Hints on Home CANNING

The plenty of home canning going on these days—so here are a few hints for the housewife who is storing away winter food.

Check over your equipment. If a pressure cooker is available, it should be used for processing vegetables. It canning in water bath is that it is equipped with rack and cover. Kettles, knives and other articles for preparing products are found in every kitchen.

Successful home canning depends upon two things: Killing or rendering inactive bacteria present on food and preventing their recontamination by sealing the sterilized product in air-tight jars. From this you see the importance of carefully examining tops of jars to see that they are free from nicks, cracks and sharp edges that would prevent a seal.

Follow reliable time tables carefully. When canning in water bath keep water at rolling boil for entire processing time and be sure it covers jars at least one inch over top. In canning pressure cooker, allow steam to escape at least seven minutes then close valve and bring pressure to desired number.
