmer, chairman of the organization.

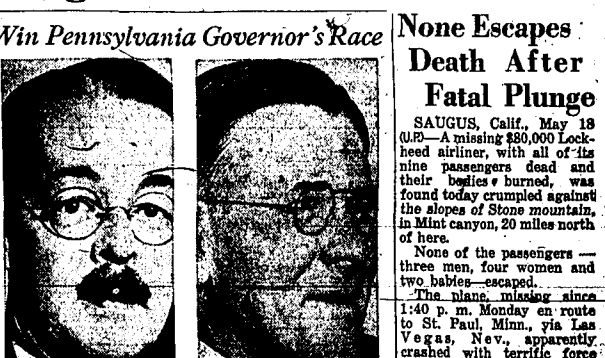

Bright Prospects
In a letter to members, William E. Welsh, Boise, state secretary, said today that "prospects for the completion of Idaho's reclamation program are bright today. More than it has been for several years." He pointed out that it "now appears" that funds will be available for reclamation purposes.

Also scheduled for consideration during the convention will be the 1938 revision of the national resource committee's report on irrigation, basin problems and programs, which for the last six years has been the subject of a study which will also be soon enough to "permit visitors to return home" the same day, according to Mr. Sharp.

Officers Hunt for Ogden Plane Thieves

INCOM, Idaho, May 18 (U.P.)—Sheriff's officers and ranchers conducted an intensive hunt in this area today for two bandits who escaped when their stolen airplane crashed up near here yesterday.

Two sets of footprints showed in the soft mud beside the wrecked plane.

The plane, stolen from Ogden municipal airport early yesterday, was demolished.

The officers believe the men they are seeking are Earl Gilbert, 23, ex-convict of Fairview, Idaho, and Roland "Red" Hall, 19, of Preston, Idaho.

Meanwhile, Val Zimmer, head of the Salt Lake City field office of the federal bureau of investigation, announced his office was cooperating in the hunt. Gilbert is wanted by federal agents for questioning in connection with an interstate automobile theft.

The stolen plane was found yesterday afternoon by Hester G. Pratt, an Inkom rancher. The ship was upside down, with both wings off.

Tracks beside the plane led eastward, and today the hunt centered in the Buckskin between Inkom and Fobbe, Idaho.

The search also spread westward toward Twin Falls after a motorist, Bert Palmer, told of picking up a "nervous" hitch-hiker near Inkom late yesterday.

He said he brought the man as far as the Fortuna checking station. There, Palmer said, the man left the car and walked toward Fobbe.

He had told Palmer during the search that he was going to Twin Falls and wanted to get there as soon as possible.

The hiker said he was from Logan, Utah, Palmer told police.

None Escapes Death After Fatal Plunge

SAGUGUS, Calif., May 18 (U.P.)—A missing \$20,000 Lockheed airliner, with all of its nine passengers dead and the pilot missing, was found today crumpled against the slopes of Stone mountain, in Mint canyon, 20 miles north of here.

None of the passengers—three men, four women and two babies—escaped.

The plane, missing since 1:40 p. m. Monday en route to St. Paul, Minn., via Las Vegas, Nev., apparently crashed with terrific force and burst into a mass of flames.

FROST MAY HURT FRUIT CROP HERE

Fruit growers of the Twin Falls area were warned this afternoon that frost of possibly a killing intensity is forecast here tonight.

The warning came from the U. S. weather bureau at Boise, which combined its report from the bureau of entomology here that temperatures dropped to an even freezing—32 degrees last night.

"The frost forecast was predicted for all of southern Idaho in the past 24 hours and a heavy snow flurry at 9:40 a. m. today, followed by brief but cold rain at intervals.

"Burst of tonight's cold will be from the south, according to word from Boise. The state department of agriculture at the capital warned fruit growers the ready to combat the frost should it attain killing temperature.

The prediction brought possible menace to apples, peaches, prunes, wine crops and, to some extent, cherries.

It was indicated unofficially here this afternoon that if the mercury drops down 30 or below, snow damage "might" be extensive in this region and in the Buhl and Hagerman areas.

Heavy snow at Boise
Snow in Twin Falls was of short duration, and resembled a combination of a blizzard and a snow storm, however, the snow was the heaviest single fall recorded for May since 1922.

Temperature in temperatures today followed heavy winds all last night. Temperature in Twin Falls yesterday were 67 high and 42 low. The low of 32 today came about 9 a. m.

HAMILTON SEES GOP WIN IN FALL

WASHINGTON, May 18 (U.P.)—Champion John D. Hamilton, leader of the Republican national committee, termed the Pennsylvania primary a rebuke to President Roosevelt, today predicted a Republican victory in the fall elections.

Hamilton joined Republican congressional leaders in claiming the Pennsylvania primary as a rebuke to the turn of the tide against the New Deal.

Pennsylvania will lead the nation in the fall in returning a Republican government of this country, state as well as federal, back to a sane, sound administration in the people's interest, Hamilton said.

The state has cracked the New Deal and all its radical and crack-brained allies, the Pennsylvania representative said in the handwriting on the wall.



NATIONAL P. T. A. SPEAKER HITS PROPAGANDA IN COLLEGES

J. REUBEN CLARK LASHES FOREIGN POLITICAL CREED

SALT LAKE CITY, May 18 (Special)—J. Reuben Clark, Jr., Salt Lake City, former ambassador to Mexico, today charged that "some of our best colleges are hotbeds for the propagating of un-American theories of government and for the ridiculing of our constitution."

Clark's charges were made in an address before the general assembly of the 42nd annual Congress of Parents and Teachers.

"There is a wide difference between academic freedom and academic license," Clark said.

Clark, first counselor in the first presidency of the Latter Day Saints church, said that one principle of government forbade teaching of religious dogma in the schools.

"That same principle should apply to any political creed that is alien or hostile to the American system of government," he said. He suggested a control over teachers and subjects taught in the schools.

Shonda Traxler was the president of the assembly.

"Measures necessary to insure the preservation of our society will not violate our liberties," he declared.

The purpose of education, he said, should be to train a man "to do the useful thing in society, for the doing of which God has best endowed him." The idea that material work is degrading has no place in education, he said.

"Men should not be classified by the work they do," he added.

"To me," he said, "true education is that teaching, training and experience which best fits a man to do the useful thing in society, in society and in public service."

"But," he added, "men must return to the faith that to all mankind, not to some only, 'man' must earn bread by the sweat of his brow," which means that he would eat what he sows.

"It is a phase of a world-wide challenge with which education is face to face."

Dr. Recipe for Problems
Dr. Adam B. Bennion, Salt Lake City, assistant to the president of the Utah Power and Light company, was the speaker last night at a congress banquet session in Salt Lake City.

"There is no recipe which offers an easy solution of the problems presented by group living," he said. "Basically most of the problems we now face are not new to civilization."

Successful group living, he said, rested on the same fundamental principles, "whether in our time or 2,200 years ago in the time of Jesus."

Group living, according to Dr. Bennion, needs a worthy goal, leadership of vision, sound thinking, team work and spiritual power.
