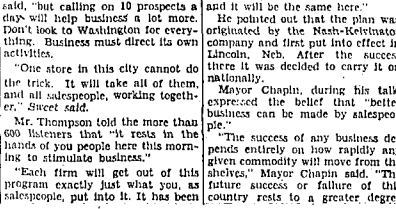

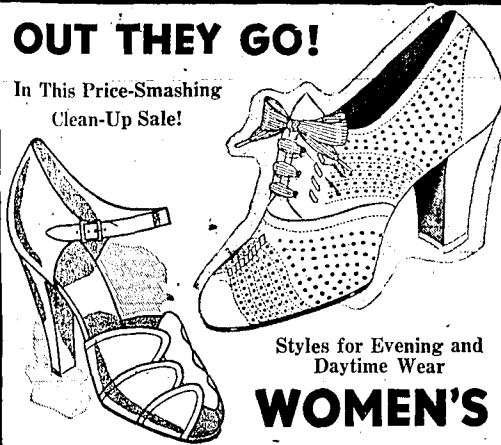

# Nation Faces Darkest Budget Since 1936

## 1939 REPORT TO INCREASE DEBT \$7,500 MINUTE

WASHINGTON, July 13 (UP)—President Roosevelt spread before the nation today the darkest budget estimates since 1936 with a forecast of record-breaking New Deal spending and a treasury deficit of approximately \$4,000,000,000.

The report dealt with the fiscal year 1939. On the basis of figures presented today the treasury will be going into the red at the rate of about \$7,500 a minute during the entire twelve months.

Mr. Roosevelt's out-of-season fiscal summation turned a corner in New Deal budget trends. It ended the period of increasing revenue, decreasing expenditures and diminishing deficits, but continued the national debt toward new high ground.

He estimated that the national debt would be \$40,650,000,000 when the 1939 fiscal year ends in approximately 1 1/2 months. In that year the New Deal plans to spend almost \$9,000,000,000.

Charging responsibility for decreasing revenue and necessity of additional spending to "business recession," Mr. Roosevelt today reviewed the 1939 fiscal year budget estimates which originally were presented to congress when it convened last January.

These new estimates, revealing a comparatively satisfactory trend of budget developments which had been maintained since June 30, 1936, followed by two days the treasury's announcement that revenue in the 1938 fiscal year just ended was the greatest in history.

On the basis of new estimates for the current fiscal year however, the nation now is embarked on a 12-month period of record-breaking peacetime spending.

Significant in Mr. Roosevelt's revised estimates was a statement which excluded further dollar devaluation or other extraordinary currency maneuvers in meeting the 1939 budget problem. The big bill will be met by a combination of drawing on cash reserves, using social security and similar proceeds and finally borrowing from the public.

In this budget estimate the borrowing of the reconstruction finance corporation, the commodity credit corporation and the U. S. housing authority have been set up apart from other fiscal operations of the government and their commitments will not be reflected in the national debt.

## Shoshone Eases Hard-Boiled Stand on Traffic Violations

SHOSHONE, July 13 (Special)—At the regular session of the village board some interest developed in a petition presented by D. W. Wilson and others, asking that the local officers exercise a little more leniency toward minor offenders of traffic laws. It was inferred that too rigorous enforcement in unimportant cases had a tendency to alienate the friendship of the traveling public.

The petition was composed of a major portion of the business community.

It was hinted that the document was directed more particularly to traffic officers, and the petition had a good many defenders. The officers, however, were not without their supporters, and Day Marshal Ben E. Weeks vigorously maintained that he had carefully avoided making the enforcement too stringent. Others thought that the officers were doing a good job and were not carrying out the agreement and safety process promulgated a year ago.

Two of the councilmen frankly stated that some modification of the present regulations was required. Truck parking came in for other consideration, but it was concluded that this phase of traffic affairs was being conducted in a satisfactory manner.

In the main, however, it was apparent that the petitioners had won their argument. Following the public hearing the board settled down to modification of the regulations. They day marshal was commended for his enforcement work. Village officers will be restricted to arrests of offenders violating the village ordinances or infractions directly associated with them. Complete abandonment of any deputy sheriff duties, and limiting of trips outside the city limits strictly to pursuit of violators observed violating the ordinances within the village.

Contemplated closing of some of the town streets was discussed and it was stated that some dirt and gravel had already been procured. The annual appropriation ordinance was passed, calling for a village tax levy of 27 mills, including

10 mills for the general fund, 2 for library, 11 for streets and lighting, 1 for park and 3 for street improvement bonds.

Claims approved amounted to \$2,683, including \$800 for truck permits. New drainage holes are to be drilled at convenient points.

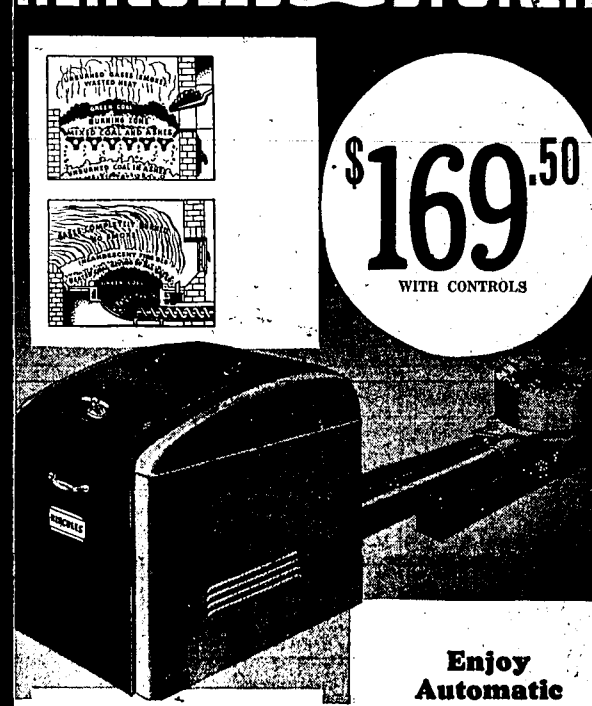

# BRITISH SHIFT ATTENTION TO HITLER IN PEACE STRUGGLE

## MOVE CAUSED BY DELAY IN ENDING SPANISH BATTLE

By JOE ALEX MORRIS (United Press Staff Correspondent)

Great Britain's struggle to guard the peace of Europe is undergoing a quiet but significant change of pace and attitude since the outbreak of the Spanish civil war.

The new background of diplomatic developments has shifted Britain's attention from Italian Premier Benito Mussolini to his partner in the Fascist-Nazi alliance, Adolf Hitler, in an effort to negotiate a settlement of European war threats.

Circumstances—particularly the prospect of a long delay in ending the Spanish civil war—were responsible for the shift toward Germany before the new Anglo-Italian friendship treaty goes into effect but a deal with Hitler has been Chamberlain's prime objective from the beginning.

Chamberlain's program has met with major difficulties at almost every turn. Political foes at home have persistently threatened to turn him out. Mussolini, in turn, has refused to let Italy's good bargaining position, has held out for a high price in return for Fascist cooperation. Continuation of the Spanish war has prevented the Anglo-Italian pact from going into effect and thus weakened the keystone of Chamberlain's program.

The British prime minister has sought some way to put the treaty into effect without awaiting withdrawal of Italian troops from Spain but strong opposition at home has prevented such action.

That failure has aroused anger in Rome and there has been some danger that the keystone of the new realistic policy would crumble before it was in place.

At the same time, Chamberlain has been unable to lose touch with Germany. The comparative relaxation of war fears at present has provided the best opportunity for action. In addition, the Czechoslovakian minority issue will soon be brought to the front again as a basis for German expansionist activity in central Europe. Authoritative observers in the Balkans believe Hitler is likely to act on a similar front before focusing the issue in Czechoslovakia but the problem remains unsettled.

Thus, Chamberlain has been forced to move into diplomatic negotiations with Berlin. His first step was authoritatively reported to be an attempt to set up an economic agreement with the Reich as a preliminary to a political treaty under which Hitler would join the general program for maintaining peace in Europe.

The German government already was said to have made certain proposals—including improvement of German trade in British goods—which are being examined by the British authorities.

Anglo-German rapprochement is essential to any lasting plan for peace but it involves tremendous difficulties economically as well as politically and the negotiations may be expected to move very slowly.

Chamberlain's success or failure will hinge on the outcome.

Meanwhile on the fighting fronts: China—Japanese aerial bombers again hit the Yangtze offensive toward Hankow, pouring explosives into the Chinese defenses at Kiu-Kiang has created a serious problem for the Chinese, who have been destroying the city in preparation for withdrawal—as well as for Japanese. British representatives have protested vigorously to the Chinese government. Canton again was bombed by the Japanese and new areas were expected on the Hankow area.

Spain—Loyalist troops stalled the Spanish rebel advance on Valencia as vigorous counter-fighting in the Sierra de Baza sector. Insurgents admitted delays but claimed they were advancing slowly in some areas.

## HEALTH WORK IN DISTRICT LISTED

Activities of the district health unit for the last fiscal year were listed today in a report compiled and released by Dr. Robert Stump, health unit director. The report covers the period from July 1, 1937 to June 30, 1938.

Principal topics of work discussed in the report include control of communicable diseases, tuberculosis control, venereal disease control, maternal and infant hygiene, pre-school hygiene, school hygiene, adult hygiene, crippled children's program, sanitation, milk, water, sewage, laboratory work.

"We would like to take this occasion to express our appreciation for the support that has been given throughout the past year by the public by medical and dental groups," and by lay organizations; and to boards of county commissioners throughout the district for their financial support," Dr. Stump writes in the report.

## EXCHANGE DEALS MENACING WOOL

PULLMAN, Wash., July 13 (Special)—The possibility of losses reckoned in millions of dollars as a result of any considerable proration of the wool industry entering into hedging operations on the wool futures exchange, was pointed out to producers attending the American Institute of Cooperation sessions here Tuesday, by R. A. Ward, general manager of the Pacific Wool Growers' Association.

Mr. Ward quoted the opinion of a representative of the exchange that the market would be lowered to a point where there were no buyers and selling of forward contracts would cease.

"It is my contention that during such a period wool growers would suffer enormous losses," Mr. Ward said. "I do not believe the present wool market is strong enough to furnish support in such a situation.

"If a commodities futures exchange is to furnish a liquid speculative market, trading must be in sufficient volume to support the cost of facilities required, and the market must not be controlled by a few large speculators. I believe that the wool futures exchange is too thin a market to properly justify the later price based on supply and demand without being influenced by manipulative, seasonal and other factors," Mr. Ward said.
