### State Examiners Study Toll Bridge Purchasing

**Board Hears Delegations For, Against**

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—The state board of examiners went into executive session today to determine whether the state shall lease with option to buy the Twin Falls-Jerome inter-county toll bridge.

Such action by the state would have the effect of lifting the toll and making the structure free to passage by farmers and residents on both sides of the Snake river.

### Loyalist Troops Dynamite Spans in Fast Retreat

HENDAYE, French-Spanish Frontier, June 14 (AP)—Loyalist forces dynamited bridges along the Rio Miñares, five miles south of the port of Castellon de la Plana, in a rapid retreat toward Valencia today.

Orders for withdrawal were so urgent that 3,000 loyalists were trapped on the north bank of the river when loyalist forces evacuated the town of Almazora and blew up bridges.

Four loyalist battalions, fighting a rear guard action, were stranded on the north bank and captured by the nationalists, who advanced down the coast road from Castellon.

### Miners Await Rescue from 300-Foot Pit

ASHLAND, Pa., June 14 (AP)—Three hundred feet underground in a nearby mine, a month-old anthracite miner and his 17-year-old son awaited rescue today.

The miner, Peter Shinkowsky, 48, and his son, Peter, Jr., were trapped when timbering was knocked down yesterday in the crude mine—one of the "bootleg" holes which unemployed miners have dug on the property of companies in the anthracite district.

### ENGLAND PLANS NO RETALIATION IN SHIP SINKINGS

LONDON, June 14 (AP)—The British government has considered various methods of retaliation for the bombing of British ships in Spanish waters, but is not prepared at present to embark on such measures.

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the house of commons today in reply to nation-wide resentment against his failure to take drastic action.

### Senate Approval Is Needed Before Sending to FDR

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—The 75th congress moved a step nearer adjournment today when the house approved and sent to the senate for immediate action the compromise wage-hour conference report.

Senate approval, sending the measure to the White House for President Roosevelt's signature, was expected to follow later today.

The house, driving toward adjournment Wednesday or Thursday, approved the compromise after brief debate and proceeded to consideration of the next major adjournment task—the conference report on the \$3,763,000,000 recovery bill.

### Idaho Can Legally Purchase Bridge, Says Ira Masters

In a special statement from Boise to the Idaho Evening Times, Ira H. Masters, secretary of state, today stated that it now appears that the state board of examiners has the authority to spend money on the purchase of the Twin Falls-Jerome inter-county bridge.

"In the opinion of the attorney general's office, relative to the authority of the state board of examiners to expend money for lease and purchase of the Twin Falls-Jerome inter-county bridge, which was received in my office this morning, it now appears that the board of examiners has the legal right to sign vouchers on the state highway fund," Masters stated.

### Grand Jury Indicts Ex-Salt Lake Mayor

SALT LAKE CITY, June 14 (AP)—Former Mayor E. B. Ervin, Ben Harmon, a cafe owner, and R. O. Pierce, an attorney, were charged today in district court with "profiting by the earnings of fallen women," in an indictment returned by the Salt Lake county grand jury.

The joint indictment charged specifically that on June 1, 1937, the three men "accepted from women certain sum of money."

Bonds were set at \$3,000 each by Third District Judge Herbert Schiller.

A few minutes after an 18-man grand jury returned a verdict charging him with kidnaping and first degree murder, the 21-year-old farm youth was brought into court to enter his plea.

### 2 DIE, 6 INJURED IN BOISE CRASH

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—Two automobiles crashed head-on west of the city limits here early today and killed two women. Six other persons were seriously injured.

The crash occurred at the intersection of a four-lane highway. The injured were unable to give a coherent story of what caused the crash.

"No Foolin' Roun This Time," Says World's Champion

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., June 14 (UP)—The die of the Joe Louis-Max Schmeling heavyweight title fight a week from tomorrow night has been cast so far as the champion is concerned. Louis will tear out and try to nail his man from the opening bell.

"Ain't no use foolin' around like I did las' time," Joe said. "If he'll stand up and fight me, I'll knock him out befo' the second round's over. Course if he dogs it for a while, I'll take four or five."

"Max'nt didn't give me no first lickin'. I was beaten as an amateur, but I came back to win later from every one of 'em. Smelin' ain't no different from the rest. I know how to fight him now. If he'll mix it with me this time, the fight won't go three rounds. I can take 'em. I was a winner, Jack Blackburn was equally positive that "Chappie" has learned all the answers since he was tagged by Schmeling's right in 1936.

Learned from Licking "No fighter can ever be a great fighter until he takes one good licking and learns a lesson not to let it happen again," Blackburn said. "Joe's had his and he ain't gonna take another one, at least not one from Schmeling. He's earned too much to let Schmeling keep walking away with those right hands again. "Ever since that fight, whenever he was in a ring with a better boxer than he had to do to knock him down, he has been a fighter. He's been a fighter since that time, and that's why he's picking Joe to win by a knockout."

Joe plans to box four rounds with two sparring partners today.

# LONDONERS OCCUPIED WITH PREPARATIONS FOR WAR

## THOUSANDS MOVE FROM TOP FLATS TO AVOID RAIDS

LONDON, June 14 (UP)—A visitor from Mars dropped into London today, he would think that war is inevitable and is coming soon. Thousands of Londoners are vacating top floor flats in fear of raids. Some are moving into the suburbs. Thousands are buying canned goods and starting food hoards. Apartment buildings advertise bomb-proof shelters as a renting attraction. Department stores offer to gas-proof rooms in the homes of customers at \$62 a room.

Classes in Country  
Private schools are notifying parents of arrangements for resuming London and resume classes in the country in the event of war. The first communication I received after I had moved into a suburb of Walton-on-Thames was a notification from the urban council that the air raid warden would call shortly to measure the family for gas masks.

People Nervous  
The people are nervous. In my contacts with British friends, I encounter evidence that thoughts of counter-attacks are preoccupying their minds and affecting their personal lives and plans for the future. Among the European capitals, London, hitherto has been the most backward in air raid precautions, but the shock of Hitler's sudden absorption of Austria has roused the people to a feeling of danger.

Furnish Masks  
By the end of this summer, the government plans to be in a position to furnish a mask for every one of the 45,000,000 men, women and children in the British Isles.

With special permission of the Home Office, I was the only correspondent permitted to visit the factory at Blackburn, Lancashire, which is producing more than 100,000 masks a week.

Eight hundred employees, mostly girls, work in two shifts on a conveyor belt system turning out tin cans filled with chemically-treated layers of charcoal and cotton, which are attached to a simple gas mask.

Recently, they have begun making gas bags for babies which enclose the baby. The bags are fitted with a gas filter pump for the frequent injection of air. No method has been devised of feeding the baby within the bag or for adults to eat while masked.

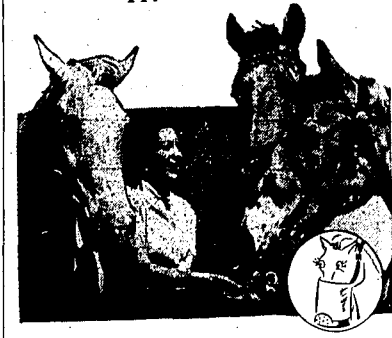
