# Writers are Human, Too, Says Vivacious Poetess

Writers lead a life just like any other person engaged in making a living, and they're human beings, too.

That's the impression gained by talking with Irene Welch Grison, poet laureate of Idaho since 1923, a post which is held by decree of a governor at that time, C. C. Moore, and the legislature of Idaho.

It's Hard Work

A small and vivacious woman with wavy white hair, Mrs. Grison is full of the joy of creative work but she doesn't hesitate to warn any aspirant that writing is hard work and hard fact to rise to the top. In when writing, she said, she "works, and works hard on a definite schedule."

The most valuable thing in writing," she stated emphatically in an interview, "is to have a sense of humor. And added with a sparkle of her own, "Make it your cake rather than your bread and butter," in stressing the importance of not taking writing too seriously, "big money," she urged that it be treated as a side issue which will provide untold joy.

"The difference between the rankling writer and the successful one," she pointed out, is the amount of work put in by those who make their living in no other way and have achieved real success. By this means they perfect their technique.

Fiction Pays Better

She prefers verse to fiction but stated frankly that fiction pays far better than poetry. However, she said, fiction and especially novel writing involves an immense amount of work. She cited the "big-time" authors who rewrite their books many a time before they are considered them ready for the publisher. She herself rewrites hers three times, six months' work.

"But," she repeated, "write without the hope of making a living and you'll be happier."

# DEATH OF YOUTH CALLED ACCIDENT

A coroner's jury today had found that 13-year-old Billy Don Schueurer, who died Tuesday night after a bicycle-motor vehicle crash, came to his death as the result of an unavoidable accident.

The jury, hearing testimony yesterday afternoon at the White Mountain chapel, found that Howard Haggard, 21, driver of the motor and also a friend of the Schueurer family, drove the machine "without criminal negligence."

Only eye witness to the fatal accident was Haggard, who testified that the youth had turned in front of him just as he was about to enter the driveway of his home one mile south of South Park. Other witnesses, including Sheriff E. F. Prater and State Traffic Officer V. K. Barron, told of investigation made into the accident.

Immediately following the crash young Schueurer was rushed to the hospital by Haggard but died within two hours. Death, according to records, was the result of a fractured skull.

## OFFICIALS PLAN PROTEST ON RAID TO REBEL HEADS

By RALPH HEINEREN  
 PARIS, May 27 (U.P.)—Premier Edouard Daladier today ordered the general commanding the XVI military district to investigate the bombing of Cerbere on the Spanish frontier, and to take all measures necessary for defense against further raids, including dispatch of additional anti-aircraft batteries.

Daladier asked Cesar Campinchi, minister of marine, to send several warships now in Spanish waters to Port Vendres, at the frontier, to support land batteries against any planes that violated the frontier.

Officials plan protest. Officials were ready, if the reports prove correct, to protest to the nationalist administration at Burgos.

It was indicated, in first reports, that the bombing was unintentional, but considerable damage was done and one Frenchman was reported slightly wounded.

News of the bombing reached Paris too late for comment in any newspaper but the Communist party organ L'Humanite, which called it the reward of the Spanish non-intervention committee at London for "capitulating" to the nationalists.

However, as regards the "capitulation," reports here indicated that even though the committee might by agreement close the French frontier tonight against a flow of munitions to the loyalists, the loyalists already had in some manner—some enormous supply of war material.

New Field Equipment. It was asserted here that in their new offensive on the northern part of the Catalanian front, the loyalists have thrown into the line 200 new tanks, new artillery and new airplanes into action. It was estimated in some quarters that the loyalists were using at least 200 new fighting planes, more than 100 tanks and more than 150 pieces of artillery.

Estimates were that the loyalists today might have as many as 800 fighting planes and 200 bombers, and the nationalist forces were being challenged the nationalist for aerial supremacy all along the Catalanian front. The nationalist raid on Algeria was attributed by loyalist sources to increased loyalist activity.

Made in Russia. It was asserted that most of the new planes were made in Russia. The nationalist raid on Algeria, the auxiliary aviation supplies received by the loyalists, included new motors which were installed on old planes that had been grounded for months for lack of first rate motors.

There was some belief that the nationalist raid on Algeria was designed to force the loyalists to take some of their planes from the Catalanian front and restore supremacy to the insurgents.

# Broiled Steak Will Perk up Jaded Palate

The perfectly broiled, tender, juicy steak is a treat at any time for dinner, and with modern methods making preparation easy, it is also a favorite meat with housewives, particularly when the weather is warm and apathy is widespread. Nor is there anything so capable of perking up jaded appetites as a nicely broiled steak.

"In the past broiling has been considered a very quick method of cooking, but according to the newer ideas on broiling," says Ines S. Willson, noted Chicago home economist, "broiling is easier and produces a more satisfactory result if it is done at a slower pace."

So thoroughly preheat the broiling oven with the regulator set at "high" and instead of placing the steak close to the flame or heating element, put it so there is a distance of at least three inches between the top of steak and source of heat. This insures that the broiling is done at a moderate temperature, and makes turning more than once unnecessary. If the distance must be less, reduce the temperature accordingly. When one side is nicely browned, season with salt and pepper, turn and finish the cooking on the second side.

Jack Wilson halted the Indians for the second straight time by pitching the Red Sox to an 8-4 triumph. Wilson held the Indians to five hits and fanned six.

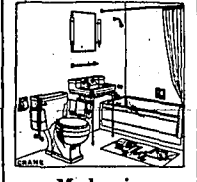

## WASTED LEADER HIS DECEPTION, POOR HANDLING

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—Dr. Arthur E. Morgan claimed today that he still is chairman of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

He made the claim in an open letter to Dr. Harcourt A. Morgan, whom President Roosevelt appointed chairman after depriving Arthur Morgan as head of the New Deal project.

Morgan made his claim after testimony before a joint congressional committee in which he charged directors H. A. Morgan and David L. Lilienthal with mismanagement, deception of the public, the President and congress, and hypocrisy.

H. A. Morgan and Lilienthal responded with charges, accusations of wildly "vicious" attacks, and speaking diatribes over the board, and conspiring to prevent Lilienthal's re-appointment.

Signs Letter "Chairman"

Addressing his letter to H. A. Morgan, he signed himself as "chairman" of the TVA. In the text of the letter, he referred to H. A. Morgan as "vice-chairman." He gave no explanation of this apparent challenge of the president's power to remove him.

During the controversy, it had been reported that Morgan might attempt to court action in an attempt to overturn President Roosevelt's order, based on charges of mismanagement.

Morgan, however, gave no hint of his plans other than to make it plain he still considers himself chairman.

He defended his proposal to study the values of real estate man and their place in modern society, a proposal attacked yesterday by H. A. Morgan. He said that someone would rather try to sell Muscle Shoals, the TVA's most important activities of the TVA, than "use" as a selling "device."

Meanwhile, Sen. James P. Pope, D., Ia., disclosed that the President had asked H. A. Morgan to have the TVA start "at the earliest possible moment," in conjunction with the departments of agriculture and interior, a technical investigation of the phosphate problem.

## LDS TO OPPOSE ENGLISH RULING

SALT LAKE CITY, May 27 (AP)—Officials of the Latter-Day Saints church said today they will oppose an attempt to give British law which requires alien missionaries in South Africa to file a permanent residency card.

Harold G. Reynolds, secretary of the church missionary department, said the LDS officials have instructed the president of the South African branch to oppose immediate negotiations with the British authorities.

Reynolds also announced that 25 church missionaries will leave June 15 aboard the S. S. Manhattan from New York City to take up church work in Durban, Natal.

Joseph E. Evans, church bishop and Ogden attorney, will leave June 15 aboard the S. S. Washington to assume charge of the French mission with headquarters at Le Havre, Belgium. The mission includes all of France and Belgium as well as a part of the Netherlands. Evans will be accompanied by his wife and three children.
