State's Personality is the Family's

State's Personality is the Family's We are in the midst of a period in which the state is being glorified. As the source of all power and all glory, national governments are setting forth their claims—and in many cases enforcing them—as the greatest moving force in the lives of millions of people. Yet there are other forces, and it remains for Dr. Stanley P. Davies, president of the Family Welfare Association of America, to remind us of one that is even more fundamental than the state. "From time to time throughout the course of his-tory," says Dr. Davies, "the state has attempted to mold the family to its own ends, but in the last an-alysis the family has prevailed. The family molds the people, and in the long run the people mold the state."

That is getting back to fundamentals, for no one hasynt devised a state or a manner of life which did not depend in large measure on a stable and vital family life. The experience of Russia soon after the revolution of 1917 taught them this. It was felt that the family had been outmoded. Easy and automatic marrige and diyorce, state care of children and the like were enthusiasms of that era.

children and the like were enthusiasms of that era. But gradually conditions changed, and family life in Russia is now not much different from family life anywhere. The basic institution of the family proved itself stronger than the state itself. So, too, with the Jewish people, whose devotion to the family group is proverbial. Without any state at all, the life in family and synagoue and temple has proved a more constant unifying force than a score of states which have tried to supplant them.

. . . There is a definite link, Dr. Davies believes, be-tween family life and democracy, for the aim of each is the same: the liberation and fullest development of the individual.

of the individual. The social personality is best built within the fam-ily itself, that "little democracy" where mutual iden-tification, sharing, recognition both of self-interest and group-interest grow strong. Principles learned here overflow later into the larger democracy of state and society, Dr. Davies believes. Each is necessary to, and each stimulates, the other. Family, life develops best under democratic condi-

Family life develops best under democratic condi-tions, and democracy flowers fullest when family life is a rock anchoring people against winds of discon-tent and slippery slogans.

Keep the Ships at Sea

American shipyards, long almost completely idle, are awakening to contribute a definite share in na-tional recovery.

tional recovery. It seems impossible, but it is true that for 16 years not a single general-cargo ship has been built for for-eign commerce in an American yard. Tankers, yes. A few liners, yes. But the general-cargo freighter, which is the backbone of any mer-chant marine and an absolutely necessary naval aux-liary in time of year has been periode any meriliary in time of war, has been neglected to an unbelievable extent.

lievable extent. Soon 33 ships will be under way, including the \$15,-750,000 successor to the Loviathan. They are the fore-runners of a fleet of 500 ships within the next 10 years, to cost a billion and a quarter dollars. Before that fleet hits the sea, however, every ef-fort should be made to get going with a workable system of maritime labor. The incessant bickering between and among longshoremen and seamen ought to be reduced to a workable system before the fleet-goes to sea, or else the United States may find itself with a merchant fleet at last, but no way to sail it. The time to begin working out the marine labor problem is now, before the ships are ready to head out to sea.
