CHINA TO EFFECT ANY MEDIATION EFFORTS Government Prepares Long-Range Potato Marketing Program

KAI-SHEK ORDERS SOVEREIGNTY FOR CHINESE COUNTRY

REFERENDUM ON PLAN WOULD BE HELD ON AUG. 1

By FRED DALEY WASHINGTON, July 1 (UP)—The department of agriculture prepared a long-range potato marketing control program today which would remain in effect until withdrawn by the secretary of agriculture.

The agreement would give the secretary of agriculture wide powers to regulate the size and quality of potatoes, shipped in interstate commerce. Growers in early and intermediate potato areas approved a similar program last spring.

The proposed program would give growers the opportunity to direct appeal once it is approved. The secretary of agriculture would "consider" its appeal upon a petition signed by 25 or more per cent of all growers.

He might, also, declare it inoperative for one or more years upon recommendation of a control committee appointed by himself from a list of nominees by growers. Under the same procedure it might be modified in areas if two-thirds of all growers voting favor it.

All areas will be declared affected by the program or none will be affected. F. R. Miller, director of the agricultural adjustment administration division of marketing and marketing agreements, said.

WILLIAMS BACKS FEDERAL SYSTEM OF PUMP-PRIMING

SEATTLE, Wash., July 1 (UP)—Aubrey Williams, deputy WPA administrator, today defended the government's current pump-priming and said he believed the American economic system could not function and survive without a federal work program.

In an address prepared for delivery at the national conference of social work, Williams said it was not true that rugged individualism enabled the nation to do without government spending during the last century.

There always had been pump-priming, he declared, with the government finding it necessary to use part of the national wealth to get industries started and sustain them.

Kind Wouldn't Work "But that kind of pump priming will not work today," said Williams. "It worked in the past because it operated in conjunction with the vast investment opportunities which were then available. The tariff, the subsidies, the loans stimulated and protected the development of our unopened resources."

Williams was unable to reach the conclusion in time to present the address and the paper was read by John A. Kingsbury, administrative WPA assistant. Earlier Kingsbury had told the conference it cost more money to leave unemployed idle than to put them to work on federal projects.

Utilization Problem "Today we do not have those great unexplored resources to exploit," Williams said. "Today our problem is to bring about the full utilization of our powers to produce, so that they may provide the kind of livelihood that our people have a right to expect."

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek is determined that there shall be no peace in the Far East until China's sovereignty is respected, it was reported today.

Whether the question of an armistice came up in the Hankow meeting could not be determined. Divisional commanders who fought a losing battle against the Japanese along the Lung-Hai railroad, including General Liu Xiang, General Chang Tso-Chung and General Chiung-Shih, refused to comment.

Generalissimo Chiang's stand was reported by General George DeLoach, a special correspondent for the newspaper quoted him as saying that "China does not welcome mediation or any other mediation unless it would restore China's sovereignty."

The report was coincident with the gathering of foreign diplomats in Hong Kong, increasing confidence that mediation plans would be discussed in Germany. The ambassadors, Sir A. Clarke Kerr of Great Britain, John H. Priester of Sweden, Dr. Oskar F. Trautson of Germany, Ambassador Ceres of Italy, and Etienne Lardy, Swiss chargé d'affaires.

Authorized sources in London said that the British and American governments were ready to undertake immediate mediation to end the war and that Lord Halifax, the British foreign secretary, believed that the time for successful mediation was not far off.

Spanish Rebels Plan Fighting Force of 2,000 Planes After War

LEADERS EXPECT NATION TO TAKE WORLD POSITION

 ZARAGOZA, Spain, July 1 (AP)—The Spanish nationalists plan a peace time air force of 2,000 planes if they win the civil war, it was disclosed today.

The disclosure was made by Gen. Alfredo Kindlan, chief of the nationalist air force, in an exclusive interview with the United Press.

"Generalissimo Francisco Franco considers that Spain, due to her geographical position, needs a big air force," he said.

Budget Plans

"I have submitted plans to budget for a strength of 2,000 planes as a peace time force. That is proof that after the war Spain will once more assume her rightful place among the nations."

"Moreover Spanish civil aviation will be expanded, especially with South American nations and I am certain that the eventual Spanish American air line will equal any other as regards air mail and passenger transportation. At the same time Spain will develop civil aviation lines with other countries."

"Contrary to deliberately false statements made by our enemies, I wish to emphasize that nationalist Spain since the beginning of the war has built up a powerful air force, with the result that the great majority of air force work is entirely carried out by Spaniards."

Lays Good Groundwork

"In addition, the experience gained by our air force in fighting for the honor and integrity of Spain will lay the foundations for a powerful post-war Spanish air force to meet the necessities of the modern nation which is being forged as the result of the war through the inspiring leadership of Generalissimo Franco."

(A Spanish peace time air force of 2,000 airplanes, would force a re-orientation of the entire European military situation. Spain would be able to exert enormous influence because her frontier on France is unfortified and she fronts on the French communication route to Colonial Africa and the Straits of Gibraltar. She possesses Ceuta, which is the African "rock" opposite British Gibraltar.—Ed.)

As Gen. Kindlan made his disclosure regarding nationalist plans for the future, it was admitted at Burgos that Generalissimo Franco had ordered that no foreign merchant ships be bombed in the open sea and that all possible effort be made to avoid hitting British ships anchored in ports where nationalist airplanes bombed what were reported as military objectives.

OUTLOOK BRIGHT FOR IDAHO CROP

Cutting of the first crop of alfalfa in Twin Falls county is nearly completed but very little is stacked because of rainy and cloudy weather which has been recorded recently, a report issued by the U. S. department of agriculture weather bureau for the week ending June 28 revealed this afternoon.

In Twin Falls county, the report continues, planting of late potatoes has just been completed.

In Camas county good rains were reported. All crops are said to be in excellent condition with winter wheat heading and beginning to fill. Pastures and ranges are in the best condition of several years although frost early in the week did some damage to winter wheat.

Although local showers are delaying haying in Cassia county all crops are "looking good," the report shows. In Gooding county the weather has been reported rather unfavorable for corn, beans and truck crops but grains are good.

In Lincoln county rains are fair except barley which is listed as being "fair to good." Beets are full and pastures and ranges are good but are now becoming somewhat dry. Truck crops are listed as slow. A very light crop of alfalfa was reported. It was cut early because of cheat grass and weeds.

POLITICAL USE OF FUNDS KNOCKED

SENATOR WARNS PRACTICE WILL RUIN BOURBONS

WASHINGTON, July 1 (AP)—Two prominent senators today expressed their opposition to the use of political funds for political ends may wreck the Democratic party and the general predicted that the next congress would enact a law prohibiting political activity by relief officials.

Sen. Carl A. Hatch, D. N. M., author of the unsuccessful amendment to the current multi-billion dollar relief bill to prohibit recipients of the money from political activities, predicted that the next congress would enact such legislation.

Sen. David I. Walsh, D. Mass., issued a warning to all Democrats that use of relief funds to "purg" and New Deal candidates in the coming national elections would wreck the party.

"If any there be who suppose that the public conscience is temporarily stupefied by the worry, distress and anxiety that present economic conditions have caused, let them not be unmindful of the wrath that is waiting to all Democrats who exercise when relief of human misery is degraded to gutter politics," Walsh said.

He added that such use of relief funds would be "un-Christian, un-American," and that "any officer so using the money 'in my opinion is a traitor to President Roosevelt and the Democratic party."

Old Memories Flow Thick as Civil War Veterans Gather

By JOE ALEX MORRIS

GETTYSBURG, Pa., July 1 (AP)—Old memories puffed like the smoke of a cannon from the battlefield at Gettysburg today when veterans of the Civil War looked again on the hills that shook with the thunder of conflict three quarters of a century ago.

Men in blue along the cemetery wall where Meade's troops once lay in the grass; gray-jacketed veterans in the woods of Seminary ridge from which once flowed Pickett's brigades; and a mingling of gray and blue across the rolling farmlands marked the final reunion of the Grand Army of the Republic and the United Confederate veterans of the 75th anniversary of the battle.

For three days, almost 2,000 veterans from north and south have been gathering for the anniversary observance which formally opens today.

Was Young Thun

Major General O. R. Gelliehe saw it and the memory of another hot day long ago popped like distant gunfire in his mind.

"I was young then, but I was big as any man," he said, and his old eyes half closed as he remembered. It was 19, when "I fought at Bull Run and when congressmen who come out with their cigars to see us rebels licked went home in a hurry, I tell you."

The burden of 93 years hasn't Gelliehe's broad shoulders. His eyes are bright and the words snap from his lips. But few who walked those hills had seen or could remember the awful fury of those days when cannon thunder threatened the sky and the wheels pressed the yellow wheat into the dirt of the fertile valley.

Here, where the Blue Ridge foothills led into rolling farmlands, the army of northern Virginia rolled northward behind "Jeb" Stuart's cavalry to strike at Harrisburg and Philadelphia. It was here that weary feet and food to fill knapsacks almost emptied of parched corn rations.

Remember's Battle

Gelliehe remembered it, how Lee's war-tired men came out of the Shenandoah and into the land of the Pennsylvania Dutch.

And he remembered, too, how Meade's army of the Potomac reached out along the roads that centered like spokes from Gettysburg, and how they met there needed sleep.

Not Gelliehe or any of the rest saw more than a flicker of the whole picture when the advance guards curved together on the first day 75 years ago; or when they dug their worn boots into the turf of nearby ridges on the following days that the matter with hot blood the spots on which their grandsons would build statues of marble or bronze. They have seen the statues and they have read the story, but time has touched their words with the diluted flavor of a history book.

Lee might have won the battle of Gettysburg and gone on to make some other field the site of heroic statues and the scene of presidential pilgrimages. But the rebel yells died out with the sun. Next day Meade's men crouched behind the stone wall on Cemetery hill, many of them within sight of their own farms, and the two armies braced for the test of strength.

SAVINGS CONCERN TO PAY DIVIDEND
