Yellow River Floods Threaten Homes of 50,000,000

China Stream Gains Steadily Falls Steadily

By ROBERT DELAIRE SHANGHAI, June 18 (UP)—The great Yellow river, for centuries the "scourge" of China, was running wild today, and threatened to make 50,000,000 persons homeless within 30 days.

There seemed little prospect of halting the floods which have spread to sections of five provinces and made a lake of thousands of square miles of war-torn territory.

The waters continued to rise as terracing dams, built on all sections of north central China, bringing a 44-foot rise in the river during the past two days.

Homeless in 30 Days Fifty million persons will be homeless within a month unless the floods are controlled, said J. E. Baker, director of the commission.

The floods, threatening to halt the entire Chinese-Japanese war, were the worst in China since 1855, when the muddy Yellow river stormed a new course eastward to the sea.

STORM TROOPERS SMASH WINDOWS OF JEWISH STORES

By EDWARD W. BEATTIE BERLIN, June 18 (UP)—The "purge" of Jews from Germany's economic as well as cultural life went on relentlessly today and it was learned from Nazi quarters that the drive was prepared carefully and methodically, partially by storm troops.

There was no indication of any let-up in the anti-Jewish campaign. Frenzied, frightened Jews returned hurriedly home after another night of terror in which their homes were entered, many were arrested and scores of Jewish shops were daubed with the "curse of non-Aryanization."

Draw Lists Details of the organizations of the drive revealed that storm troop sections were under instructions to draw up lists of Jews and especially of Jewish shops in their districts.

Sub-leaders were instructed two days in advance when action was planned in their districts. Thus the plans for the drive in the Hohen-Schoenhausen district, scheduled for this morning, were completed on Thursday.

Jews avoided their homes during the night, fearful that Nazis—some in uniforms and holding rifles—would take them into custody if they could find them.

Widows Smashed Bands of Nazis roved the city, smashing the windows of Jewish-owned shops and palatial mansions on them that they must not be patronized.

What's Happening, What Matters Among the people who get gray hairs during the depression is the newspaper editor. Not only does the editor have all the ordinary depression worries; he also has the responsibility of laying daily before his readers a mental bill of fare calculated to tempt their appetites.

He has had an unusually bloody and cruel war in China, with day-to-day lists of cities bombed, non-combatants blown to bits, towns sacked, armies routed and spies executed. He has had an equally distressing war in Spain, with much the same sort of fodder coming out of that hopper. He has had rumors of war from all over Europe, with troops mobilizing on peaceful borders, cabinets tottering, Russians being executed, armaments being piled up and a general miasma of fear and suspicion spreading across every land.

At home he has had a vindictive and occasionally unprincipled political row to report. He has had a stupendous unemployment problem, to tell about, an equally-stupendous problem in government finance to expound, a series of strikes to report, and a whole list of minor unpleasantnesses like kidnappings, hold-ups, airplane disasters and so on to tell about.

All of which brings us to the stunt a certain metropolitan editor in the middle west tried the other day. He had the usual grist of catastrophes to choose from when he made up his front page; a Spanish bombing, a Sino-Japanese battle, a new blood-and-thunder speech by Hitler, another frog-eye act by Mussolini, a factory strike down east, and the like. And he finally turned his back on all of these things and built his front page around the fact that the woman who had headed the local library, and had done a grand, peaceful, constructive job of it for something like a quarter of a century, was resigning her position.

Well, maybe the editor was right. Maybe his readers unconsciously blessed him when this morning paper told them that in spite of all the hell that has broken loose the unspectacular business of making a more civilized world was still going on. Maybe a story doesn't have to have a corpse in it to be news, after all. If you were an editor, how would you look at it?

Maps Are Momentary Boundaries are funny things. A child's conception of a boundary is a line across the landscape separating the yellow territory from the pink. A farmer's conception of a boundary—a Maine farmer who lives across the line from the village of Escourt in Quebec—is a horsefly inside his shirt.

These people know better what a political boundary is than the millions who live removed from such frontiers. A boundary is the shadow of the edge of a sphere of power, and no more real than a shadow. Men are not separated by shadows. The people who live in the jugged territories of Europe know what men are separated by. Greed, pride, and lack of imagination. The real boundaries are the boundaries in the mind.

At some remote time in the future the shadows may go, but the boundaries in the mind are gone.

The Perils of Summer For the benefit of those people who have jobs to take vacations from this summer the United States public health service has issued a list of hints for the preservation of health away from the office. The service advises: Wear light clothing, but watch out for the sun. Be careful of the food you eat and the water you drink. Protect your eyes. Avoid mosquitoes, flies, and wood ticks. 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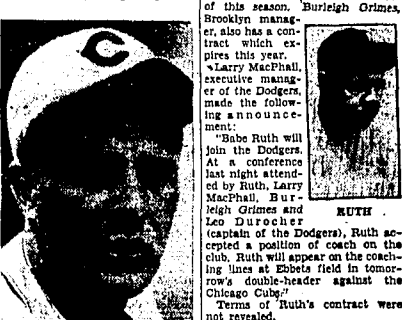

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


